A-No, automatic waiver of premiums can be granted. A veteran must be totally disabled for six months before he is entitled to apply for a waiver of premiums. He may also file claim for refund for those premiums paid from the date on which the waiver was made effective. A beneficiary of an insured veteran likewise is entitled to file a claim for a refund if the insured had been totally disabled for six mosths or more cease to refuse to have any before his death.

AUSTIN, Texas, February 20. In an effort to familiarize every person in Texas with the services offered by the Crippled Children's Division of the State Health Department, Dr. Geo. W. Cox. State Health Officer has released the following statement:

Every cripled child in Texas, under 21 years of age and of normal mentality whose parents are unable to pay for needed care, is entitled to asistance from this Division.

Crippling conditions which may be treated are Infantile Paralysis., Osteomyelytis, Club Feet, Harelip and Cleft Palate, Burns, Curvature of the Spine, Arthritis, Bow Legs, Rickets, Tuberculosis of the Bone, Flat Feet, Congenitally "Dislocated Hip Muscular Dystrophy, Supernumery Fingers and Toes, Wry Neck , Elephantiasis, Spina Bifida, Brachial Palsy, Potts' Disease, Congenital Anomalies Spondylelisthesis, Amputation, Webb Fingers, Epiphsitis, and Sarcoma.

Assistance may be obtained by applying to the Crippled Children's Division, Texas State Department of Health, Austin, or by placing an application through an established city or county health unit.

Full information about local groups and organizations throughout the state who are anxious to assist crippled children to establish their eligibility and receive proper care, may be had by writing for a pamphlet, "Handbook on Agencies." AUSTIN, Texas, February 20. In an effort to familiarize

every person in Texas with the services offered by the Crippled Children's Division of the State Health Department, Dr. Geo. W. Cox. State Health Officer has released the following statement

Every cripled child in Texas, under 21 years of age and of normal mentality whose parents are unable to pay for needed care, is entitled to asistance from this Division.

Crippling conditions which may be treated are Infantile Paralysis, Osteomyelytis, Club Feet, Harelip and Cleft Palate, Burns, Curvature of the Spine, Arthritis, Bow Legs, Rickets, Tuberculosis of the Bone, Flat Feet, Congenitally 'Dislocated Hip Muscular Dystrophy, Supernumery Fingers and Toes, Wry Neck , Elephantiasis, Spina Bifida, Brachial Palsy, Potts' Disease, Congenital Anomalies Spondylelisthesis, Amputation, Webb Fingers, Epiphsitis, and Sarcoma.

Assistance may be obtained by applying to the Crippled Children's Division, Texas State Department of Health, Austin, or by placing an application through an established city or county health unit.

Full information ,about local groups and organizations throughout the state who are anxious to assist crippled children to establish their eligibility and receive proper care, may be had by writing for a pamphlet, "Handbook on Agencies." Address Crippled Children's Division, State Department of Health, Austin 2, Texas.

HEALTH NOTES-

AUSTIN, Texas, Feb. 27-According to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, pneumonia caused approximately 2,460 deaths during the past year in Texas, a total which is entirely too high. This disease is most prevailent during the winter and spring months.

Pneumonia is caused by a germ called pneumococcus, which many of us have lurking in our throats ready to start trouble, when our resistance to it is lowered. We can keep up our resistance by avoiding undue fatigue and unneccessary exposure to extreme weather conditions. When we go outside in cold weather sufficient wraps should be worn to protect us. Keeping the temperature of our homes "as low as is consistent with comfort will greatly lessen the difficulties encountered in adjusting ourselves to the cold when we leave the house.
