## 'Hunches' Pay Off For FB Contestant

Mike Raymond had a hunch that Lubbock Coronado would beat Amarillo; that Colorado would upset Oklahoma; that Texas Tech and the Houston Oilers would break out of their losing streaks; and that Pittsburgh would topple previously unbeaten New Orleans.

Raymond's "hunches" paid off in the seventh week of the Friona Star Football Contest, as he was the only contestant entering to correctly pick 13 of the 16 contest games. He received the weekly first prize of \$10 cash.

One of the contest games, Alabama vs Tennessee, wound up in a 17-17 tie, so was counted wrong on all of the entry blanks.

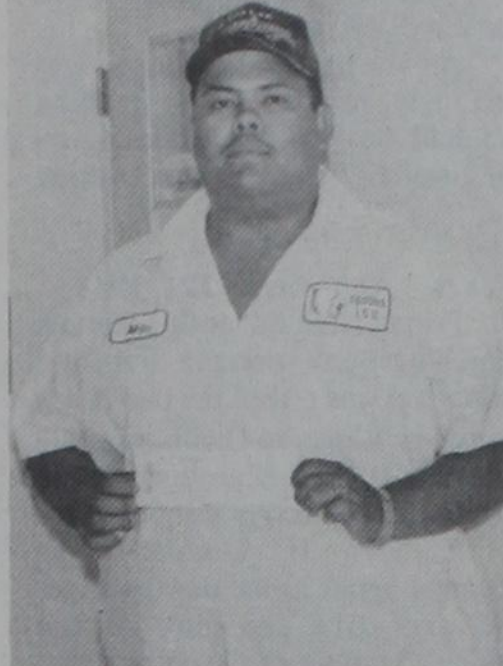
Raymond's only other misses were in picking favored Randall to beat Hereford, and Penn State to beat Michigan.

Wayne Amstutz of Hereford proved to be very consistent in the contest. For the second straight week he correctly picked 12 games correctly, and he also got very close on the tie-breaker score. And for the second week in a row, he won second place in the contest, and \$7.50.

Amstutz missed Amarillo-Coronado, Oklahoma-Coronado and New Orleans-Pittsburgh in addition to the tie. Then, he picked Dallas to defeat San Francisco, 27-20. He missed the Cowboys' score by only a point, and the 49ers' by just three, to claim second place money.

Joshua McDonald of Lazbuddie also picked 12 games, but had to settle for third place, after missing the tie-breaker score by only five points. He picked Dallas to win, 27-21. His misses were River Road-Perryton, Washington-Phoenix and New Orleans-Pittsburgh.

Thomas Reed of 602 Arrah was "odd man out" due to the tie-breaker. Reed was the only other

contestant to pick 12 games right, but lost out on the tie-breaker score, although missing it by only six points.

Twelve contestants correctly picked 11 games, just one short of having a chance at one of the weekly prizes. They were Landon Wiseman, Rodney Shelby, Jerry Hinkle, Raul Brailif, Martha Clements, Lance Looper, Courtney Carthel, Bowie Hand, Rick Carr, Dianne Morgan, Jackie Morgan and Jack Clark.

In the race for grand prize, Myrtle Melton, who has been tied for the lead for the past three weeks, has it all to herself this week with a score of 80. Next come Steve Gartin, Jerry Hinkle and Larry Rogers with 79.

Sandra Berend, Courtney Carthel, Donnie McDonald, Don Max Vars and Bobby Wied are next at 78. Raul Brailif, Rick Carr, Dennis Field, Mal Manchee and Jimmy R. Walker are at 77.

## Area Gets Good Rain; Plus Frost

The Friona area received a nice general rain this week, then early Thursday morning a fairly heavy frost was noted, although no killing freeze was observed.

A total of 1.24 inches of rain was measured in Friona, and the moisture varied from an inch in the Hub area to up to two inches at Rhea.

"We got two inches of rain at the elevator, and it all fell just perfect," said Joe Allen, manager of the Sherley-Anderson elevator at Rhea. "The rain was just in time for the wheat. We were about to lose the wheat for pasture purposes, but this should put the wheat in good shape," Allen said.

Allen said the maize in the Rhea area needed all the time it could get for maturity purposes. "This frost might help it out. We should have a pretty fair crop," Allen said.

The Hub area got an inch of rain, according to O.L. (Mac) McMurtrey. The corn harvest is finished. "We were down somewhat this year, because of the bad hail we received June 19. It hit the corn at a critical time, and then we had a hot, dry August," McMurtrey said.

An indication of how general Tuesday's rainfall was is seen in these totals: Hereford, 1.19; Dimmitt, 1.20; Bovina .97; and Clovis, 1.31.

This was the fifth time in 1993 for Friona to log a rain of an inch or more in one 24-hour period, and brought the year's total to ---- after a very slow start.

## Red-Ribbon Week Urges Drug-Free Commitment

"Be Drug-Free '93" is the theme for the 1993 Texas Red Ribbon Week. This campaign, symbolized by the red ribbon, began as a grassroots expression of concern and commitment to a drug-free, healthy lifestyle.

During the week of October 24-30, Friona Chamber of Commerce, Friona I.S.D., local businesses, community organizations, and citizens will be participating in many activities to support the commitment toward creating a drug-free community.

### Early Voting Is Underway Thru Oct. 31

Early voting began Wednesday for the special constitutional election to be held on November 2.

Voting is underway in the County Clerk's office in Farwell through October 29, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the courthouse.

In addition, special booths will be operated two days each in Friona and Bovina.

The Clerk's office will have representatives at Bovina City Hall on Tuesday, October 19 and again on October 26.

They will be at the Friona Credit Union on Thursday, October 21, and a week later, October 28.

Sixteen proposed amendments to the Texas constitution are on the ballot. Some are simple "housecleaning" items, and others are more complex.

Friona Elementary School will march down Main Street on Friday, October 29 at 10 a.m., in observance of Red Ribbon Week, a drug-awareness program.

The youngsters will march from eighth street to sixth street and then back to the school, according to Jerry Shelton, principal.

### New Traffic Light Is Installed

The Texas Department of Transportation has been installing a regular signal light at the intersection of U.S. Highway 60 and Cleveland Streets in Friona.

Expected to be servicable by the first of the week, it is expected that the light will flash for a few days and then will begin to work correctly.

The light will allow the crossing guard at the school crossing to push a button to stop traffic. It also will contain sensors, so that at times students are not crossing the light will not cycle unless there are vehicles waiting on either side of Cleveland waiting to get onto Highway 60.

On Thursday, October 28, high school students, including the Chieftain cheerleaders, Chieftain football players, Chieftain band members, and drama team will visit the elementary home-rooms to encourage the students to choose to be drug-free.

The Friona Elementary School will participate in a "Drug-Free March", Thursday at 10 a.m. downtown. The week's activities will conclude with Drug Awareness parties in each homeroom.

"Plan to be part of this initiative by wearing a red ribbon and make a commitment to support a drug-free community," said a spokesperson for the event.

## Ex-Resident Buried At Floydada

Mrs. Thomas was born in Amarillo on November 13, 1944 and married Keith Thomas in 1969 at Amarillo. She was the only daughter born to Tilden and Skeet Slagle.

She attended school in Friona, Hereford and Canyon. She moved to Floyd County in 1975 from Amarillo, was a beautician and a member of the First United Methodist Church.

Preceding her in death were her father in January 1968 and her brother, Roy Tilden Slagle, on January 29, 1990.

Survivors include her husband; two daughters, Diana Louise Green of Panhandle and Ann Hope Smith of Fort Collins, Colorado; a son, Bryan Thomas of Floydada; her mother, Skeet Slagle of Dumas; a brother, Robert Paul Slagle of Dumas; and five grandchildren.

She is the niece of Ted and Martha Slagle Rutherford of Friona.

\*In the summer of 1993, Friona High School was recognized by the state of Texas for achieving high scores on tests. A certificate was presented to Mr. Stephens and Mr. Ratcliff in Austin.

\*Since 1979, an average of 59 students have taken the ACT and/or the SAT each year with the average scores for these two tests increasing each year. In 1993, all but one or two members of the graduating class were either accepted into college, the military or was already employed at the time of graduation.

\*During the past several years, the state legislature has enacted certain laws mandating more record keeping, fewer students in some classes, more evaluation of teachers, more testing, etc. Most of the changes which have come to the schools have been good and have made it possible for our students to receive a better education. In most instances, the state did not provide funding for the changes which schools had to make and thus the local taxes have been raised to meet the needs of the budget.

\*In the last school funding bill which was passed, the schools which were hurt the most were those property poor school districts which had managed to keep the tax rate relatively low. Friona is one of those districts and our funding from the state was cut \$300,000, which meant another tax increase in order to continue to provide a quality education for our students. The reality of the situation is that the state legislature has not been able to provide funding, thus making it necessary for the local districts to increase local property taxes.

The meeting adjourned with the repeating of the Club Collect, led by Fay Reeve. Hostesses, Mary Lou Taylor and Lois Austin, served refreshments to members and one guest, Karene Krauel.

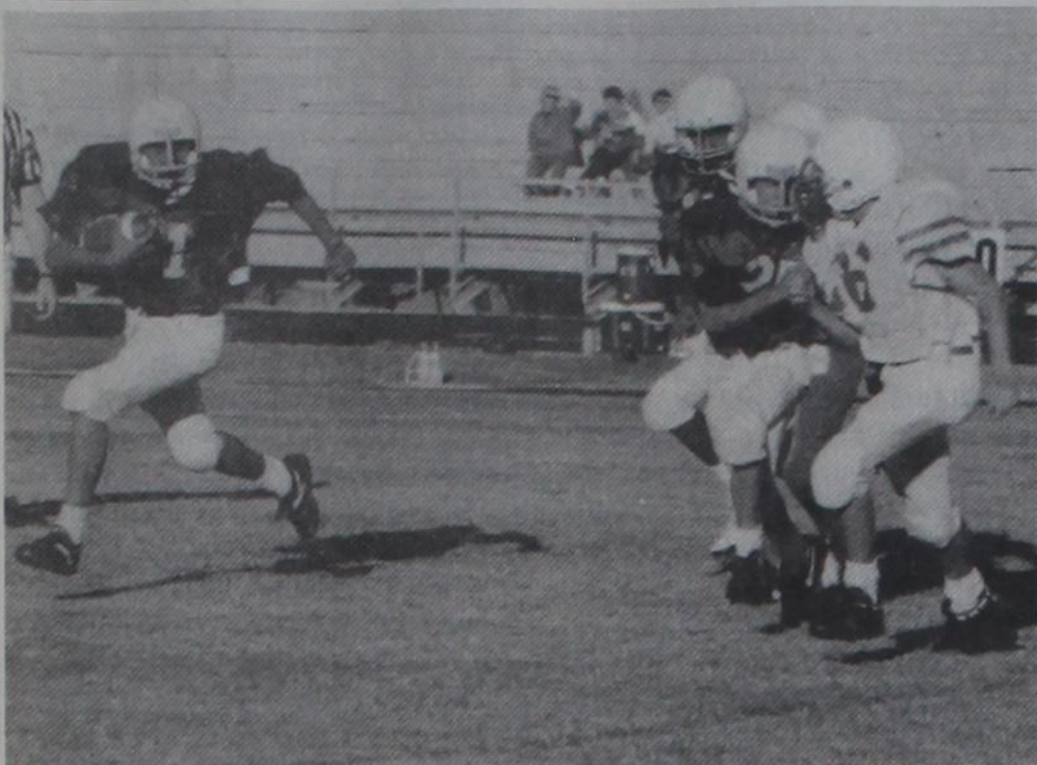

There are going to be a lot of second-teamers on offense in the backfield who are going to have to do good work, but the boys have had some good practices this week.

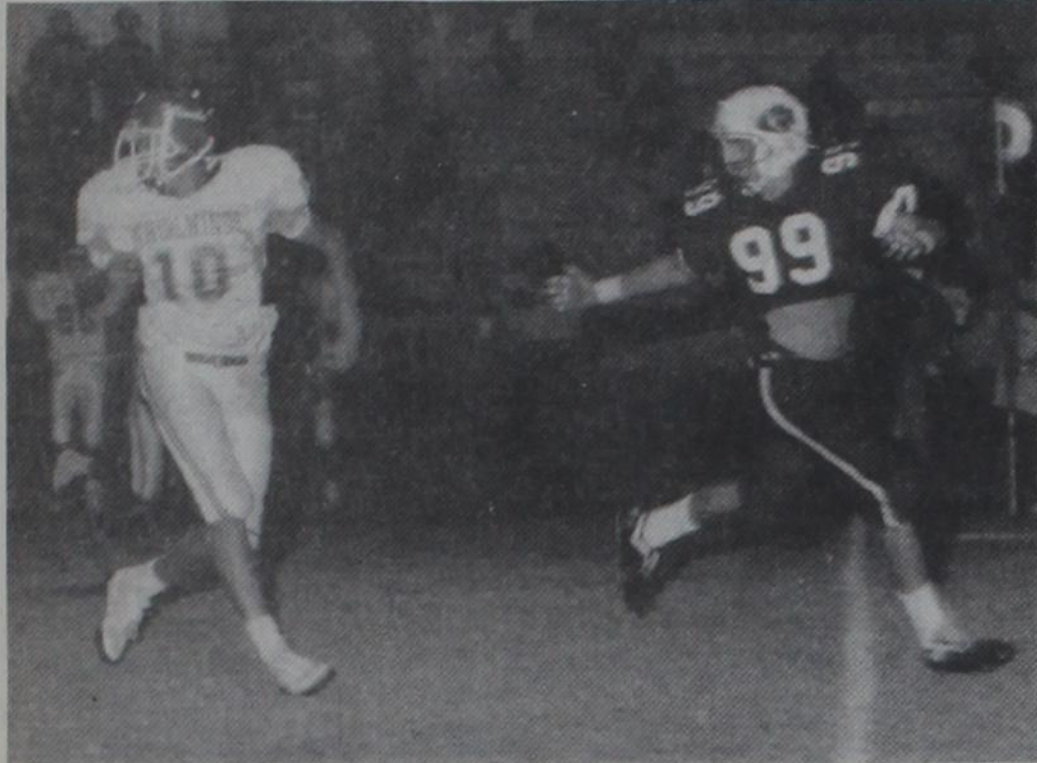
"The intensity is back up where it needs to be for a win," said Jay Belcher. The 18-year losing streak against Littlefield is staring them right in the face, but victory is the focus.

## Did You Know?

On October 16, 1758, Pioneer Lexicographer (author or editor of a dictionary) Noah Webster was born. Seventy years later, when the first edition of the dictionary bearing his name was published, he spoke of the book he considered so much more important than the one he had compiled: "The moral principles and precepts contained in the Scriptures ought to form the bases of all our civil constitutions and laws. All the miseries and evils which men suffer from vice, crime, ambition, injustice, oppression, slavery, and war, proceed from their despising or neglecting the precepts contained in the Bible."

This past weekend I was invited to attend a prison ministry outreach at the Las Cruces, New Mexico State Penitentiary. One of the inmates came to me with another young man that he wanted me to speak with. In the course of our conversation I spoke to him about laying our most precious possession on the altar even as

Abraham was asked by God to lay Isaac on the altar. To my amazement he did not know who Abraham or Isaac were. I asked him if he had a Christian background? He said, "No".

He began to express his doubts about his belief in God. If there was a God had been so bad that he could not be saved? Had he passed the point of no return? I told him of what Jesus had said, "I did not come to call the righteous, but sinners." Matthew 9:13 "For the Son of man has come to save that which was lost."

Noah Webster supported the establishment of colleges. One such college was determined to propagate the principles of the Gospel. They said, "The gospel only can convert words into plough shares and spears into pruning hooks--the Gospel only can supersede the necessity of bolts and bars--the Gospel only can dispeople the state prison and the penitentiary."

As I talked with the young man I thought, "How do you explain in such a short time the Gospel of Jesus Christ?" I told this young man that each of us has an appointment with death. It is appointed unto man once to die and then the judgment. That he would stand before the Judge of the universe even as he had stood before a human judge here.

He could either try to defend himself or he could call upon Christ, who would not only defend him but had already paid the penalty for his sin. And Jesus wouldn't charge him anything.

At the close of the services he said, "Part of me wants to go forward and believe." We walked to the front of that meeting and knelt in the sand of that prison courtyard.

Do we have a generation of young people who do not know their Bible, who do not know the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, or His only begotten Son, Jesus Christ?

# Turnips Are Abundant During Winter Months

As you pick out the season's best produce offerings--sweet potatoes, pumpkins, winter squash, apples, pears, etc.--don't forget turnips, which will be at their best now through March.

## M. Miller Re-Elected To Board

Mike Miller of Lazbuddie was recently re-elected to the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District board of directors. Miller represents Zone 5 of the district.

The purpose of the Parmer County SWCD, with headquarters in Friona, is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

As one of five individuals serving on the district board of directors, Miller will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district law.

Miller is also active in local and church activities. Mike and his wife, Pamela, live and farm in the Lazbuddie area.

In Texas, there are 212 Soil and Water Conservation Districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCDs do not have powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the districts are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

The Parmer County SWCD was organized in April 1948.

Unfortunately, I do tend to neglect the root vegetable.

However, the turnip is a vegetable worth remembering. Each half cup of cooked cubed turnips has only 14 calories and .1 (one-tenth) gram of fat.

When buying fresh turnips, look for firm, unblemished vegetables that are heavy for their size. To store turnips, remove the tops and use in recipes calling for turnip greens. Store the turnips in the refrigerator for up to one month.

Turnips can be used in recipes for soups, stews, casseroles and main dishes calling for various vegetables. Traditional seasonings are butter, salt and pepper. Turnips also can be seasoned with bay leaf or cloves.

The easiest and quickest cooking method is to place chopped turnips in 1 inch of water over high heat. After the water boils, reduce the heat and simmer the turnips for 15 to 20 minutes. Whole turnips can be simmered for 20 to 30 minutes.

Try the following turnip recipes this fall and winter:

**MASHED TURNIPS**  
2-1/2 pounds turnips, peeled and chopped

## Bivins Named To Committee

Lt. Governor Bob Bullock on Monday named Sen. Teel Bivins of Amarillo to an interim committee charged with scrutinizing every facet of the Texas Education Agency's mission and operations.

The creation of the 17-member select committee was one of the education accountability measures adopted this year by the Texas Legislature.

"This is a strong committee with a heavy blend of educational and business experience," Bullock said. "I have every faith in Sen. Bivins' proven ability and expertise."

The committee will study the mission, organization, size and effectiveness of the Texas Education Agency and compare it with similar agencies in other states and national education goals.

1/4 cup butter or margarine  
2 teaspoons salt  
1 teaspoon sugar  
1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper  
Chopped parsley for garnish

In a large saucepan over high heat, heat turnips to boiling in 1 inch of water. Reduce heat to low and simmer, covered, for 15 to 20 minutes or until the turnips are tender. Remove from heat and drain. Using a potato masher or electric mixer, mash the turnips. Add butter, salt, sugar and pepper; stir until well mixed. Garnish with parsley. Makes 8 servings.

## TURNIPS, PEAS AND CARROTS

6 medium turnips, peeled and cubed  
1 cup green peas, cooked and drained  
1 cup chopped carrots, cooked and drained  
2 tablespoons butter or margarine  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/8 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

Place the turnips in a saucepan and cook with water; bring to a boil. Cover and cook for 15 to 20 minutes or until the turnips are tender; drain. Combine the turnips with the peas and carrots; stir in the butter, salt and pepper. Cook until the vegetables are thoroughly heated, stirring constantly. Makes 6 servings.

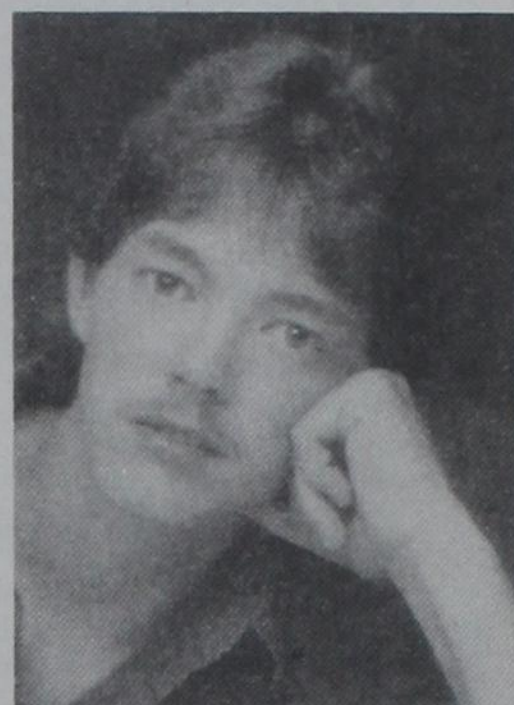
## TURNIP AND POTATO WINTER SOUP

1 small onion, chopped  
2 tablespoons butter or margarine  
1 cup chicken broth  
2 medium turnips, peeled and cut into large chunks  
2 medium potatoes, peeled and cut into large chunks  
1 cup milk  
Salt, to taste  
White pepper, to taste  
Pinch ground ginger  
Red bell pepper, cut into thin strips, for garnish  
Chopped fresh parsley, for garnish

In a large saucepan, saute the onion in the butter until transparent. Add chicken broth, turnips and potatoes; bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer for about 20 minutes or until turnips and potatoes are tender. Place the

mixture in a blender or food processor; add the milk, salt, white pepper and ginger. Blend until smooth. Return the mixture to the saucepan and reheat carefully, stirring constantly. Garnish each serving with red pepper strips and chopped parsley. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

# Ray Landrum Rites Are Held Monday

Funeral services for M. Ray Landrum, 80, were conducted in Friona Monday, October 18, at First Baptist Church, with Rev. Charles Broadhurst, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in Castro Memorial Gardens of Dimmitt, under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

Landrum passed away October 15 at St. Anthony's Hospice.

He was born June 16, 1913, in Floydada, and moved to Friona with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Landrum, in 1923. His father, a carpenter, built many of the early stores and homes in Friona.

Landrum graduated from Friona High School, and married Rosella Dixon, August 11, 1936. She preceded him in death in 1980. He married Mildred Arnold September 15, 1984.

Landrum was a member of First Baptist Church of Friona; and was a recent docent of the Sterquell Collection in Amarillo. He was a past president of the board of directors of Friona Credit Union, and of the Friona Evening Lions. He was a businessman in Friona for a number of years, owning a grocery store, freezer plant, movie theaters, and the Coldwater Cattle Co. farm at various times.

In the early 1950s, Landrum designed and built a "Windmobile," using bicycle and automobile parts, and sailed it, along with two friends, from Friona to Amarillo. Landrum received world-wide

recognition for the feat, having articles published about his contraption and his sailing feat all over the country, as well as in Popular Mechanics magazine.

Survivors include his wife, Mildred of the home; one daughter, Jinni Konis of Amarillo; one brother, Joel Landrum of Albuquerque, N.M.; and two sisters, Marie Scarborough of Clifton, Arizona and Dorothy Chesnut of Merced, California.

Six grandchildren survive: Kelly Konis and Jade Konis Craven, Brian Landrum, Ben Landrum, Jeff Landrum and Sam Landrum.

Also surviving are nine great grandchildren and three step-sons, Tony Arnold of San Antonio; Brad Arnold of Hereford and Gary Arnold of Amarillo.

He was preceded in death by his first wife Rosella in 1980; a daughter, Margaret Rose in 1958, and a son, Joel Randolph Landrum in 1989.

## Letter To The Editor

(Editor's note: The following letter is being reprinted for its timely interest following the Midwest floods. It was included in First Baptist Church's mail-out bulletin this week.)

Dear Richard:

I wanted to write and let you and your folks know what we did with the flood relief money you gave and an update on how things are going here. You've probably heard by now, we've had a second flood since the original one back during the summer. The rivers had dropped down for about a week so that workers had cleaned streets off that were buried under water and the river front street in St. Louis was clean one day when the rains started all over again. Because the water had not receded completely, the rivers swelled once again and flowed over. Almost all of the broken levees had not been dry enough to allow workers to begin to repair them, so the water just rushed back into spaces where "hope" had started to return. Now, many of those places are back under water. The weathermen tell us that we'll see some drying out, but the rainy season is fast approaching us and many town leaders are telling their constituents not to expect any relief until next summer. How's that?

We debated about what would be the best way to divide your gift up and came to the conclusion to divide it into two parts--that way it would benefit at least two parties. Half was given to a man who was flooded out for nine weeks, most of that without pay--his car was stuck in the flood water and he was unable to drive to work. The other was donated to the First Baptist Church of Fenton, Missouri, whose church suffered extensive damage in the latest round of floods. They had been attempting to relocate to better property when they lost their pastor due to his wife's illness and the next week the water devastated the buildings--as we understand it, they were not eligible for flood insurance.

We hope we have your blessings and have done what you intended for us to do. Please continue to pray for us and all those who are trying to get help and just now finding out what government "red-tape" is all about. God bless all of you!!


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

# HCC Women's Center Provides New Dimension In Cancer Care

The Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center officially opened in September a second floor clinic suite to house the expanded programs in breast and cervical screening for women.

The newly remodeled area includes three exam rooms, two mammography rooms, a patient consultation room, patients library, medical records area, film processing, lab and reception area. This area also provides more convenience to the patients through direct access by elevator from the underground parking garage or direct access from the back parking lot.

The Cancer Center is pleased to announce the addition of cervical cancer screening to the current breast cancer screening program. The center has received a grant from the Texas Department of Health Breast and Cervical Cancer Control Program to provide these services for women who are eligible and meet financial guidelines. These services are also available for women who select individual or insurance as a method of payment.

Our professional staff for this program includes: Roseann Wells, R.N., B.S.N., program director; Larry Puls, M.D., medical director for gynecologic oncology; Robert Hays, M.D., medical director for breast cancer screening; and Daniel Epley, M.D., radiology director for mammography.

Services that are included are a clinical breast exam, abdominal exam, pelvic exam, pap smear and mammogram. Breast self-exam and vulva self-exam instructions will be given. The R.N., B.S.N., professionals administering these exams have received comprehensive

training at the University of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Prevention and Detection Program. The mammography program is accredited by the American College of Radiology.

This program adds a new dimension to the current mobile mammography program, co-sponsored by High Plains Baptist Hospital. The cooperative program is currently in its fifth year of operation. With two mobile van units, clinics are scheduled five days per week in a variety of outreach sites throughout the Panhandle.

The major goal of the program is early detection of breast cancer accomplished through screening clinics and breast health awareness education. In addition to support from HCC, HPBH and the Texas Department of Health, the program has received grant funding and volunteers from the Junior League of Amarillo.

The "Race for the Cure," sponsored by the HCC Circle of Friends and the Susan G. Komen Foundation is the major event dedicated to raising funds for the programs. To schedule the mobile unit in your town or work place site, please call 1-800-377-4673 or 359-HOPE.

### Give Your Investment Program Time To Work

With more than 6,000 companies publicly traded in this country, it seems that professional money managers might find it difficult to separate the wheat from the chaff. Some of the most consistent mutual-fund managers avoid that problem by limiting their scope to companies that meet strict and demanding criteria.

One criterion for securities bought for long-term growth and income, for example, is to buy without exception companies that have increased their dividends in each of the past ten years. When a company fails to increase its annual dividend, it is sold.

One mutual fund that subscribes to this policy regards predictable dividends as a measure of a company's success. Rising dividends indicate rising earnings and a company that cares about its shareholders. High dividend return typically means less risk.

Another top-performing fund is even more selective in picking stocks. Its managers are restricted to those that represent the highest level of prudence in equity investing. These managers strive to buy quality companies when the price of the stock is temporarily down. It often takes several years for the market to respond to these stocks, so the fund adheres to a long-term, buy-and-hold strategy.

Over the past five years, the

portfolio turnover of this fund has been one-eighth of that of growth-and-income funds as a whole, according to Mutual Fund News Service. Since its inception in 1952, the fund has never fallen as much as the market in any recession. The quality of the portfolio serves as a defense in down markets, but the portfolio also prospers in up markets and has produced a total return of more than 400 per cent over the past ten years.

Other professional money managers impose tight restrictions on investment choices by mathematically rating securities as possible buys. One money management group categorizes all securities into five major risk/reward groups. By purchasing securities from three of the groups, the choices are narrowed down to about 400 securities. Any stock that falls below a two rating is sold as quickly as possible. This system is unemotional. It doesn't panic when the market falls or become euphoric when the market rises.

There are many theories on how to manage money, but the most successful professional money managers adopt a program that works well for them, then stick with it. Although most long-term programs stress quality, managers often differ among themselves on its definition. One thing upon which they all seem to agree, however, is that once a program is adopted, you must have the discipline to give it time to work.
