## Rotary Members Hear of Progress On New Road

Nineteen Rotarians heard A. W. Pope, resident engineer for the highway department, tell of the progress of the new highway construction east of town, at the regular weekly luncheon of the club at the Kerr Hotel Wednesday noon.

Mr. Pope said work was progressing on schedule on the strip of new road on Highway 90 east of town. The bridge crossing Sanderson canyon will be widened to 26 feet roadway and the overpass and straightening of the highway is being carried on at the same time.

Finances will be made available soon for the continuance of the project to the airport about sixteen miles east of Sanderson, Mr. Pope said. Work will begin soon on the Pecos County end of the highway north to Fort Stockton, he said.

President Jack Hayre talked to the members on the Government insurance plan, outlining the various types of policies that ex-servicemen may procure.

## Graveside Services For Eleuterio Estale Thursday Evening

Estale was shot to death early last Thursday morning on the Paint Mare ranch north of Dryden when he resisted arrest by a posse of officers headed by Sheriff Jim Nance, of Terrell County. The man had been wanted by Terrell County officers since October of 1945 after the fatal shooting of 14-year-old Francisca Hernandez. The body of the slain man was brought to Sanderson by an ambulance from the Sudduth Company.

## El Paso Boy Killed By Lightning Of Former Residents

Sammy McCain, age 13, of El Paso, was killed by lightning last Tuesday evening at sunset as he sheltered from a shower with his back to a tall Spanish dagger plant. When the boy failed to return to camp for supper, a search was made and his body was found lying face down in thorny lechugilla, his feet practically against the dagger plant. New heavy shoes were ripped by the force of the bolt of lightning.

Sammy's father, Buck McCain, died in 1939 and he had been living in El Paso with his mother and stepfather, Mr. and Mrs. O. Nichols. Mr. McCain was a former resident of Terrell County, having lived in the Dryden community.

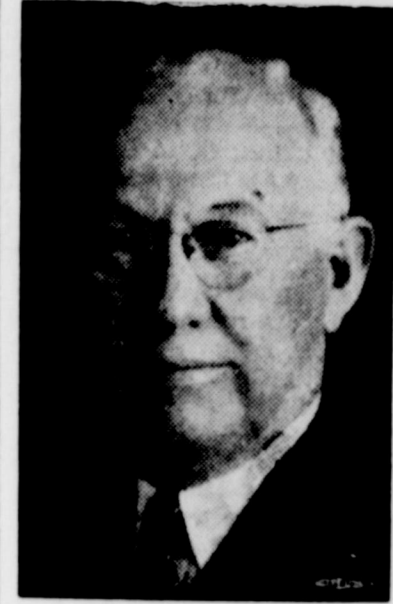

## Ex-Congressman To Take Oath as Judge On August First

Rep. R. Ewing Thomason of the 16th Congressional District, has announced that his resignation from that office becomes effective August 1 when he will take the oath of office as Federal Judge of West Texas.

Thomason has served the district as representative to Congress since 1930. He has won the admiration of voters throughout the district and has kept close contact with the needs of his constituents and the area he served.

The place vacated by the resignation will be filled at the special election on August 23. Several candidates have announced for the post.

## Keeps Promise

Congressman Thomason made a promise 17 years ago in his first campaign for that office that he fulfilled as one of his last official acts in Washington before returning to his home in El Paso. He wrote as follows:

"In my first race for Congress in 1930 Stanton was in the district and when I spoke there I found I had an active supporter in the person of a young lawyer by the name of Bob Hamilton. He told me he had a very fine baby boy at his home whom he wanted me to meet. I accepted his invitation and was introduced to Mrs. Hamilton and their son, Bill. I told them that if they would keep me in Congress until their boy was old enough to go to West Point I would see to it that he got an appointment. They kept their promise and I am keeping mine for as one of my last official acts before I resign from Congress, I have appointed Bill Hamilton as principal to West Point for next year."

Bill Hamilton, who is 17 years old, is a 1947 graduate of Midland High School. He will attend the University of Texas in the fall and will enter West Point in the fall of 1948.

They will return to Crockett Saturday, July 26, if their car, cash and constitutions hold out over the 1,500 mile journey and seven-day trip.

"See Texas First and Make Many Friends" is the objective of the girls who are making their first trip camp. They were continuing that plan here Wednesday and were feeling fine and having the time of their lives. The Scouts are members of the Senior and Intermediate Troops at Crockett.

### Parents Warned to Guard Against Summer Complaint

Austin, July 24—This is the season when dysentery, diarrhea and "summer complaint" are most prevalent throughout the state, and Dr. Geo. W. Cox, the state health officer, has issued a warning to parents of young children regarding the prevention of these diseases.

"The chief causes of these intestinal diseases are impure milk, water and food allowing a child to become overheated; using too much sugar and cream in the diet; and under- or over-feeding," Dr. Cox said. "All foods should be fresh and clean, and left-overs should be properly refrigerated to prevent spoilage."

Dr. Cox said definitely that when a feeding formula for infants is used, it should be prescribed by a physician and then prepared with extreme care, especially in regard to cleanliness and refrigeration. Babies should be fed at regular intervals and on a definite schedule. Their stomach and bowels can become easily upset if they are fed haphazardly or whenever they happen to be fretful or restless.

Dr. Cox declared that with dysentery, as with many other diseases, the fly is an agent of transmission, and every home should be well-screened and free of flies.

"If diarrhea or dysentery develops, consult a physician at once," Dr. Cox advised. "This so-called 'summer complaint' can become very serious menace to your baby's health, if not an actual threat to his life."

### Well-Known Railroad Man Succumbs To Injuries in Freight Train Collision Saturday

#### W. P. WESTFALL KILLED IN CRASH

W. P. Westfall, brakeman on the east-bound freight, was instantly killed and Ruble Clark, engineer, died Sunday after a head-on collision with another freight train eight miles west of Valentine Saturday morning.

Westfall, 41 years old, came to El Paso in 1944 from Fairmont, W. Va. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Dorothy Westfall; a daughter, Pauletta, 14, and two sons, Paul, 18, and Dean, 20 months.

Walter C. Morris, engineer of the westbound train is in a Marfa hospital with internal injuries incurred when he jumped from the train. Fireman B. T. Harris, on the same locomotive, jumped and was uninjured.

Rail traffic was delayed several hours while wrecking crews from Sanderson and El Paso cleared the tracks and laid a "shu-fly" by-passing the two locomotives and several cars piled on the right-of-way.

### Highway Department Activities Reviewed

Austin, July 23—Reviewing the activities of the Texas Highway Department now entering its 30th year as the state's road building agency, Commission Chairman John S. Redditt reported paved mileage on the state system had more than quadrupled since it was first accurately measured in 1929.

The endless struggle to build new roads as fast as traffic demand increased has showed the 1929 paved mileage of 6,061 up to 25,734 miles on July 1, with more being added every day.

"This still isn't enough," Redditt declared. "The blight of congestion and hazards to safety on many sections of these paved roads render them inadequate to handle the heavy traffic using them."

He expressed confidence that the commission's recent expanded policy for building farm to market roads on a cooperative basis with counties together with the current federal aid program, would result in substantial improvements to the states farm transportation problem.

The total investment in the state road network stood at \$934,197,811.55 on July 1, Redditt announced. This includes all expenditures made under the supervision of the Texas Highway Department since it was created thirty years ago.

"It has been a good investment," he said. "I doubt if any other similar expenditure of public funds has done so much good for so many people."

The chairman paid tribute to the thousands of employees who had built the organization into one of the top road building agencies of the nation. "Of the 7,663 employees on the payroll today, 2,278 have been with us for ten years or more, while 100 have served the department 25 years or more. Only one has completed 30 years of service, but two others are approaching the 30 year mark."

"This organization has made it possible for Texas to maintain its place at the top among the states of the nation in carrying out a vast postwar construction program. Today work is progressing on contracts in excess of \$77,000,000, a volume that has never before been attained in the department's history."

Judge R. S. Wilkinson has returned from Harwood, Texas, where he spent last week with his brother, W. L. Wilkinson, who has been very ill. Mr. Wilkinson's condition is much improved.

Ruble Shalor Clark, 52-year-old engineer injured in a head-on collision eight miles east of Valentine Saturday at 4:30 a. m. died of his injuries at 7 a. m. Sunday in a Marfa hospital.

Funeral services were held at 6 p. m. Tuesday in the First Baptist Church in Del Rio. Rev. O. Morris, pastor of the church officiated and he was assisted by Rev. Harold S. Goodenough, pastor of the First Methodist Church under the direction of the Doran Funeral Home.

Clark was born June 16, 1895, in Sonora. He married Johnnie Micou of Alpine, September 22, 1920, and they made their home in Del Rio for 20 years. The family moved to El Paso in 1940.

Clark had been employed by the Texas and New Orleans Railroad for more than thirty years.

He was the second victim of the collision, Brakeman W. P. Westfall having been killed outright in the accident.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Johnnie Clark; two sons, Hubert Clark, of Del Rio and Gene Clark, of El Paso; his mother Mrs. W. Y. Slover, of El Paso; four brothers, three aunts, and six nieces and eight nephews.

The brothers are John Clark, of Sanderson, Kyle Slover, of Fort Stockton, Francis Slover, of Sanderson and Floyd Slover, of Alpine.

The aunts are Mesdames Annie Kyle and Lucy Watkins, of Globe, Arizona, and Mrs. J. A. Parker, of Sanderson. Nieces are Virginia McMurray, of Alpine, Ruby Horgan, of Long Beach, Marion Hudspeth, of Los Angeles, Corine McCabe, of Los Angeles, Rosa Mae Clark Robins, of Sanderson and Jackie Slover, of Sanderson.

### Elections Set For August 23 Promise Heavy Poll Here

The special election to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Rep. R. E. Thomason, of El Paso, of the 16th District, has been set to coincide with the constitutional amendment election on August 23. This promises to aid in getting more voters to the polls for the amendment proposition, which is designed to give state-supported colleges and universities a long-range \$60,000,000 building program.

In the 9th Congressional District a vacancy in congress created by the death of Rep. J. J. Mansfield, veteran lawmaker from Columbus, will be filled by the voters on the same day.

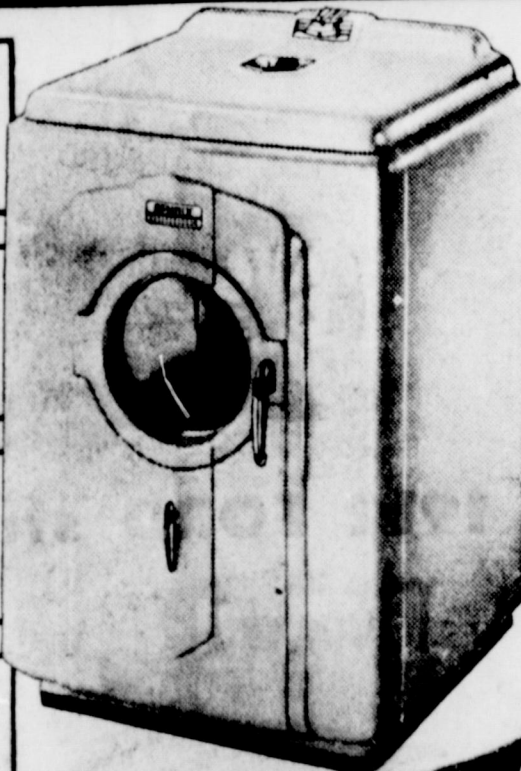

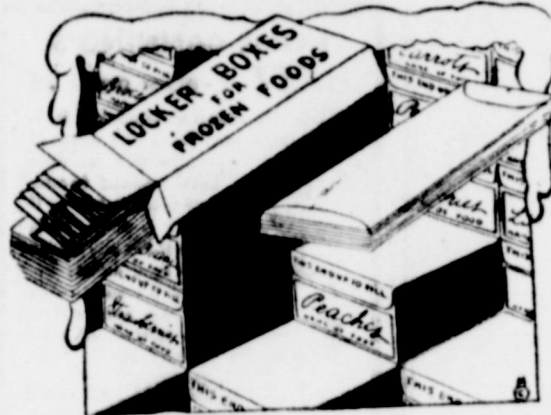

In writing to Miss Robbins, Mrs. Carreon said that she ordered the shoes made and they came with the wooden soles and plastic straps instead of the customary leather. The fan is a crude imitation of our sandalwood. She mentioned that it was taking a long time to establish peace and order even in that very small country. She mentioned the "Huks", under the leadership of a man called Tarnie, who is very fanatical and has communistic ideas, giving a lot of trouble. The "Huks" are bandits, peasants who have

been maltreated by their landlords, and guerillas who have not been recognized by the government. She said the government was in a dilemma since it could not afford to take too drastic measures with its own people as they attempt to set up the new government after their independence has been granted.

She said, "I miss your flag that has hovered over us for almost fifty years but I believe you will always be our friend because we are so small and America is always helpful." Their flag has the same colors as ours with the same meaning. The sun with the eight rays is symbolic of the east and the first eight provinces which started the fight for Philippine independence. The three stars are the three islands — Luzon, Visayas and Mindanao.

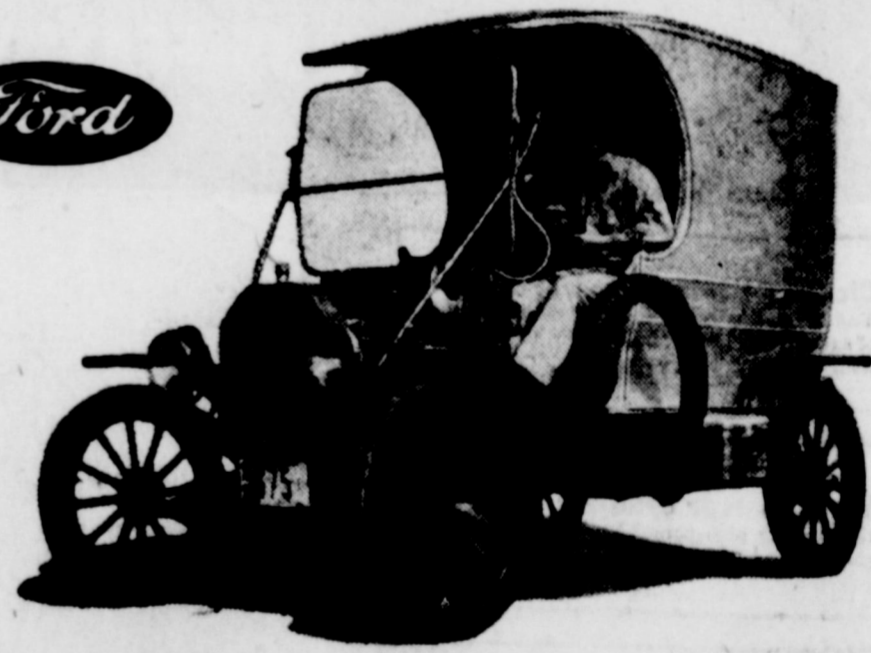
