

To can tomatoes whole, prepare them as above, being careful not to cut into the seed pod when removing the core. Pack into hot jars as closely as possible without crushing. Add one tesspoon sait to each quart, and cover with hot tomato juice or puree. Process 35 minutes in bet water bath.

Beat the Boys and the Birds to the Cherries



"Cherries are ripe!" When that little schoolroom song is in season, get busy in your kitchen! The robins, or other two-legged depredators answering to such names as "Butch" and "Porky", may consume the luscious crop of the old cherry tree before you can

say, "NEXT WINTER'S PIES!" To can cherries by the cold pack method, wash and stem them. Pit or leave whole, but prick whole ones with a needle. Pack into hot jars. Cover sour cherries with boiling sirup made of one part sugar and one part water or cherry juice. Cover sweet cherries with sirup containing one-half to one part sugar and one part liquid. Process 20 minutes in hot water bath.

The hot pack method calls for one-half to one cup sugar to each

quart of pitted cherries. Add the sugar to the cherries and let stand one to two hours. Simmer 10 minutes, then pack into hot jars and process 10 minutes in hot water
