### DOUBLE-HEADER ELECTION FOR SATURDAY, AUG. 23

The 16th Congressional District race for Congress is now on the last leg and one of the hottest fights seen in a political contest in many years seems to be looming as seven candidates close their campaign for the election tomorrow.

Names appearing on the ballot will be in the following order: Pat Hargrove, Victor B. Gilbert, Ord Gary, Louis A. Fall, Woodrow Wilson Bean, James W. Metcalfe and Ken Regan.

Most of these candidates are practically unknown locally, however, some have visited Sanderson since the campaign got under way — others have been in politics for a number of years and are known from past campaigns.

Ken Regan, of Pecos, for a number of years State Senator, is classed as one of the best-known of the field of candidates.

Ord Gary, county commissioner in his home county at El Paso, is apparently a close contender because of his mature judgment and experience in public life.

Woodrow Wilson Bean, another El Pasoan, is making a very strong bid for the Washington assignment.

James W. Metcalfe, former Border Patrolman, is well-known in this section of the country but has not been in politics before entering this contest.

A large vote is predicted for the election tomorrow since the School Amendment proposition is an added attraction to the double-bill ticket for the voters to make use of their poll taxes.

Absentee voting in the county was light up to Wednesday night.

#### INDICTMENTS CHARGE THEFT, EMBEZZLEMENT

Five persons were indicted by the Terrell County Grand Jury in regular session last Friday and Saturday, August 15 and 16, and a report of investigation recommending no bill of indictment was returned in the matter of the homicide of Euterio Z. Estale. Estale was slain when he resisted arrest and returned fire at officers on their command to surrender to arrest.

Three Latin-American youths, who gave their residence as Alpine, were indicted on charges of hijacking. Their arrest followed a holdup in which George H. Stevenson, returning from work on the T&N O, was robbed of his suitcase and several items of clothing. One of the boys, Billy Hernandez was released on bond and Lauro F. Escareno and Cipriano Trevino, Jr., are being held in the Terrell County jail. The alleged holdup was staged on the night of August 14.

L. M. Shadoan was charged with embezzlement and theft after a considerable amount of money and an automobile was reported missing from the Robertson Garage and Auto Parts business where Shadoan was employed as bookkeeper. Shadoan was arrested in Del Rio and was returned to the Terrell County jail by Sheriff Jim Nance.

Luciano Trevino, Jr., was billed for theft of a truck. The truck was allegedly stolen from Steve Stumberg who ranches west of Sanderson, on June 28.

### Gen. Wainwright To Retire After Colorful Career

Fort Sam Houston, Texas. — General Jonathan M. Wainwright, Fourth Army Commander, will be honored at formal ceremonies here August 31, the General's last day of duty on the active list of the army. The hero of Bataan and Iwo Jima retires to civilian life after more than forty-five years of service and will make his home in San Antonio.

Troops from Fort Sam Houston and Camp Hood will stage a parade and review at 3 o'clock the afternoon of August 31 and a contingent of 10th Air Force planes will join in a salute to General Wainwright as they fly low before the reviewing stand on Arthur McArthur Field. Distinguished military and civilian leaders from the five-state Fourth Army area will participate in the ceremonies.

The public is invited to attend the parade and review and plans are being made to accommodate the record crowd that is expected to assemble to pay their respects to the popular World War II hero.

### Major Recreational Facilities Planned By Alpine C of C

Major objectives of the Alpine Chamber of Commerce, according to Frank Mason, newly-elected manager, include creation of an artificial lake, a golf course and other recreational facilities. "People who spend their vacations here want some kind of recreation," observed Mason. The thriving tourist traffic in that area is not a negligible item.

Five tentative sites for the lake project have been selected. The lake is planned to provide swimming, fishing and other water sports, in addition to supplementing the Alpine water supply. At present, Alpine gets its water supply from wells which have an abundant supply at a 600-foot depth but a lake would supply gravity flow and would eliminate a certain amount of pumping expense.

### Townsend Named U. S. Commissioner For Big Bend Park

ALPINE, August 20—Everett E. Townsend, former Texas Ranger and ex-sheriff of Brewster County, has been appointed U. S. Commissioner for the Big Bend Park.

Townsend, appointed to the post by Federal Judge R. E. Thomason and Ben Rice, said here Thursday afternoon he did not know when he'll take the oath of office.

"Judge Thomason is busy in court at Del Rio," Townsend said, "and I want him to administer the oath of office."

Known as the "Father of the Big Bend Park," Townsend is credited with originating the move to get the area designated as a national park.

Elected to the Texas Legislature in 1933, Townsend immediately went to work on his plan. He and Rep. R. M. Wagstaff, Abilene, introduced the first park bill in the legislature which called for 15 sections of land along the Rio Grande in the lower Big Bend to be known as the Texas State Canyons Park.

During the four years he served in the Legislature he worked tirelessly on plans for enlarging the park.

Townsend was born October 20, 1871, in Colorado County but came to West Texas and Pecos country when he was 19 years old to become a member and officer in a Ranger company. He spent many days riding the Big Bend in search of smugglers, bandits, cattle thieves and other desperados attempting to evade the law.

In 1900 he entered the ranching business and soon was made manager of the 200,000-acre EL Ranch in Pecos County which ran around 14,000 cattle.

He later moved to Alpine and in 1918 was "drafted" to make the successful race for sheriff, in which he served six years. Twice, while serving as sheriff, he was wounded. He declined to seek a fourth term as Brewster County sheriff.

Mr. Townsend is an uncle of Webb Townsend who ranches north of Sanderson on the Fort Stockton road.

### Authority Granted Local Bank To Cash Leave Bonds Sept. 2

The Sanderson State Bank has been authorized by the United States Treasury Department to cash Armed Forces Leave Bonds after September 1. Under no circumstance may registered owners cash their bonds before that date. There is no requirement that the bonds be cashed at that time, however, for they can be cashed any time in the future upon demand and without delay. Unless a veteran is in real need of the money now, the bank and the U. S. Treasury Department recommend that the bonds be kept.

"If the veteran does not care to cash his bonds now, he may keep them until such time as he does desire to cash them and they will continue to draw 2½ per cent interest," according to C. P. Peavy, cashier of the bank.

To facilitate identification, the owners of bonds desiring to cash them should bring their original separation or discharge papers with them when presenting bonds for payment.

Bonds will be redeemed in full face value plus accrued interest.

Contest Winner "Brands" His Prize



A pioneer of the auto industry, hunted throughout the nation in a contest to discover the oldest Chevrolet truck in America, turned up, appropriately, in the possession of a Montana homesteader. The venerable vehicle, vintage of 1918, was still serving Rancher Leslie A. Storey, of Jordan, Mont., whose ranch lies 18 miles from a typical "hemp frontier" town. The award for owning the oldest licensed and operating truck was a new Chevrolet "advance-design" model, which Storey "brands" here with his distinctive Circle-Heart brand. It was presented to him by J. W. Burke, manager of Chevrolet's truck department, as Mrs. Storey and Montana cowgirl Mable Spears (right) look on. Nearly 7,000 old-time Chevrolet trucks were entered in the contest won by this vehicle, which was one of 384 built by the division in 1918, its first year of truck production.

### 'Pursued,' Novel Action Drama, Showing Soon Locally

All the excitement and thrills that made the wild west so reckless and violent at the turn of the century, is vigorously captured in Niven Busch's "Pursued," which co-stars Teresa Wright and Robert Mitchum, and is currently holding forth at the Princess Theatre.

Niven Busch, author of both the original story and the screenplay, has written a dual saga of pioneer days in the old southwest and a long lasting family feud back in the 1890's. Specifically, it relates the stirring plight of Jeb Rand (Robert Mitchum), who is doomed to a life of stark terror and unhappiness by an unseen enemy. It also presents the intrepid romance of Jeb and Thorley Callum (Teresa Wright).

### Need for Nurses Prompts Statewide Training Campaign

With the aim of educating more women for the nursing profession to help relieve the present critical shortage of graduate nurses, the five Baptist hospitals in Texas are this month launching an intensive student nurse recruiting campaign preliminary to the opening for new freshman classes in their schools of nursing in September.

Personal appeals will be issued to women aged 17 to 35 through Baptist churches and Sunday schools over the state, to interest them in preparing for the nursing profession. Speakers will outline to the girls the advantages nursing offers of a well-paid livelihood, position of community prestige and an opportunity to aid suffering humanity, officials said.

"The demand for nurses far exceeds the supply," Andrew Q. Allen, volunteer director for the nurse recruitment campaign, stated. "Unless more young women answer the call and enter nursing, the people of this country will suffer for lack of adequate care in time of sickness. The shortage in civilian hospitals has been acute since the beginning of war and has not been relieved since war's end because of the great number of nurses now required in veterans' hospitals."

The varied fields open to graduate nurses today include hospitals, doctors' offices, industry, public health agencies, government service, nursing school faculties and foreign missionary work. All are in desperate need of more nurses.

The five Baptist hospitals cooperating in the statewide student nurse recruitment campaign and the opening dates of their Nursing School classes are: Henrick Memorial Hospital, Abilene, Sept. 18; Baylor Hospital, Dallas, Sept. 22; Valley Hospital, Harlingen, Sept. 8; Memorial Hospital, Houston, Houston, Sept. 2; Hillcrest Memorial Hospital, Waco, Sept. 18. Interested young women are urged to write to the hospital of their choice.

## Add Variety to Canned Pears

The pear crop seldom seems to fail and may be relied upon by home canners to provide summer fruits for winter tables. To break the monotony of plain canned pears the universally used Ball Blue Book on home canning suggests some tasty variations. Orange pears may be made by using the juice and rind of one-half orange to each quart of sirup. Remove the orange rind before packing the pears into jars. To make cinnamon pears use two or

three tablespoons of "Red Hots" to each quart of sirup, or use stick cinnamon and a few drops of red coloring. Ginger pears are made by using ginger tea (water in which ginger root is boiled) instead of plain water for making sirup. Use pineapple juice instead of water for the sirup to make pineapple pears. For plum pears use tart, red plum juice instead of water for making the sirup. These variations are sure to "hit the spot" with your family
