ECONOMIC HIGHLIGHTS

An informative article in the United States News of October 24 observes that."Billions of dollars, owned by foreigners, are hiding in the United States and in other havens of safety...The idea is developing that, if U.S. taxpayers are to put up money to save Europe, citizens of European countries could make more of a contribution themselves. The result is that officials both here and abroad are searching for ways and means to chase privately owned funds out of hiding."

The exact amount of these foreign holdings isn't known, for the reason that a good deal of the money is really out of sight. But, according to the News, official recods indicate that foreign gold and dollar resources total some \$26,300,000,000. That is a good deal more than the entire anticipated cost of the Marshall Plan for aiding Europe over a four-year period. And that is why Congress, when it gets down to considering the European question at the special session, will undoubtedly take some kind of step to make Europe underwrite a part of whatever relief program it decides

upon. Europe's holdings of foreign dollar balances in the U.S. is about \$9,000,000,000. The distribution of the money

is of interest. It is estimated that if individual foreign assets were to be seized by the governments involved, something like \$2.500,000,000 in securities and \$1,000,000,000 in cash could be raised. Another source of potential money is the Alien Property Custodian, who now has control of property worth about \$500,-000,000 which is held in the name of governments with which we were at war. There would be legal obstacles to overcome in making these resources available, but the job probably could be done, at least in part A more difficult problemwould be to ferret out hidden wealth assets which are held in cash and whose whereabouts is unknown The News refers to one suggestion that has been made for accomplishing this. All present U.S. currency would be declared invalid as of a given date, and new currency would be issued to replace it. Holders of our money, here and abroad, would have to make exchange or take the loss. Inasmuch as the amount of actual U.S. curency in foreign hands is estimated at \$2,000,000,00, the harvest would be great.

The amount of dlollar resources officially known to be held by European countries which woudl share in aid under the Marshall Plan varies greatly. French citizens own some \$500, 000,000 in American investments. Great Britain's dollar assets were reported at \$1,000,000,000 some time ago, but probably have declined sharply since then. The Dutch have more than a bilion counting known assets of all kinds. Belgium is in a similar position. On the other hand, taly and Greece are dead broke or practically so.

The United Nations is a young organization. It was formed about two years ago and now comprises 55 nations. During the past year, it is said, the different divisions have held a total of 1 911 meetings. The chief avowed purposes are to bring peace to the world and to prevent starvation as an aftermath of war. Great sums of money have been used to provide food for peoples that are considered

At first it was thought that 1946 would be the critical year and every effort was made to get people through that year. Now, we are approaching the winter of 1947. Some reports say there will be more hunger this winter than last. From various countries in Europe the reports show no improvement. These countries are not getting to their feet so they can stand up and solve their own problems. And they are not sure what attitude they should take toward the United Nations.

We are also much nearer to another war than we were two years ago, or even one year ago Naturally, then, people have a right to ask why the efforts of the United Nations do not meet with greater success. It would seem there is enough power and strength in 55 nations to help this muddled world get somewhere. And surely enough money has been spent to help those hungry nations to begin to feed

The answer is not hard to find. The United Nations has not demonstrated real unity of purpose. Even the leaders among the 55 nations have worked at cross purposes. Each nation has been intent upon achieving certain objectives of its own. This is as true of the "Big Four" as it is of the smaller nations. Therefore, despite the 1,911 meetings and the hundreds of milions of dollars spent, the situation has grown worse rather than better.

The most I can get out of this present situation is an important lesson for our own country. What is the aplication? In America we have found a good measure of unity historically speaking. Though we are made up of states and other kinds of groups we have shown appreciaation for the same fundamen-

What is true of the United Nations as a whole is true of nations individually. If we are going to continue to be a prosperous and healthy republic, we too must have unity of purpose. Workers, managers, industralists, farmers, educators - we must all keep our purposes controlled in the direction of full unity. If one group wants to destroy the capitalist, and another wants to destroy labor unions, these are at cross pur-

If one group wants to eliminate private ownership of property, and another group want to preserve Constitutional government these also are working at cross purposes. If we have everybody working at cross purposes, then conditions in our country will grow worse rather than better. It is imperative that the entire nation be united on fundamentals, t is necessary that all groups work for certain goals.

Canned Berries Need Little or No Sugar



go into jars without sugar at all and keep perfectly for later use. If you want to be famous for delicious blueherry or huckleberry muffins, canning without sugar is preferred. To can blueberries or buckleberries for use in muffins, place two or three quarts of cleaned berries in a square of cheesecloth, Gather up the corners of the cloth and allow the berries to dip into boiling water until spots appear on the cloth. Then dip quickly in and out of cold water. Pack into hot Ball jars. Add neither sugar nor liquid.
