T. R. KUYKENDALL, LOCAL LAWYER, AND LONG-TIME RESIDENT, BURIED SUNDAY

Thomas Richard Kuykendall, 75, of Sanderson, died in a San Antonio hospital last Friday morning after a lingering illness.

He was the son of the late William and Kate Byrne Kuykendall and great grandson of Capt. Abner Kuykendall who was captain of the Militia under Stephen F. Austin and came to Texas in 1821 with Austin's first colony.

Mr. Kuykendall was born in Refugio and spent his early years in Tilden, Texas. He was granted a license to practice law in 1893.

He married Miss Mamie Kerr, of Campbellton, Texas, in 1898.

Mr. and Mrs. Kuykendall came to Sanderson in 1902 when Mr. Kuykendall was employed by his brother-in-law, the late Joe Kerr, as bookkeeper and office man for the mercantile business of Messrs. Kerr and Hancock.

In 1907 after the Sanderson State Bank was organized, Mr. Kuykendall was made cashier and held that position for fifteen years. He moved to El Paso in 1922 and entered the insurance business, also engaging in the active practice of law. When Mrs. Kuykendall died in 1937, he returned to Sanderson, actively practicing law and selling insurance until the time of his last illness and death.

Mr. Kuykendall was a devout Catholic throughout his life. He was a fourth degree Knight of Columbus, El Paso Council; a life member of the Texas Society of the Sons of the American Revolution; and a member of the Sanderson Rotary Club.

Survivors include two brothers and four sisters.

Rosary was recited at Zizik-Kearns Funeral Home in San Antonio Saturday evening. The body was taken to Campbellton where services were conducted from the Sacred Heart Church Sunday morning. Rev. Thomas H. Morrissey officiated with burial in the Campbellton cemetery.

Pal bearers were eight nephews; Joe, Robert, Campbell, Bernard, James and Edward, of Sanderson, Robert Mills and D. M. Kuykendall.

County Taxpayers Pay Six Per Cent During October

Terrell County taxpayers took advantage of the 3 per cent tax deduction by paying their taxes during the month of October. \$21,059.08 was paid on the County ad valorem tax, \$36,562.20 on District school taxes and \$20,067.28 on the State tax. There are 160 paid poll taxes.

There was to be paid at the beginning of the tax term \$31,248.37 County ad valorem tax, \$57,503.85 District school taxes and \$29,677.12 State taxes. Two per cent deduction was available during the month of November and a 1 per cent deduction remain during December.

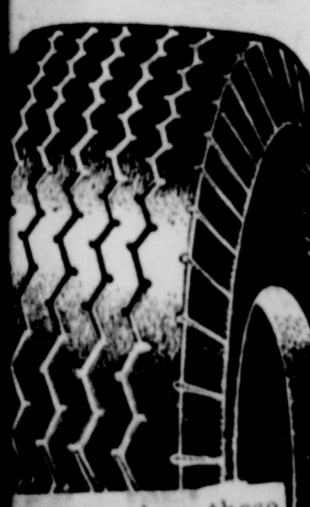

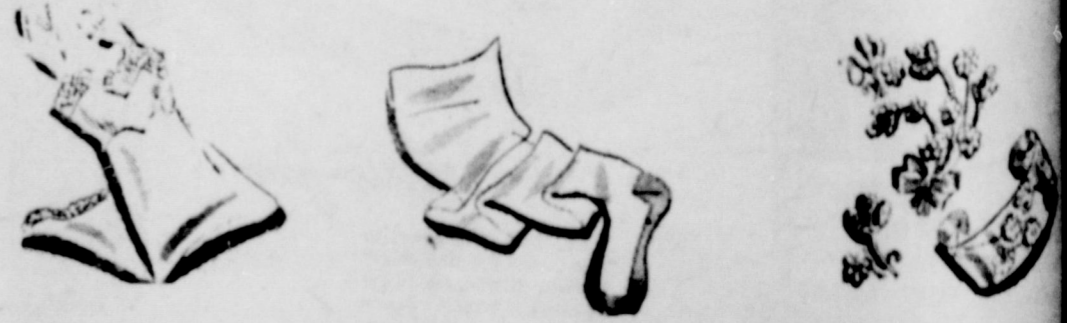
