

## **KAISER PREDICTS 300,000 OUTPUT** FOR NEXT YEAR

WILLOW RUN, Mich., Dec. 15, -The Kaiser-Frazer Corp. has raced past the production milestone of 1000 cars a day.

"During 1947 the company kept boosting output to roll out approximately 145,000 units, making it the world's fourth largest manufacturer of passenger cars., according to Edgar F. Kaiser, vice-president and general

Earnings for 1947 will approach the \$19,000,000 figure and about cancel out the expenses of the tool-up year. Achievements in manufacturing and sales this year have turned Kaiser-Frazer into a profitable company," he said. Starting-up costs had caused it to show a \$19,284,000 loss in \$1946.

The huge Willow Run plant is being geared up to turn out more than 1,500 cars a day by next summer. The next new model will be a convertible to be produced in mid-1948.

The company at the same time is advancing plans to open an assembly plant in Long Beach, western markets, he said

- I pound cooked beef 1 quart cider
- shank, chuck, or neck meat
- 2 teaspoons salt I cup meat stock 2 teaspoons nutmea 1/2 pound suet 2 teaspoons cloves
- 4 pounds apples 1/2 pound currants
- 3 teaspoons cinnamor pound seeded raisins 5 tablespoons lemon juice

Pare, core, and chop apples. Chop together currants and raisins. Add apples, sugar, cider, and meat stock. Cook about 5 minutes. Grind meat and suet. Add with seasonings to apple mixture. Simmer I hour, stirring frequently to prevent burning. Add lemon juice.

This mincemeat may be made ahead of time and canned for use throughout the holiday season. (Yield: 4 quarts)




