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## ANNUAL RED CROSS DRIVE OPENS MARCH 1

According to Mrs. J. W. McKee, Terrell County Red Cross chairman, the annual Red Cross drive for funds will be launched in this county March 1. Letters to be mailed to all prospective donors are being prepared and personal contacts will be made in some instances. The national quota is \$500 and a similar amount is the local quota. For the first six months of the year, \$265 was spent locally and a similar amount will have been spent when the books are closed February 29.

Of the thirteen major disasters listed as receiving aid from the Red Cross last year the Texas City fire and explosion and the Oklahoma-Texas tornadoes of April and May rank second and third in order of expenditures, \$1,361,915 being received by the former and \$1,322,783 by the latter. Of the nation-wide total of more than \$11,000,000 spent for relief Texas received more than one-seventh of the amount.

Mrs. McKee urges everyone to make plans to make a generous contribution to the Red Cross. While no major disasters visited this area last year, frequent demands are made on the local chapter for assistance, particularly by veterans trying to get to jobs and by transients who are overtaken by various and sundry misfortunes in this area and a little assistance will enable them to proceed on their journey.

## Examinations and Training Schools For Highway Patrol

According to Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director, Department of Public Safety, Austin, Texas, the first recruit training school of the Texas Highway Department Patrol as authorized by the last legislature, has now been successfully completed and effective March 1, a large class of recruit patrolmen will be assigned to their stations.

Charles James Marek, Jr., will be located in Alpine with G. A. Rushing, patrolman now on duty in this area. The second recruit training school has already been filled with applicants who passed the examination. It will begin April 1 at Camp Mabry.

Two more recruit schools for fifty or more men in each examination are planned for August 1 and December 1. Examinations for these positions will be given at an early date at the district offices of the Texas Highway Patrol. Anyone interested in taking the examination is requested to write or contact Chief W. J. Elliott, Texas Highway Patrol, Austin.

Assured that the coliseum will be completed in time, the group already is making plans for the exposition's first stock show to be held early in 1949.

The Spring Edition of the Texas Highway Department's official travel maps is being released for public distribution. State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer has announced.

The new four-color map incorporates all changes in the state road system through December occasioned by the Department's vast post war road building program.

There is a generous display of color pictures representing a cross section of the state's industrial and recreational assets.

Except for revisions in the road system and the new pictures, the edition is similar to others issued since the war which have been acclaimed among the best of the state road maps published throughout the nation.

Standard highway warning and directional signs are reproduced on the map to familiarize drivers with road markers.

Included also is a small scale map of the United States showing all state capitals and major federal highways.

Copies of the new spring edition are available to the traveling public at the Highway Department's main office in Austin, its twenty-five district offices throughout the state, and at its nine information bureaus operated at ports of entry into Texas.

## El Paso To Lower Railroad Tracks Through Town

The border city of El Paso is about to have its face changed.

In one of the most important municipal projects in the Southwest since the war, El Paso will lower its railroad track system through the heart of the city to eliminate traffic congestion, a headache for the people of the far West Texas community for forty years.

The project will involve an expenditure of \$5,500,000—of which the city of El Paso will pay \$2,000,000; the state highway department \$1,500,000; and the railroads involved approximately \$2,000,000. The tracks of the SP and the T&N railroads are involved, and those of the T&P to a limited extent.

The track depression project and relocation of the railroad yards comprise only a portion of the project.

Later an overpass of considerable dimension is planned.

The double track ground level systems at El Paso have for many years separated the business and hotel sections from the residential sections. With many extremely long trains passing through the city at all hours of the day and night, the congestion was a city traffic nightmare.

The track depression will accommodate three tracks and the other trackage will be torn up and a deluxe highway substituted.

Completion of the project by 1950 is contemplated.

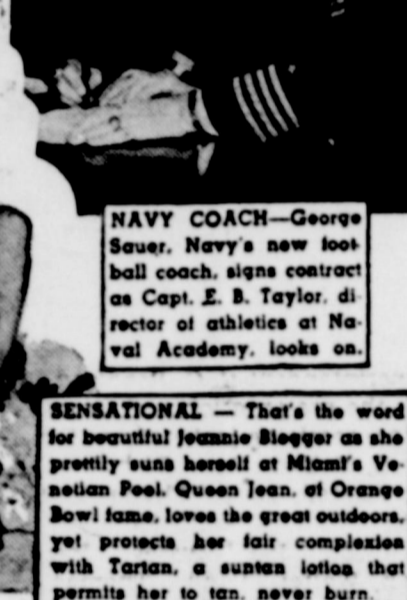

LIVE LONG AND LIKE IT

Some folks are old at sixty; others are mentally and physically alert at eighty. The number of years one has lived may not be a true index to one's physical condition. Actually, the length of a person's life span is influenced by the condition of his arteries, often due to avoidable infections, improper diet, and possibly worry and strain to a certain extent, preventable, said Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Many of the problems connected with the hygiene of old age are due to lowered mental power. Therefore, a cheerful and optimistic attitude toward the aged, especially during sickness, is essential to their well-being. Old people regard their condition as far less serious when they can be fully dressed and out of bed. When they can be up the excretory organs function more satisfactorily, too. However, when an elderly person complains of being overtired, or otherwise not physically fit, a day of rest in bed is advisable. By providing light and easily digested food and applying warmth to the body of an aged

person, he is often tided over a mild or threatened illness. Special attention should be paid also to proper clothing, diet and exercise of the elderly. With reasonable attention to certain well-defined and easily followed principles of personal hygiene

It is too early to draw large conclusions from this refusal at Washington. The Court appears merely to have directed the litigant to take her case first to the courts of Oklahoma.

The issue of segregation, the court said, was not before it. That does not foreshadow the position of the present court on segregation. Due to the Rooseveltian method by which the members of the present court were selected it is not possible to say whether the present court will honor precedents or overrule them.

At least the court has restricted the issue to matter in hand. It has not attempted to set up a social policy by virtue of its power of decision. It is conceivable, surely, that the decision of the court will be merely that "equal" means "equal" and not

"identical". Thus far the has held that equal opportunity for black and white necessitate equality of education in fields where there is genuine demand for education by blacks. Thus the court has not ruled that equal opportunities have identical in all respects.

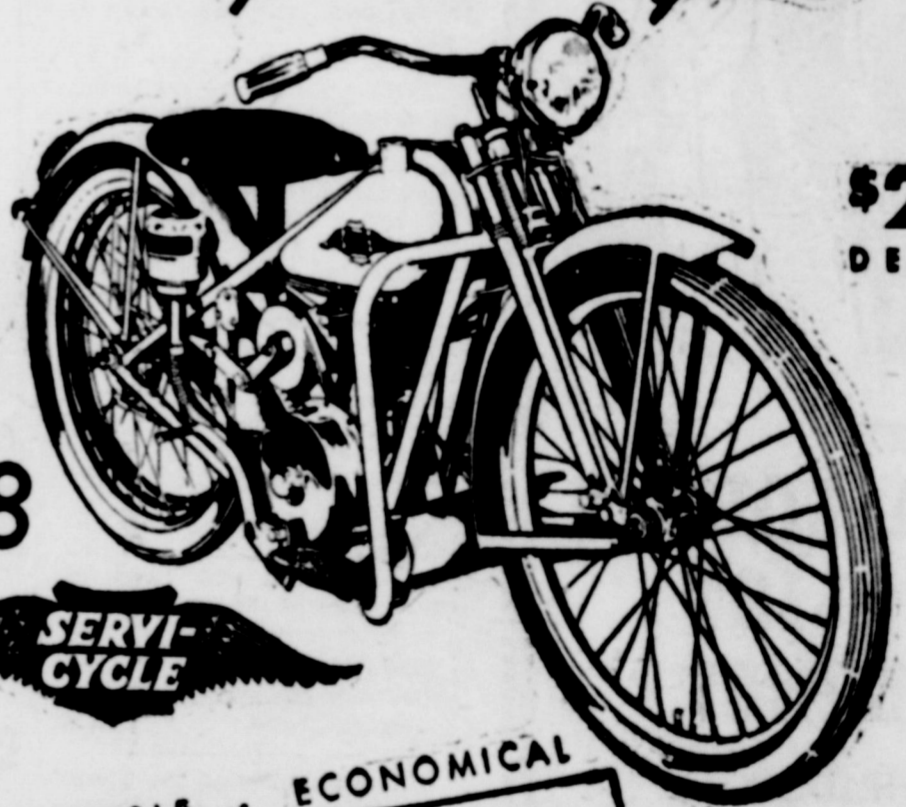

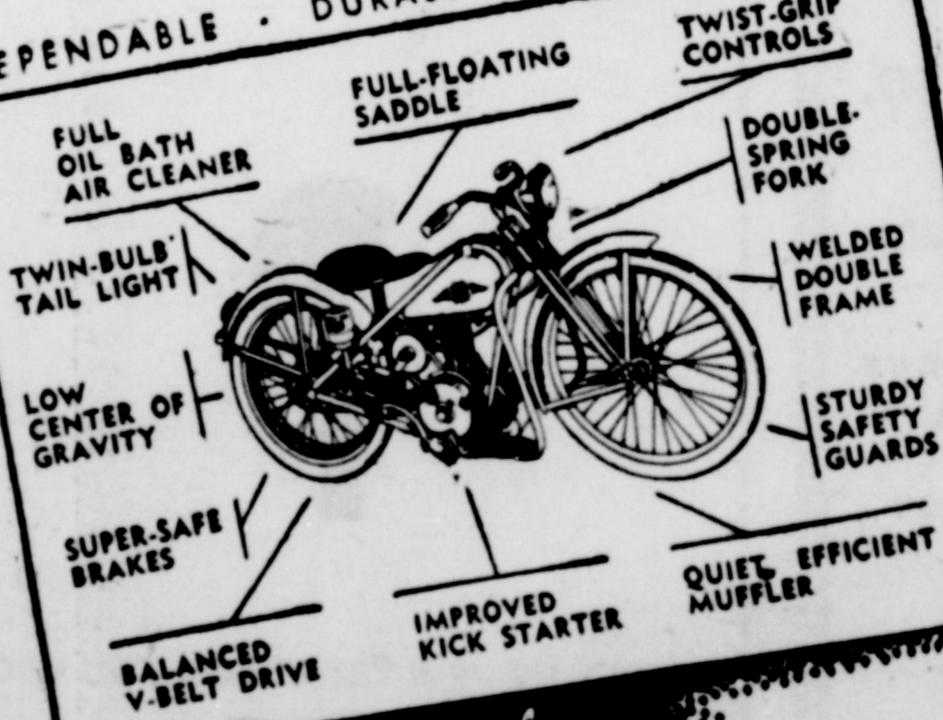
