Melt 2 tbsp. drippings and brown 34 1b. ground beef. Add 1 large onion, 1 diced green pepper and 14 lb. sliced mushrooms. Cook over medium flame for 5 mins. Then add I stalk celery, diced, I can kidney beans, 2 cups tomatoes, 2 isp. chili powder, salt, pepper. Cover and bring to a boil. Then turn the flame to simmer point and cook 30 mins. Serves 6.

Butter or chocolate must be heated slowly and carefully else the butter will separate and chocolate will thicken and lose moisture. The keep-warm or melting heat of your simmer burner is ideal because its temperature goes as low as 125°-150°.

Fish is usually baked at moder-Ate temperature of 350°, or higher if out thick. Try putting it on a piece of well-oiled cheesecloth for easy removal from the pan after roasting. Less fatty types of fish can be browned after oven-roasting by slipping them under the broiler for a few minutes.

Leftover chopped turkey or chicken combined with vegetables, folded into condensed mushroom soup and served over macaroni, spaghetti, or noodles makes a cost saving lunch dish.

Put peach halves in a baking pan. Sprinkle with sugar, dot with butter, bake at 400° for 15 minutes. Serve warm with plain cream.



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

They'e been wrong so often with guesses that backfired that they are hedging their current predictions with a protective fog of "ifs" "ands" and "buts". This has been particularly true in the analyses of turbulence in the commodity exchanges. No one in a responsible position has been willing to offer a really unequivocal opinion on whether basic commodity prices will keep on going down. will stabilize, or will recover strongly and resume their climb into the economic stratosphere.

Business volume, of course, is still at an extreme high and the great bulk of businesses are doing well. However, certain spots of trouble have begun to appear which, while more or less isolated as yet, may have an important long-term effect on the en, tire industrial structure. One of these spots is credit. The United States News recently published a survey of this problem, which pointed that the credit needs of many businesses have turned out to be unexpectedly large. They entered the postwar era with such large resources on hand that it didn't seem wise or necessary to issue securities to raise cash. But higher prices, wages, and the ever-rising cost of physical expansion have eaten into their capital at an alarming rate. They must look to bank loans to carry them on through.

Bank lending, says the News, is now becoming more restrained. Marginal borrowers, espectally, are being discouraged. A bank economist is quoted as saving. "The overall situation of business is quite strong at the moment, but, under present conditions an individual could ose his shirt in 30 days." Bankers are keeping a wary watch on the price and business volume indices. They are advising their customers not to get overextended.
