LAST RITES FOR HIGH STAPP, MARINE CASUALTY

The body of Private Hugh Stapp arrived in Del Rio Tuesday evening and funeral services were held in that city Wednesday afternoon from the Doran Chapel. Rev. Turner, Baptist minister in Comstock, officiated.

Burial was made in Westlawn Cemetery after full military honors including a firing squad, uniformed color guard and pall bearers.

Young Stapp is the first Terrell County serviceman of World War II to be returned from overseas for burial. He enlisted in the Marine Corps February 17, 1942, and was killed in action in the Battle of Guadalcanal in the latter part of that year.

Hugh Stapp, son of Mr. and Mrs. Shannon Stapp, of Pumpville, was born March 27, 1912, in Del Rio. After completing high school work in that city, he attended Sul Ross College. From 1938 until he enlisted in the service he ranched near Dryden. The family also resided near Pandale.

Besides his parents, survivors include four sisters, Mrs. Garland Sprott, of Alpine, Mrs. Herman Chandler, of Dryden, Mrs. Harold Rahn, of Fort Hill, Oklahoma and Mrs. A. C. Askins, of Pumpville.

HUMBLE STAKES LOCATION FOR DEEP WILDCAT

Humble has staked location for a scheduled 12,000 foot wildcat in Terrell County. Its No. 1 J. H. Mitchell will be 1,980 feet from the north, 2,080 feet from the east line of section 24-128 T&SUL 30 miles north of Sanderson.

The test will be 10 to 12 miles south of Phillips No. 1 Ada Price, Pecos County wildcat, which established a new world record in passing 15,004 feet early in 1944 and failed to develop a producer in exploring to 15,279 feet. This depth mark has been exceeded since.

Funeral Services For Mrs. R. M. Gatlin In Del Rio Monday

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon in Del Rio for Mrs. Ada Crunk Gatlin, who died Saturday morning at the home of her son, Homer E. Gatlin, at Dryden. Rev. Harold S. Goodenough, pastor of the First Methodist Church, officiated at the service and burial was in Westlawn Cemetery.

Mrs. Gatlin, who was the widow of R. M. Gatlin, who died January 26, 1946. She was 77 years old and suffered a heart attack prior to her death.

She was born June 23, 1870, in Guadalupe County and had made her home in Del Rio since 1901 until recent months when she has been on her ranch at Dryden with her sons.

Survivors include the two sons, Homer E. and Robert A. Gatlin, of Dryden; two daughters, Mrs. W. H. Kerby, of Austin and Mrs. C. I. Hunn, of Fort Dix, N. J. Also three grandchildren and two sisters.

RETIREMENT OF SCHOOL BONDS TO EFFECT BIG SAVING

The Sanderson School Board in a special meeting Monday, March 15, passed a resolution to ask permission of the holders of school bonds to pay off the last six bonds of the 1930 series in total amount of \$6,000 due in 1970. If permission for the release is given this retirement will save tax payers of Terrell County 5 per cent on \$6,000 for 22 years.

The board will also ask permission to retire the last nine bonds in the 1938 series in total amount of \$4,500. This transaction will effect a saving of interest on this amount at three and three-fourths per cent for ten years.

The retirement of these bonds is from surplus accumulated in interest and sinking funds, numbers one and two respectively, and could not be used for any other purpose until all bonds are retired. There will be sufficient balance in the funds to take care of any emergency that might arise, according to C. G. Bradford, superintendent of the schools.

By an arrangement approved by Supt. A. H. Hughey, El Paso, and President R. M. Hawkins of Sul Ross College, two Sul Ross students are doing intensive observation of teaching in the several Industrial Arts departments of the El Paso city schools this week.

S. T. A. meeting on Friday. Both Sul Ross men have been assigned short reports on the practical arts program as a part of the forum on Laboratory Planning and Improvement. The Sul Ross students will spend some time in the Technical Institute, Bowie High School, Austin High School and El Paso High.

Young Perez, a local resident, is a senior at Sul Ross College and is a member of the graduating class for the current semester.

School Applies For War Surplus Buildings

John Harrison, president of the school board, and C. G. Bradford, superintendent, were in Del Rio Wednesday to apply for purchase of four buildings that are declared surplus at Laughlin Field there.

The buildings are badly needed here for additional classroom space in the elementary schools. It is planned to use one of the units for a band house, Mr. Bradford said, and one will be used for a dressing room at the football field.

A 95 per cent discount from the appraisal price is allowed for educational purposes.

Members of the school board will go back to Del Rio Monday and Tuesday of next week to negotiate the sale.

PAVING PROPOSAL FOR 52 BLOCKS SANDERSON STREETS FOR COMMISSIONERS OKAY

Plans, specifications and proposals for paving of 52 blocks of Sanderson streets and a seal top on about 18 blocks of paving, were turned over to the paving committee of the Terrell County Civic Council this week. The committee, composed of Jack Hayre, Jolly Harkins and A. W. Pope, will turn the proposal over

to the Commissioners Court who will advertise for bids on the work project if it is approved by that body.

Property owners have been contacted by members of various civic clubs and organizations and have paid half the estimated cost of the street improvement. The Commissioners Court is expected to match dollars with the owners and complete the fund from the Terrell County paving fund.

Plans are to reshape bases for the paving and add new material where needed. Double asphalt surface treatment 20 feet wide will be applied. No curbing nor culverts are included in the plans which were approved by the committee.

It is expected that construction will be begun by the last of May or the first part of June.

Relative of Local Men Buried In Del Rio Wednesday

Martin Rose, 49-year-old native ranchman of Del Rio, was buried in Westlawn Cemetery in that city Wednesday afternoon following funeral services held in the First Methodist Church with Rev. Harold Goodenough, pastor, officiating. He was assisted by Rev. Val Sherman, of Edinburg, a former pastor.

Mr. Rose was born and reared in Del Rio and had been in the ranching business since early manhood. He had been ill since last July and died in Foundation hospital in New Orleans where he had been a patient for ten weeks.

Besides his widow Mrs. Guida Rose, he is survived by a son, Martin Rose, Jr., and a granddaughter Sandra Rose. Also three brothers, Pat, Thersell and Hobart Rose.

He was a nephew of Landon Rose, of Sanderson and a cousin of Roger and Hugh Rose also of this city.
