## Herd Sire Progeny Feeding Test Closes At Balmorhea 27th

The registered bull feeding and progeny testing experiment which started at the Balmorhea Experiment Station on November 21, 1947, will be closed with a Field Day commencing at 10 a. m. and barbecue at noon in that city on Saturday, March 27. Grading will be done Wednesday, March 24. All interested ranchmen are invited to attend both days.

A total of 225 head of purebred cattle were included in the experiment during the past winter. All of these were carried through the test without loss. Gains have not been quite as high as usual, partly because hegar used in large quantities as roughage had suffered somewhat from the drought during 1947. However, these animals carry plenty of flesh for range use. They have not been fed for show purposes but to see what the individual animals were worth when not covered with an excess of fat which could hide a lot of faults.

The object of the experiment has been to obtain information regarding the inheritance of desirable characters in the various lines of breeding of Hereford cattle. The 1947-1948 test has included young bulls from 13 West Texas breeders. During the feeding season these bulls from different ranches have all been mixed in the feedlots with 20 head per pen so that every bull has an equal chance. N. M. Mitchell has a group of bulls in the feed lots.

At the beginning of the feeding period each animal was weighed on two consecutive days and graded according to quality and desirability for breeding purposes by a committee of 6 cattlemen. Individual weights have been taken at 28 day intervals, and each animal will be weighed again on two consecutive days, and graded again by the same committee at the close of the test. All of the information regarding weights, gains, and grades of the different groups of progeny of the various herd sires will be summarized and presented following the barbecue on the 27th. There will be a short speaking program which will include representatives of the Hereford Breeders Association.

Feeding work with young registered bulls during the past several years indicated that there is a decided difference in the inherited ability of herd sires to transmit some of the most desirable characteristics to their progeny. These results also indicate that the ability to make fast and economical gains in the feedlot is inherited from the parent and is more highly developed in some lines of breeding.

The records made by the progeny in the feed lots should be a good indication of the value of a sire in producing cattle that make good gains with a minimum amount of feed and at the same time develop the kind of a carcass which the trade demands.

The various ranchmen of this section with cattle in the feedlots have taken turns in furnishing meat for the barbecue at the close of the test. Most cattlemen are interested in the kind of progeny produced by the different types of herd sires and on the closing day these cattle will be separated according to progeny groups of different sires.

**Hints Given In Arrangement To Aid Flower Show**

With the Second Annual Flower Show only a month off we should begin thinking of the flowers we hope to enter, getting new ideas for arrangements and becoming acquainted with the schedule and rules of the show.

This year the schedule will be different from the one of last year's show so attentive study should be given the schedule. The judges will be governed by the rules as laid down in the "Handbook of Flower Show Judging" put out by the National Council of State Garden Clubs, Inc.

It is hoped that through a series of articles in the paper the public may become better acquainted with the schedule, definitions of special types of arrangements and the rules of the show. In flower arranging there are several points we must consider. First and foremost there must be design. A skeleton of the plan is outlined with the longest flowers or leaves. In planning the design, balance must be considered. This may be attained by using an equal amount of flowers on either side of the central axis or by accessories which balance the weight of the flowers. Color harmony and rhythm in an arrangement make a pleasing effect. Rhythm is the balancing and relating of parts so that the eye is carried through with a feeling of motion. For example, if the tall flowers are bending one way, then all the flowers should have that same bend. Three single forms appear repeatedly in excellent design: the triangle, circle and rectangle. Others are the fan, zig-zag and Hogarth line.

Scale is one of the most important elements of flower arrangement. The container, individual blossoms, the background and accessories must be in proportion. As to the height of an arrangement a general rule is that the arrangement should be not less than one and one-half times the height of the container, if the vase is an upright one; if a low one, the height is one and a half times the breadth of the container. Dark, full blown, or heavy flowers look better at the base of an arrangement and place the lighter one, buds and smaller flowers as you go from the center.

Texture of both flowers and containers should be considered in an arrangement. Simplicity is always desirable. Do not overcrowd your arrangements.

- Avoid the following practices in arrangements:
1. Cross-cutting — twigs crossing in line of vision.
  2. Flower stepping — the regular spacing of flowers of uniform size one above the other.
  3. Sandwiching — placing a flowers of one color between two of another, or a plant between two of a different type.
  4. Equal ranging — placing flowers at equal heights.
  5. Parallelism — Two adjacent stems or branches are exact parallel to each other.

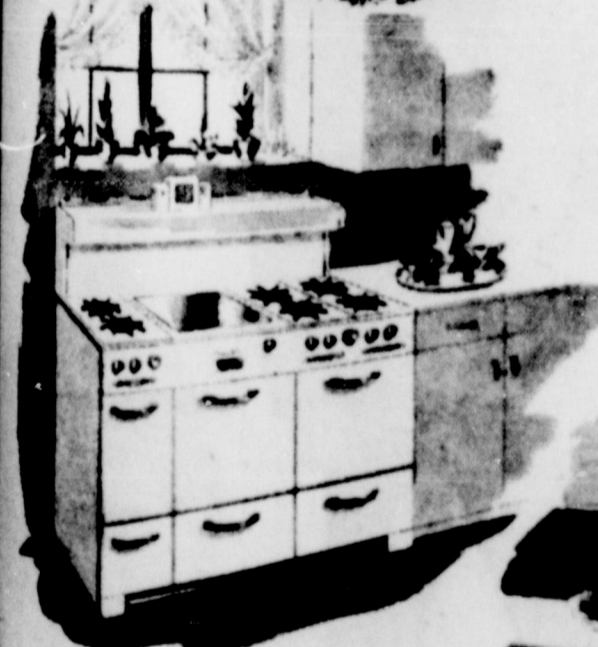

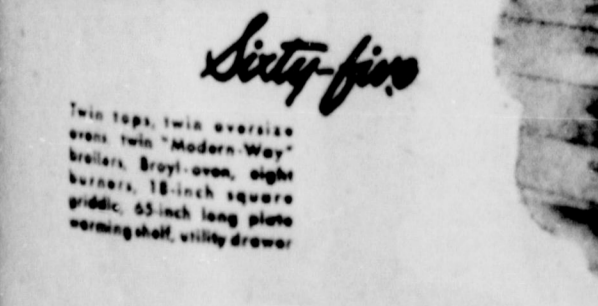
