

Avoid the following practices in arrangements: 1. Cross-cut ting -- twigs crossing in line of vision. 2. Flower stepping - the regular spacing of flowers of un. iform size one above the other. 3. Sandwiching - placing a flowers of one color between two of another, or a plant between two of a different type.

4. Bqual ranging - placing flowers at epual heights. 5. Parallelism - Two adjacent stems or branches are exact parallel to each other.
