Slow Drizzling Rains Begin In Sanderson Area Thursday

The biggest news for Terrell County for several months is that it started raining Thursday morning and the overcast indicated that more was in store. A light sprinkle began to fall at about nine o'clock and had turned into a slow drizzle in about thirty minutes. Grey skies all around give hope for several days of this moisture which is our over-due allotment.

A check of the ranches over the county yesterday morning revealed a few drops of rain having fallen at most all of them with a few reporting a drizzle similar to that seen in town. Only a light sprinkle fell in the Dryden area. Cloudy skies prevail over the county and ranchmen are optimistic over the outlook of relief from the prolonged dry season.

Shearing and marking of sheep has been in progress over the county in recent weeks. Although the mark-up is lower than usual, most ranchmen are surprised and happy that the average is no lower than it is. Sixty per cent will be the approximate county-wide mark-up. In a few instances, small herds of ewes in a trap have shown more than one hundred per cent mark-up which will bring the general average up. The lack of pasture and two spells of extremely cold weather at lambing season showed disastrous results in the current lamb crop.

The bright spot in the picture is the wool bringing 61 cents per pound for eight-months wool and from fifty to fifty-five on twelve-month wool. One ranchman reported a pet lamb in prime condition shearing fifteen pounds which brought \$9.15 but that is considerably above average.

Texans To Profit From Cancer Funds

Texans are contributing \$268,200 to cancer control work in their own state. That's the amount sought for use in Texas by the Texas Division of the American Cancer Society, which during April is campaigning for a total of \$447,000 in the state. The remainder will go for a national research program and the national educational program and operational costs.

Nine tumor and cancer clinics in the state are now being assisted by cancer society funds. Other are being opened and very shortly officials expect every section of Texas to have a convenient clinic for the early detection and treatment of cancer.

In many of these same cities information centers are open — in Texarkana and El Paso and other cities all across the state. New ones are being planned every month — these all to be supported by the April drive.

It's all a part of a program to tell the people that many cancers can be cured, if caught in time. Cancer Society people feel that folks who have cancer now should not wait for present-day research to find a cure, but act immediately.

GARDEN CLUB'S ANNUAL FLOWER SHOW SATURDAY

RACE MEET OPENS IN DEL RIO ON FRIDAY, APRIL 30

Featured races engaging some of the nation's top quarter horses are on the program for the annual spring racing meet sponsored by the Del Rio Livestock Association April 30, May 1 and 2 and May 7, 8 and 9 at Del Rio Park.

Matched for April 30 are Miss Princess, owned by the King Ranch of Texas and managed by E. H. Lane of Odem, and any horse from the S.G.F.D. Stables of Davilla, 440 yards for \$10,000; Forever Amber, owned by Monroe Elliot, and Little Beaver, owned by S.G.F.D. Stables, 305 yards for \$11,000; Stella Moore, owned by Q. I. Roberts, of Florida, and Peggy, owned by Dizzy Dean, of Del Rio, 400 yards for \$6,000.

The first days' featured race will be 220 yards for two-year-olds only, entry fee of \$500, weights for colts, 115 pounds and of fillies, 113 pounds.

The featured race of the fourth day, May 7, will be 330 yards for three-year-olds and up, entry fee of \$1,500, weights for three-year-olds, 111 pounds; others, 121 pounds; mares and fillies five pounds.

More than 300 horses have reservations at the Del Rio track. Some of them already here are Miss Princess, Miss Panama, Stella Moore, Little Nip, My Question, Squaw H, Peggy, Miss Banks, Hot Shot, Joe Mac, Mae West, Blondie, Clementine, Maliam: Quten and Juega.

JOINT CELEBRATION AT FORT STOCKTON PLANNED MAY 2-8

The Fort Stockton Centennial and Annual Fort Stockton Water Carnival will have a joint celebration in that city the first week in May. The first part of the week emphasis will be on the rich historical past of Fort Stockton and Pecos County. The latter part of the week the Water Carnival, highlighted by the famous Aquacade of the University of Texas and the annual All-Southwest Bathing Revue, will provide entertainment. Besides observance of the centennial in all of the churches of Fort Stockton on Sunday, May 2, opening day of the celebration, a rifle shoot, horse races and a rodeo will be held in the afternoon.

Negotiations are under way with Tom Moore, conductor of a national hook-up afternoon "give-away" radio program, to stage an afternoon broadcast on one day of the week preferably Tuesday. That is the day of the mammoth parade.

Wednesday has been designated as "Fort Stockton Day" featuring an old-fashioned picnic in Rooney Park.

The Water Carnival parade will be Thursday afternoon and that evening a local revue will be held there for the selection of the representative to the bathing revue on Friday and Saturday evening. The queen of the all-Southwest Revue will be selected Saturday evening.

An outstanding water sports meet affiliated with the Amateur Athletic Union, will be held during the daylight hours on Friday and Saturday of the two-day carnival.

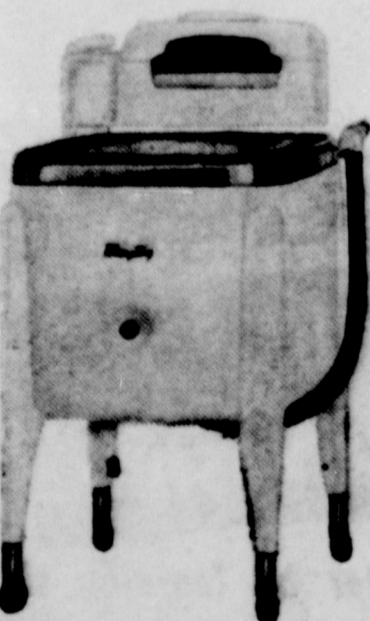
