Tom H. Stovell Alpine Candidate For Representative

Tom H. Stovell of Alpine has announced as a candidate for representative of the 87th legislative district composed of Brewster, Terrell, Val Verde, Kinney and Maverick counties. This gives an opponent from the west end of the district to C. O. Lawrence of Bracketville in the east end who announced several weeks ago.

Young Stovell is a native Texan, born at Eastland. He later came with his family to Sanderson, where his father was employed as an engineer with the State Highway Department, residing here from 1920 to 1933, when the family moved to Alpine.

He graduated from Texas A & M in 1941 when he entered the service, serving five and one-half years, eighteen months of which was overseas as combat pilot. Following his separation from the service in January, 1947 he was in government work, as a budget analyst, for six months. Since then he has been associated with other members of his family in the operation of a nursery business here.

"I feel that I am qualified to represent the people of this district by virtue of the fact that I have a profound interest in the affairs of this state and especially those which either directly or indirectly affect the people of this district," Mr. Stovell said.

"I will appreciate the vote and confidence of all the people of the 87th district and in soliciting your individual vote for the office for which I am a candidate, I would like to reiterate the importance of getting out the vote in all elections this year. The vote is one of the most important expressions of freedom we have. Therefore, I respectfully urge the people to choose the candidate they feel best qualified to serve, go to the polls on election day and vote, whether it be for a minor city office or for the presidency."

CITY PAVING TO START JULY 15

Paving on fifty-two blocks of Sanderson streets will begin on July 15, according to County Judge R. S. Wilkinson. The work order given by the H. B. Zachry Co., successful bidders for the project, is for work to start on the 15th of July and be completed in sixty working days.

Payments from practically all the property owners are now on deposit and the balance will be in hand before the project is begun. The Commissioners' Court has made an appropriation to help in the project.

Most of the solicitation from property owners was handled by various civic clubs and organizations under the direction of the Terrell County Civic Council, an organization made up of delegates from each of the clubs. J. J. Harkins is president of the council.

LOWELL JESSUP INJURED IN FALL FROM HORSE

Lowell Jessup, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Jessup, was seriously injured when he was thrown from his horse sometime Wednesday afternoon while roping a calf. Young Jessup was found Thursday morning about 3 o'clock about four miles from the ranch house by a group of friends and relatives who had been searching for several hours. The barks of his dog led the searchers to where he lay unconscious. The Jessup ranch is about twenty-five miles north of Sanderson.

The searchers found the boy about 100 yards from his horse and the calf that he had roped. It was estimated that he had been unconscious for about eight hours when he was found. He was immediately brought to Sanderson to the Jessup home.

Jessup roused after he was found but was unable to tell exactly what had caused him to be thrown from the horse. His condition was somewhat improved Thursday morning, according to Dr. J. W. Pate, attending physician.

SECTION OF FORT STOCKTON ROAD TO BE PAVED

Approximately fifteen miles of Highway 67 is due to be let for paving this summer, in the opinion of A. W. Pope, resident engineer for the Highway Department.

Mr. Pope expects the appropriation to be made at the July meeting by the State Highway Department, he said. The proposed paving will begin at the county line, 11 miles north of Sanderson and continue fifteen miles, straightening the road in some places and paving the entire stretch. It is thought that the Terrell County end of the highway will be let for paving in the fall.

The highway has been rough and full of holes lately because of the continued dry condition of the road making blading useless.



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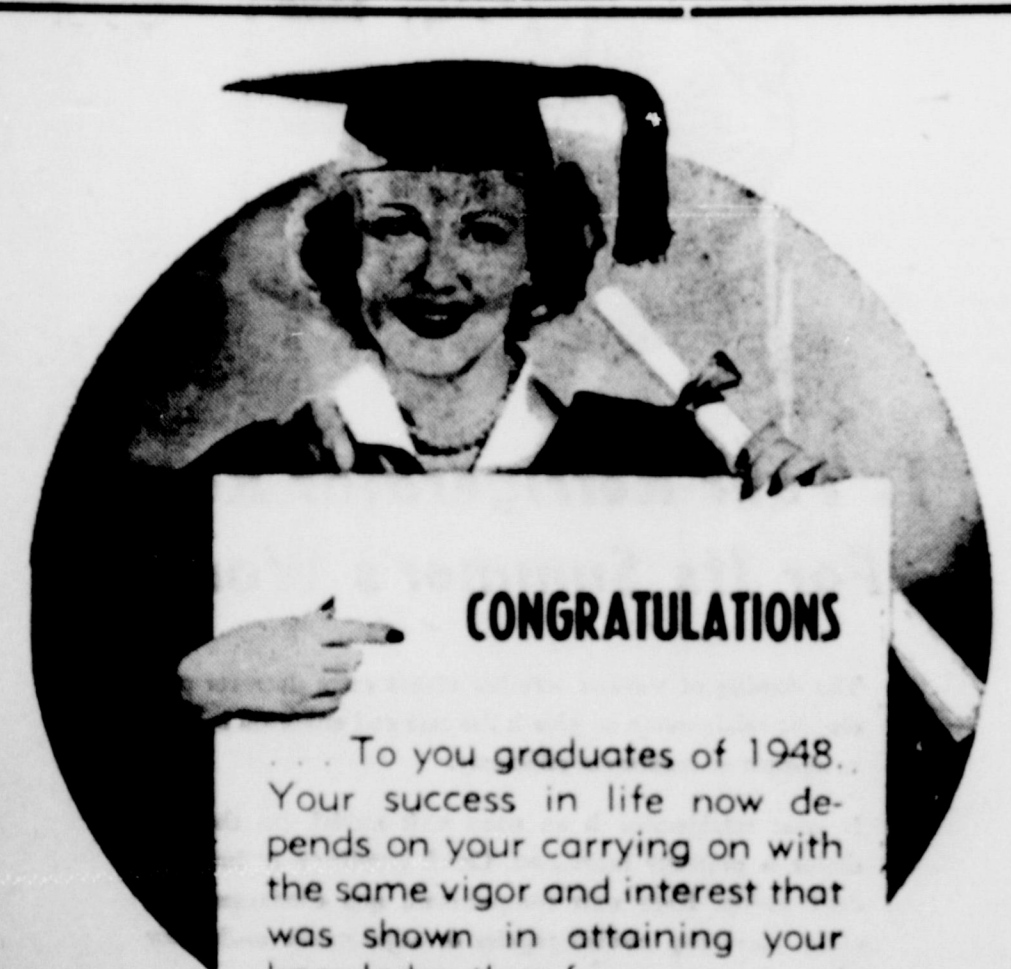
