AN EDITORIAL

A problem of grave concern to all patrons of the Sanderson schools is brought forcibly to our attention in the teacher shortage due to lack of housing facilities here.

In a talk to the Rotary Club at the regular weekly luncheon Wednesday of this week, Superintendent C. G. Bradford told of the condition that will cause the loss of several teachers and the hinderance of employing others unless something can be done to aleviate the shortage.

It was suggested that priority in any rentable living units should be given teachers. That may solve the teacher problem but it would displace other desirable citizens or prospective citizens. We feel that the school patrons and citizens are desirous of gaining new people to the community and an effort should be made to house any and all sorthwhile newcomers who would be an asset to the community.

This paper stands ready at all times to render any aid possible to see that we have sufficient qualified teachers in all departments of the schools. If it takes a building program by the school board then it should be started immediately. If proper building material can be obtained from condemned government property and a bond issue is necessary to obtain it then we believe a bond issue could be launched and voted upon as soon as possible.

The schools here now have two houses and should have several more to insure the teachers living quarters. Most of the teachers with families will be forced to give up their contract here unless we act at once. Let's have a few good old town meetings and see if the people aren't ready to do what






