C. P. PEAVY BURIED WITH MASONIC RITES SATURDAY

Rev. J. W. Byrd, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, was in charge of a brief service at the Masonic Hall Saturday evening after which full Masonic rites were accorded for C. P. Peavy who died Thursday night about 10:30 at his home. Burial was in Cedar Grove Cemetery with arrangements in charge of O. T. Sudduth and Co. Local Masons were also in charge of graveside services.

Mr. Peavy's death came as a shock to friends in Terrell County. He had been in failing health for several months but recently had shown much improvement and was believed on the road to recovery. He suffered a heart attack at his home last Monday morning and remained in a serious condition until his death.

He came to Sanderson from Marfa seventeen years ago as secretary of the Sanderson Wool Commission Company, retaining that position after the death of the late Joe Kerr when J. T. Williams assumed the management of the company. Early in 1941 he became cashier of the Sanderson State Bank and later vice-president and cashier, retaining that position until his death.

Clifford Paschal Peavy was born in Garland, February 14, 1900, the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Peavy, both deceased. His early education was in that city and he attended A&M College. He came to Marfa in 1927 and eighteen months later married Miss Jettie Pruett, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ben Pruett of that city.

He was a member of the First Christian Church of Garland, a thirty-second degree Mason, a member of the Sanderson Rotary Club and the local post of the American Legion.

Besides his widow, survivors include two daughters, Betty Ann and Nancy Peavy. Also three sisters, Mrs. L. A. Crabb of Dallas, Mrs. Winnie Flock of Garland, Mrs. Jack Mann of Weatherford; two brothers, W. E. Peavy of Garland and Claude Peavy of Summit, N. J., all being here for the funeral services.

BIG BEND PARK TO GET FUNDS

Efforts of Texans to have included in current park appropriations bills of the federal government an item of \$35,000 for needed right-of-way for highways in the Big Bend National Park met with success as Senator Tom Connally succeeded in getting the item restored to the Senate bill and adopted.

Congressman Ken Regan was unsuccessful in his attempt to get the amendments by a slight margin by the Republican majority in the House but was settled when the Senate and House versions went to conference for joint action.

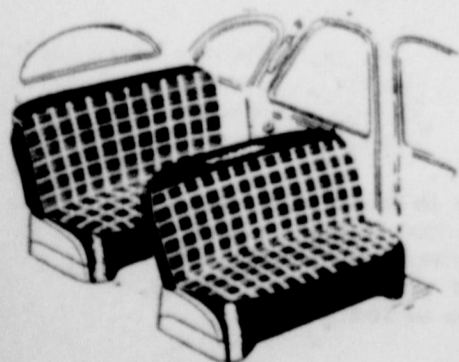
