

The land office added an additional \$1,144,184.00 resulting from the sale of 210,000 acres located in 68 counties. Only 30 tracts totaling 15,00 acres located in Presidio, Reeves and El Paso counties failed to receive bids. The amount bid per acre doubled that for any previous sale.

Commissioner Giles pointed out, by way of contrast, that when Texas made its bid to enter the Union, it unsuccessfully offered its entire public domain to the Federal Government for \$13-million. Now a small fraction of those same lands are bringing in over \$14-million annually from oil and gas royalties alone for public education.

If your biscuits burn on the bottom and still remain rather pale on top, your baking sheet may be too large which tends to hold the heat from the burner to the bottom instead of radiating around the oven evenly. There should be at least one inch of space between the baking sheets and all four sides of the oven. . . .


