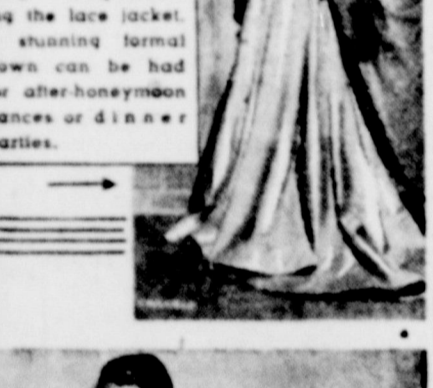

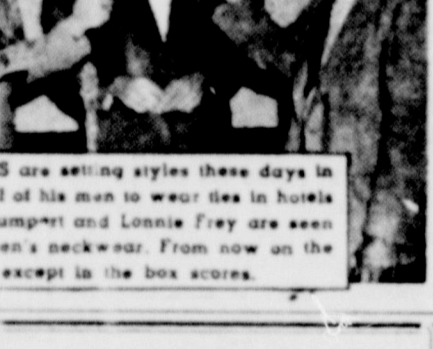

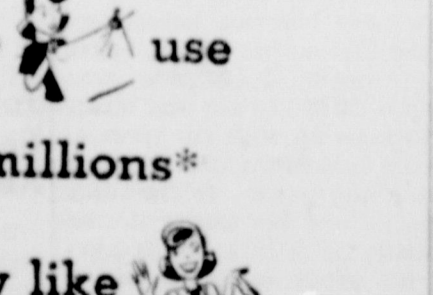
MARSHALL ON RUSSIA - Secretary of State Marshall, in the State Department Auditorium, tells the press that it is seriously interested in improving world conditions there.

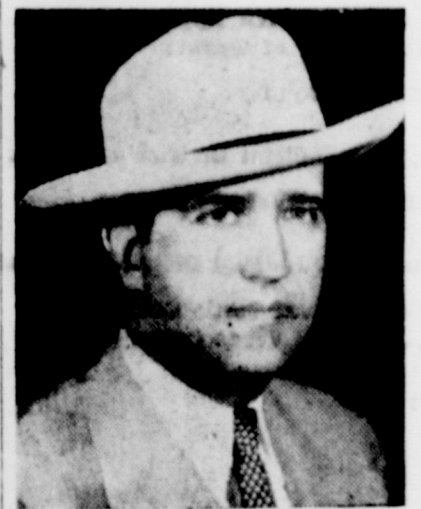

When a German torpedo hit the troopship, these clergymen of the three great faiths—John P. Washington, Catholic priest, Alexander D. Goode, Jewish rabbi, George L. Fox and Clarke V. Poling, Protestant ministers—gave their life belts to stranded soldiers and, linking arms, prayed in unison as the vessel sank in the North Atlantic.

We howl about states rights. You can go down the whole alphabet from AAA to TVA and they all invade states rights. We know of a federal court in Texas where a Texas farmer was fined and the crime for which he was fined for was raising his own cotton on his own land.

We have on our desk a copy of a little book, "The South's Political Plight," by Peter Molyneux, an outstanding editorial commentator and editor of the Southern Weekly. Mr. Molyneux's book came to us this year, and although we are wont to see some of the dark clouds back of the silver lining, we must admit that we thought his ideas were a bit presumptive and exaggerated. KITCHEN MEMO
JEAN CLARKE

Oven-baked desserts can be cooked along with the roast to save time and fuel. *Banana-Coffee Souffle*, one of these, is nourishing and flavorful. Melt 2 tbsp. butter in a saucepan. Remove from heat and stir in 3 tbsp. flour. Gradually add 1/4 cup strong coffee, 3/4 cup milk and cook over low simmer flame stirring constantly until nicely smooth and thick. Combine 1/4 cup sugar, 4 egg yolks, gradually stirring these into cooked mixture. Add 3 mashed medium-sized bananas. Beat 4 egg whites until stiff but not dry. Fold into banana mixture. Pour into 1 1/2 qt. souffle dish which has been buttered on bottom only. Bake in slow gas oven (325°) 40 to 45 mins. Serves 6.

The most reliable buyer's guide to gas appliances for the home is the Seal of Approval of the American Gas Association Testing Laboratories. For example, nearly 600 tests and requirements must be met on a gas range before it can be produced and sold to the homemaker.

If your biscuits burn on the bottom and still remain rather pale on top, your baking sheet may be too large which tends to hold the heat from the burner to the bottom instead of radiating around the oven evenly. There should be at least one inch of space between the baking sheets and all four sides of the oven.

Hot butter and syrup makes a richer-tasting spread for waffles. Add 2 tbsp. butter to 1 cup extra-sweet corn syrup, heat until butter is melted, then serve hot.

As soon as baked potatoes are cooked, cut them criss-cross on the top to keep them fluffy. Add butter and serve at once.

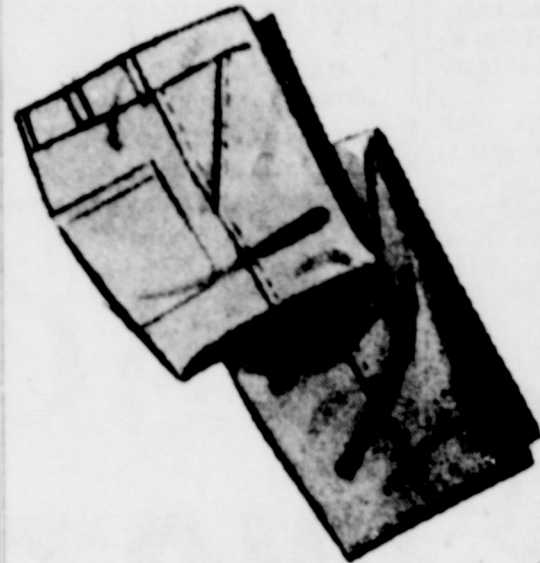
