Mangled Body of Section Laborer Found in Yards

Thick frost retards coldmaking, makes your refrigerator run longer, increases operating cost. It should be removed whenever it becomes one-quarter of an inch thick. It is necessary to defrost more often in summer than in winter because of more moisture in the air and greater use of your refrigerator.

A Quick Method of Defrosting

Empty defrosting tray and turn control to "off." Remove ice trays and frozen foods from freezer. (If latter are wrapped in several thicknesses of paper and placed on refrigerator shelf, they won't thaw out in short time it takes to defrost.) Fill proper-sized pans with very hot water and place on shelves of freezer. Use fresh hot water as needed.

When frost has melted wash freezer with weak solution of baking soda and lukewarm water. Clean food compartment, wash thoroughly with baking soda solution and wipe dry. Empty drip pan, replace ice trays and frozen foods and start freezing. The entire operation should take only 20 to 30 minutes.

The Best Time of Day to Defrost

During the hot summer months it's best to defrost in the late evening just before bedtime, when the refrigerator has less work to do. If you defrost during the middle of the day, the refrigerator may run excessively when started up, because of the heat, frequent door openings and warm foods being placed in food compartment.



The Legislature shall, at its first regular session after the publication of each United States decennial census, apportion the state into senator tal and representative districts, agreeable to the provisions of Sections 25, 26 and 26-a of this Article. The Board shall, within sixty (60) days after assembling, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, or into senatorial or representative districts, as the failure of action of such Legislature may make nec-Such apportionment essary. shall be in writing and signed by this State. three (3) or more of the mem bers of the Board duly acknowledged as the act and deed of such Board, and, when so executed and filed with the Secretary of State, shall have force and effect of law. Such apportionment shall become effective at the next succeeding statewide general election. The Supreme Court of Texas shall have jurisdiction to compel such Commission to perform its duties in accordance with the provisions of this section by writ of mandamus or other extraordinary writs conformable to the usages of law. The Legislature shall provide necessary funds for clerical and technical aid and for other expenses incidental to the work of the Board, and the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to receive per diem and travel expense during the Board's session in the same manner and amount as they would receive while atte special session of the Legislature. 

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows

"Section 28. The Legislature shall, at its first regular session after the publication of each United States decennial census, apportion the state into senator tal and representative districts, agreeable to the provisions of Sections 25, 26 and 26-a of this Article. In the event the Legislature shall at any such first regular session following the publication of a United States decennial census, fail to make such apportionment same shall be done by the Legislative Redistricting Board of Texas, which is hereby created, and shall be composed of five (5) members, as follows: The Lieutenant Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum. Said Board shall assemble in the City of Austin within ninety (90) days after the final adjournment The of such regular session. Board shall, within sixty (60)days after assembling, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, or into senatorial or representative districts, as the failure of action of such Legislature may make nec-Such apportionment essary. this State shall be in writing and signed by three (3) or more of the mem bers of the Board duly acknowledged as the act and deed of such Board, and, when so executed and filed with the Secretary of State, shall have force and effect of law. Such apportionment shall become effective at the next succeeding statewide general election. The Supreme Court of Texas shall have jurisdiction to compel such Commission to perform its duties in accordance with the provisions of this section by writ of mandamus or other extraordinary writs conformable to the usages of law. The Legislature shall provide necessary funds for clerical and technical aid and for other expenses incidental to the work of the Board, and the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to receive per diem and travel expense during the Board's session in the same manner and amount as they would receive while at special session of the Legislature.
