New Commissioner And Justices of Peace Elected Saturday

Saturday found 722 Terrell County resident votes recorded at the polls. The county has a potential voting strength of a few more than one thousand and one hundred and sixty-one absentee ballots were cast.

Judge R. S. Wilkinson, present incumbent won the nomination for County Judge over V. I. Cargile, polling 607 votes to 103 for Cargile.

Jack Hayre, County Attorney and Jim Nance, Sheriff and County Tax Assessor and Collector, with no opponents, received 711 and 712 votes.

In the race for County and District Clerk, Ruel Adams won the nomination for a second term over Wilton H. Dishman, the vote being 503 to 194.

The race for County Treasurer was the closest contested race in the county and, until the complete returns were received from all of the boxes, no one could guess what the outcome would be. Ben F. Dawson, present incumbent, received 371 votes and Mrs. Jettie P. Peavy received 343.

R. E. Corder, who has been County Commissioner of Precinct 1 for several years, lost that race to Jack Laughlin, the final vote being Laughlin 391 and Corder, 200.

In the three-man race for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, E. B. Litton won the nomination with 317 votes, Claude E. Harkins getting 122 votes and Johnny Whistler 154 votes.

W. W. Sudduth was re-elected County Democratic Chairman, Joe Kerr, Jr., Democratic Chairman, Precinct 1, George Gann, Constable, Precinct 1.

In Precinct 2, E. E. Carson

was elected County Commissioner with 71 votes. Sid Harkins was elected County Commissioner of Precinct 3 with 16 votes, J. M. Corder, Constable and Herman Couch, Precinct Chairman.

C. M. Turk received the nomination for County Commissioner of Precinct 4 with 32 votes. Mrs. Lou Chandler, Justice of the Peace, L. G. Arledge, Constable.

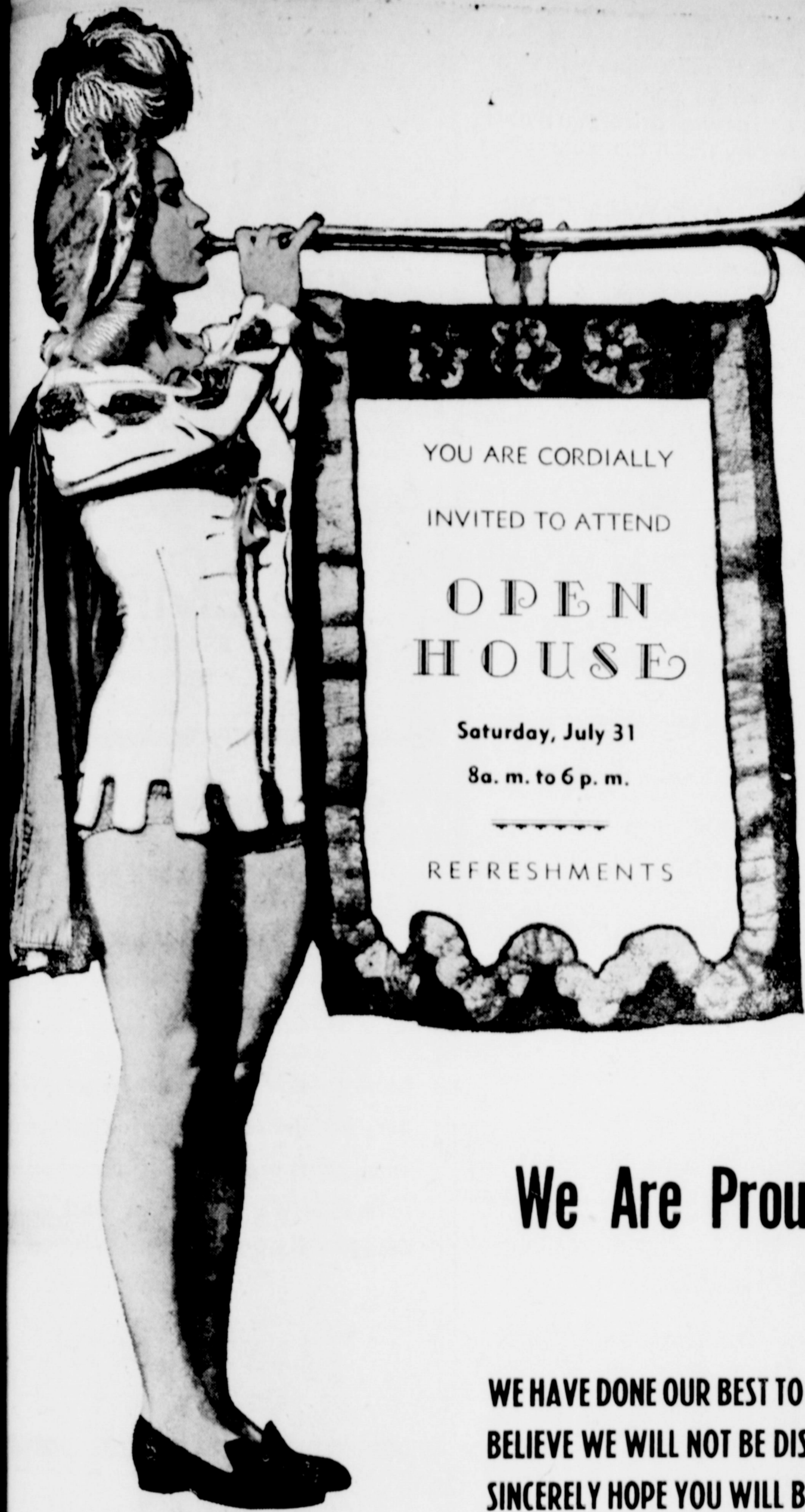

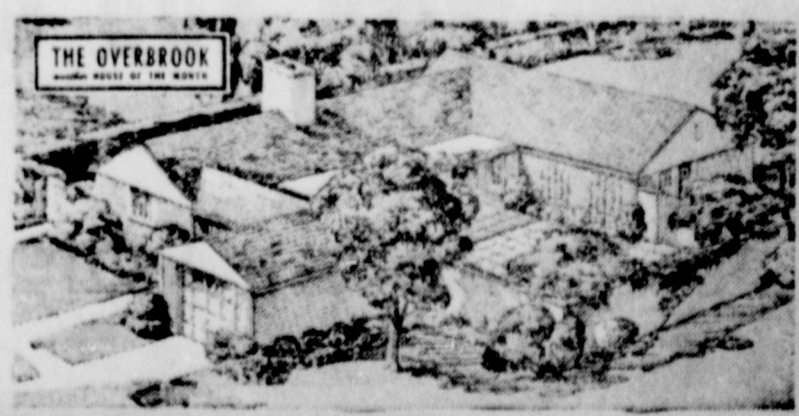

L. A. Woods Wins Instructions Segregation

A suit filed June 15, 1948, in Bastrop, Texas, and styled *Woods vs. Independent School District of Bastrop County, et al.*, vs. *Independent School District of Bastrop County, et al.* was rendered in judgment by the Western District Court of the United States District of Texas, at San Antonio, Texas, presiding Judge H. Price, Jr., presiding. The suit was representative of the action on behalf of the plaintiffs and all pupils of Mexican and other Latin-American descent charging that segregation of those pupils in separate schools and schools of the Bas-

trop Independent School District of Bastrop County, et al., was arbitrary and discriminatory and in violation of the plaintiff's constitutional rights as guaranteed by the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States. L. A. Woods, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, has recently sent communications to the school offices of county, city and school districts of Texas stating the regulations and instructions necessary to comply with the judgment rendered in the U. S. District Court in the test case. He stated "The only requirements of authority for segregation of students in public schools of the State of Texas on account of race or descent is based upon Section 7, Article VII, of the Constitution of Texas and applies only to

persons of Negro ancestry. That reference to "colored" children has been interpreted consistently by the Texas courts and the Texas legislature as including only members of the Negro race. The courts have held that it does not apply to members of any other race. There has never been any requirement of authority for segregation of children of Latin-American descent and attempts at segregation of pupils of Mexican or other Latin-American ancestry have been held unconstitutional by the recent U. S. District Court decision in the above mentioned suit. I, as State Superintendent of Public Instruction, am enjoined from in any manner, directly or indirectly, participating in the custom, usage or practice of segregating pupils of Mexican or other Latin-American de-

scend in separate schools or classes."

The school officers were forbidden to continue the segregation of pupils of Mexican or other Latin-American descent in separate schools or classes. Continuing his instructions, Mr. Woods said, "These instructions and the above mentioned judgment recognize that it is permissible to have separate classes in the first grade for any students who have language difficulties, whether the students be of Anglo-American, Latin-American or any other origin; such separate classes shall be formed only for instructional purposes, on the same campus, and with the same school facilities as are available to all other first grade students. Such classes may be formed only after a language test has been applied to all first grade pupils. The separate classes, therefore, will be comprised of all students with language handicaps, regardless of their native tongue. These separate classes should be formed only for students who clearly demonstrate that they do not understand English sufficiently to follow even the simple class-room teaching process. Since this separation is permissible only for the purpose of familiarizing the pupils with the English language to the extent that they can understand class-room instructions said pupils cannot be separated in any other school activities or facilities. All of said pupils, therefore, are entitled to the same cafeteria and lunchroom facilities, as all other pupils, to joint participation in school contests, dramatics, musical organizations, play grounds, recesses, and organized sports, and to joint participation in all other activities which are generally considered part of the education process.

"You will take all necessary:

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steps to eliminate any and all segregations that may exist in your school or district contrary to instruction and regulations. I shall take whatever steps are necessary to enforce these instructions and regulations and to prevent segregation of Mexican or other Latin-American descent in the public schools as in the State of Texas as directed by the above-mentioned Court decree."

In recent years in California a similar case was appealed to the Circuit Court of Civil Appeals after judgment had been rendered in favor of the plaintiff and the judgment of the

District Court was upheld. The Supreme Court refused to review the case.

DEFROST

whenever frost reaches thickness of one-quarter inch

Thick frost retards coldmaking, makes your refrigerator run longer, increases operating cost. It should be removed whenever it becomes one-quarter of an inch thick. It is necessary to defrost more often in summer than in winter because of more moisture in the air and greater use of your refrigerator.

A Quick Method of Defrosting

Empty defrosting tray and turn control to "off." Remove ice trays and frozen foods from freezer. (If latter are wrapped in several thicknesses of paper and placed on refrigerator shelf, they won't thaw out in short time it takes to defrost.) Fill proper-sized pans with very hot water and place on shelves of freezer. Use fresh hot water as needed.

When frost has melted wash freezer with weak solution of baking soda and lukewarm water. Clean food compartment, wash thoroughly with baking soda solution and wipe dry. Empty drip pan, replace ice trays and frozen foods and start freezing. The entire operation should take only 20 to 30 minutes.

The Best Time of Day to Defrost

During the hot summer months it's best to defrost in the late evening just before bedtime, when the refrigerator has less work to do. If you just defrost during the middle of the day, the refrigerator may run excessively when started up, because of the heat, frequent door openings and warm foods being placed in food compartment.

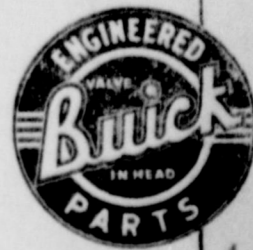

PLANS FOR DRAFT ARE MADE PUBLIC, TO BEGIN AUG. 30

President Truman last Tuesday issued a proclamation calling for the draft registration to start Monday, August 30.

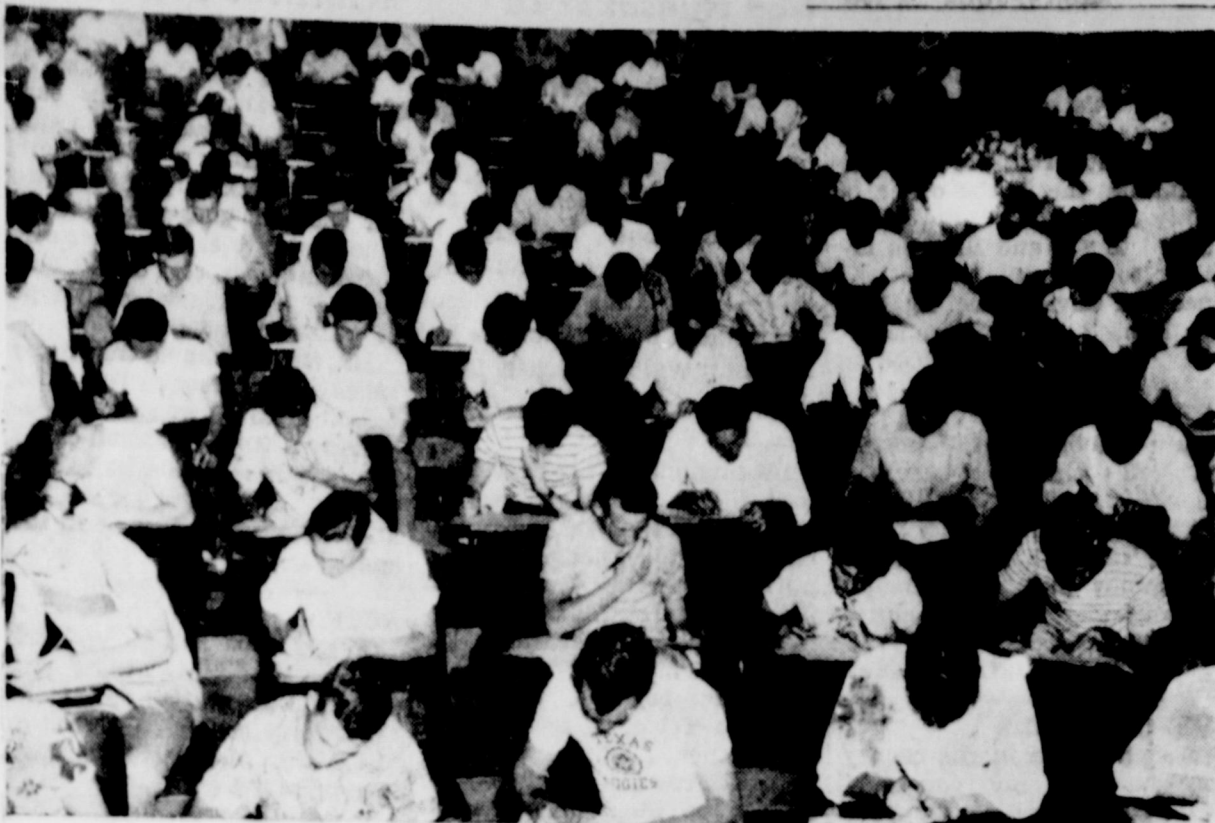
On that date, all men born in 1922 after August 30 will register. The proclamation also fixes the following dates for the registration of other youths between the ages of 18 and 26.

- Persons born in the year 1923 - August 31 and Sept. 1.
- Persons born in 1924 - Sept. 2 and Sept. 3.
- Persons born in the year 1925 - Sept. 4 or Sept. 7.
- Persons born in the year 1926 - Sept. 8-9.
- Persons born in the year 1927 - Sept. 10-11.
- Persons born in the year 1928 - Sept. 13-14.
- Persons born in the year 1929 - Sept. 15-16.
- Persons born in the year 1930 before Sept. 19 - Sept. 17-18.
- Boys born on or after Sept. 19, 1930, under the proclamation, will be registered on the day they are 18 years old or within five days thereafter.

Selective Service Director L. B. Hershey announced Tuesday that the draft would begin shortly after October 1. Men will be drafted by age groups with men 25 and down through 22 taken first in the initial six months of the program. He also said he did not think over 8,000 men would come from the 25-year-old group, the first to be drafted. Registration in Texas will total between 500,000 and 600,000. One hundred and forty draft boards will be in operation in Texas on August 30.
