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TEXAS' 23 VOTES SOUGHT BY STATES' RIGHTS LEADERS

HOUSTON, August 18—States' Rights leader, Palmer Bradley of Houston, veteran of World Wars I and II, said that the Presidential ticket of J. Strom Thurmond, Governor of South Carolina and Fielding L. Wright Governor of Mississippi, had gained such strength that a determined effort will be made to carry Texas' 23 electoral votes for the States' Rights ticket.

"Texans are rallying to the cause of the States' Rights Democrats as a result of Thurmond's challenging address in his Presidential acceptance speech at Houston last week," said Bradley.

"Loyal Texans who believe in the same principles that the 184 immortal heroes of the Alamo gave their lives for will join our cause," he added. "It is inconceivable that any Texan could favor Truman's Civil Rights program if he understood what it meant to his personal liberty and that of his children."

Bradley pointed out that the freedom won at the Alamo and later preserved by fighting two World Wars will be lost if Truman's Civil Rights program becomes the law of the land.

"White and Negro children will go to school together," said Bradley. Negro teachers will instruct white children, Negroes and whites will work side by side and negroes must be promoted in proportion to their percentage. This will mean Negro foremen and bosses. To enforce such laws, the federal government will send a police force to Texas to watch over us and see that we don't violate these oppressive and unfair laws."

Truman's efforts to take the tidelands away from Texas was cited by Bradley as another attack on the rights of Texans.

"If Texas loses the tidelands as a result of Truman's efforts," said Bradley, "the school children of this state will suffer the loss of millions of dollars in revenue which will have to come out of the pocket of the taxpayers."

States Rights Democrats are making every effort to have Thurmond-Wright certified as the Democratic party's candidates at the Fort Worth convention, September 14.

"We have sufficient strength to carry the Fort Worth convention," said Bradley. "The only chance the Trumanites have is to steal the convention by not seating the heavy-voting delegates from Harris, Tarrant, Dallas and other counties."

The basis on which the Trumanites are challenging the States Rights is the fact that they did not take the pledge to support Harry Truman and his Civil Rights program. "We could not do this unless we were willing to sacrifice the principles we have fought for from the Alamo on down to Hitler and Stalin," Bradley pointed out.

A state-wide appeal has been made to all Texans to join the States' Rights movement by remitting a one-dollar bill to W. B. Bates, Second National Bank, Houston, to help carry out a hard-hitting campaign all over Texas.

Wallace said he has recommended to the governor the appointment of the nominee, Newton, to fill the vacancy created by his resignation.

The district includes Terrell, Edwards, Kinney, Maverick, and Val Verde counties.

AMENDMENTS TO TEXAS VOTERS

A total of eight amendments to the State Constitution will be offered to the voters of Texas at the General Election on November 2, 1948. These proposed amendments are running for the fourth and last time on the inside pages of the Times and are as follows:

1. Providing for a Board to apportion the state into senatorial districts in event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment; providing for the governor to issue proclamation and making an appropriation.

2. Proposing for a successor to the Governor in event the Governor-elect dies, becomes disabled or disqualified before taking oath of office as Governor.

3. Providing that a wife and husband may from time to time in writing partition community estate, without prejudice to the rights of existing creditors as to any part.

4. Providing for no ad valorem tax to be levied by state for general revenue purposes after Jan. 1, 1951, and authorizing counties to level such tax for certain purposes, providing for \$3,000 residential homestead exemption, and providing for tax donations.

5. To authorize counties of the state to provide for insurance for county employees.

6. To provide that \$3,000 of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads to be exempt from all taxation for all state purposes.

7. Providing that all Sheriffs and all officers who perform duties of tax collectors and their deputies, constables, etc., shall be on salary basis in all counties in state beginning January 1, 1948.

Providing for retirement of Judges and Commissioners of Appellate courts and Judges of District and Criminal courts on account of length of service, age or disability, etc.

Infant Mortality Rate Lowest In Texas History

Infant mortality rates in Texas are at their lowest level in the history of the state, according to figures released by the Bureau of Vital Statistics of the State Health Department. Infant mortality has reached a low of 41.2 deaths for every 1,000 live births.

Compared to the figures for 1940, this represents a reduction of more than 39 per cent. In that year, there were 197,023 live births and 8,685 deaths. But despite these gains, Texas still has the sixth highest infant mortality rate in the United States, with forty-two states reporting lower rates.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, attributes the reduction to the increase in public response to the educational efforts of the Texas State Department of Health.

"We have reason for pride in our reduced infant and maternal mortality when it is realized that the reduction means in excess of 5,000 babies are being saved annually which would have otherwise died," Dr. Cox said. "In addition, the birth rate is higher than the 1940 figure by more than 71,000."

The comparison between the live births figures for 1940 and 1947, shows white births up 22,707; Latin-American births up 7,186; and Negro births up 3,297.

The report also shows maternal mortality has been reduced over 65 per cent. In 1940, the rate was 4.6 for every 1,000 live births as compared to 1.6 for 1947.

New Fence Added To Local Cemetery

A new fence across the south side of the Sanderson cemetery has added greatly to the appearance of the burial place. The improvement, recently completed, was one of the projects of the Cemetery Association, according to Ervin Grigsby, president. Mr. Grigsby has spent no small amount of time and effort in the work of making the burial ground more beautiful.

Mr. Grigsby also stated that because of his duties as bookkeeper for the Kerr Mercantile Co., as well as activities in the Cemetery Association and Civic Council, and the fact that Sanderson now has a florist shop, he is no longer taking orders for flowers.

LOCAL SOFTBALL TAKES QUEER TURN IN LAST STAGES

The local softball league has taken a queer turn in the last few remaining weeks of the second half. The Rotary Club withdrew from the league causing a forfeit for the rest of their games. The Railroad team is leading and three games to play. The Railroaders will have to lose all of their games and the Lions must win all their games to be winner of the second half.

As the standing of teams was after the first game in the seventh week the Railroad had won four and lost one. Since the Rotary withdrawal that forced them into six wins and one loss since they had played neither game with the Rotary in the second half. The Lions lost their game to the Legion last Thursday night and made them four wins and three losses, two games behind the Railroad Friday night of this week the Lions and Railroaders will meet and the Railroaders can clinch their second half win by beating the Lions in this game. This will put the Railroaders and Firemen together for the championship playoff.

W. L. Babb Charged With Murder After S. R. Jeffers Killed

W. L. Babb of Alpine was indicted for first degree murder by the 83rd District grand jury in session at Alpine Tuesday morning. Babb was charged with the murder of Stanley Ray Jeffers. Bond was fixed at \$5,000.

Babb's indictment grew out of the gun-duel last Thursday afternoon at Lajitas, at the foot of the Big Bend. Jeffers died of a .38 calibre bullet through the head.

B. C. (Smoky) Babb was "nobilled" after being charged in justice court with assault with intent to murder and bound over to the grand jury.

Due to his present condition, it is thought that Babb will likely not be tried during this term of court now in session in Alpine. Babb was shot in both shoulders during the gun-fight.

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for a Board for apportioning the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment; providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation by the Governor, and making an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 28. The Legislature shall, at its first regular session after the publication of each United States decennial census, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, agreeable to the provisions of Sections 25, 26 and 28-a of this Article. In the event the Legis-

lature shall at any such first regular session following the publication of a United States decennial census, fail to make such apportionment same shall be done by the Legislative Redistricting Board of Texas, which is hereby created, and shall be composed of five (5) members, as follows: The Lieutenant Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum. Said Board shall assemble in the City of Austin within ninety (90) days after the final adjournment of such regular session. The Board shall, within sixty (60) days after assembling, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, or into senatorial or representative districts, as the failure of action of such Legislature may make necessary. Such apportionment shall be in writing and signed by three (3) or more of the members of the Board duly acknowledged as the act and deed of such Board, and, when so executed and filed with the Secretary of State, shall have force and effect of law. Such apportionment shall become effective at the next succeeding statewide general election. The Supreme Court of Texas shall have jurisdiction to compel such Commission to perform its duties in accordance with the provisions of this section by writ of mandamus or other extraordinary writs conformable to the usages of law. The Legislature shall provide necessary funds for clerical and technical aid and for other expenses incidental to the work of the Board, and the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to receive per diem and travel expense during the Board's session in the same manner and amount as they would receive while attending a special session of the Legislature. This amendment shall become effective January 1, 1951."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 15 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 15. All property, both real and personal, of the wife, owned or claimed by her before marriage, and that acquired afterward by gift, devise or descent, shall be the separate property of the wife, and laws shall be passed more clearly defining the rights of the wife, in relation as well to her separate property as that held in common with her husband; provided that husband and wife, without prejudice to pre-existing creditors, may from time to time by written instrument as if the wife were a feme sole partition between themselves in severally or into equal undivided interests all or any part of their existing community property, or exchange between themselves the community interest of the other spouse in other community property, whereupon the portion or interest set aside to each spouse shall be and constitute a part of the separate property of such spouse. This Amendment is self-operative, but laws may be passed

Each voter at such election shall mark out one of such clauses on the ballot, leaving the clause expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thou-

sand (\$10,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of this state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION amending Section 15 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a provision that the husband and wife from time to time may in writing partition between themselves in severally or into undivided interests all or any part of their community property, whereupon without prejudice to the right of existing creditors the portion or interest set aside to each spouse shall be and constitute a part of the separate property of each spouse; further providing that such Constitutional Amendment if adopted shall be self-operative and self-executing; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of the State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 15 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 15. All property, both real and personal, of the wife, owned or claimed by her before marriage, and that acquired afterward by gift, devise or descent, shall be the separate property of the wife, and laws shall be passed more clearly defining the rights of the wife, in relation as well to her separate property as that held in common with her husband; provided that husband and wife, without prejudice to pre-existing creditors, may from time to time by written instrument as if the wife were a feme sole partition between themselves in severally or into equal undivided interests all or any part of their existing community property, or exchange between themselves the community interest of the other spouse in other community property, whereupon the portion or interest set aside to each spouse shall be and constitute a part of the separate property of such spouse. This Amendment is self-operative, but laws may be passed

prescribing requirements as to the form and manner of execution of such instruments, and providing for their recordation and for such other reasonable requirements not inconsistent herewith as the Legislature may from time to time consider proper with relation to the subject of this Amendment. Should the Legislature pass an Act dealing with the subject of this Amendment and prescribing requirements as to the form and manner of the execution of such instruments and providing for their recordation and other reasonable requirements not inconsistent herewith and anticipatory hereto, such Act shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character and shall take effect just as though this Constitutional Amendment were in effect when the Act was passed."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas at an election to be held throughout the State on the second day of November, 1948, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that husband and wife from time to time may in writing partition between themselves in severally or into undivided interests community property existing at the time of partition so as to convert same into separate property of the respective spouses without prejudice to the rights of pre-existing creditors."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that husband and wife from time to time may in writing partition between themselves in severally or into undivided interests community property existing at the time of partition so as to convert same into separate property of the respective spouses without prejudice to the rights of pre-existing creditors."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

In all counties in this State the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts, to compensate all constables, deputy constables and precinct law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949; and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000), according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners Courts shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or of a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers including sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949.

"All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and any municipality, or in case where a pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid into the county treasury when collected and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis such fees may be retained by such officer or paid into the treasury of the county as the Commissioners Court may direct. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public weighers shall

continue to be compensated on a fee basis."

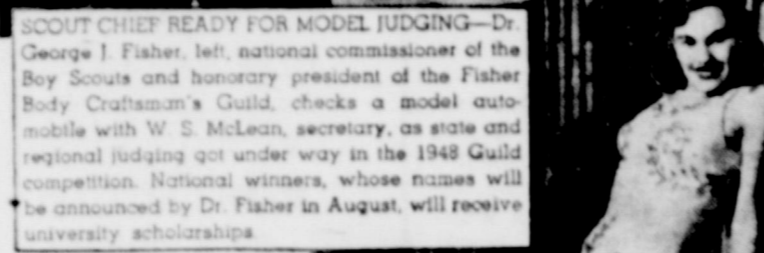

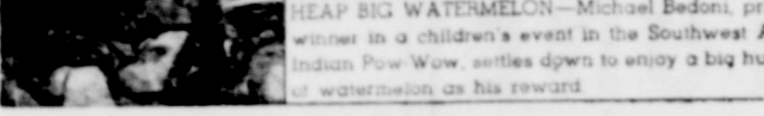

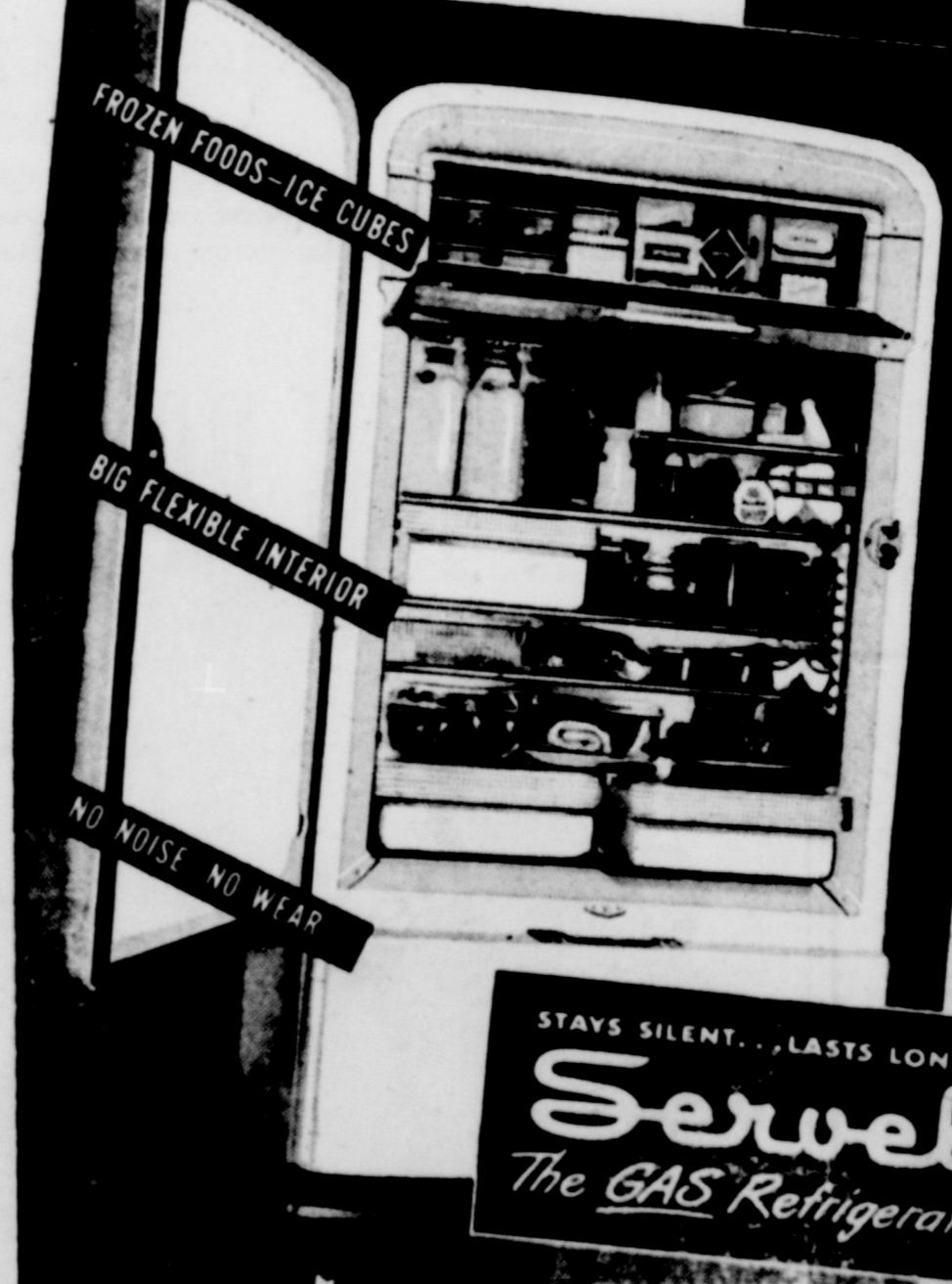
