## STOLEN CAR RECOVERED IN DRYDEN

Edward Yeager, Pittsburg, Pa., and Douglas Richard Dodge, Detroit, Mich., were picked up on the highway near Dryden and brought to Sanderson Tuesday as suspects in the theft of a Ford pickup reported stolen from Uvalde.

The suspects saw officers approach the cafe in Dryden where they were eating and fled through a side door to the pasture south of town. Deputy Sheriff B. F. Anderson and Border Patrolmen Garland Inmon and Dick Hamilton kept the surrounding area covered with field glasses so that escape would be difficult. The officers moved up Highway 90 near the airport and the young men were on the highway trying to thumb a ride. Bewilderment overcame them, according to deputy sheriff Anderson, when they were offered a ride by the officers. They were held in the Terrell County jail until officers from Uvalde came to return them.

The men told local officers they were AWOL from the U. S. Marine Hospital in Fort Worth. Officers were notified that the men were trying to sell the pickup in Dryden with no ownership papers.

## REGISTRATION FOR SCHOOLS TO BEGIN TUESDAY, SEPT. 7

After three months of vacation, school bells will soon ring for the children of Terrell County. The remodeling and repairing of the Elementary Ward School building is well under way and will be completed with the probable exception of some painting within the next week.

Registration for the pupils of Sanderson will begin Tuesday morning, September 7, when the high school students will register at nine o'clock.

With the exception of beginners and first graders all grade pupils will register Tuesday afternoon at one o'clock.

Beginners and first graders will register Wednesday, September 8, at 9 a. m. All children in the second grade and above will report to the Elementary Ward School. There will be two classes for beginners, one in the Lamar Ward School and one in the Elementary School. The pupils retained in the first grade at Lamar Ward School will continue there.

All children attending the Sanderson schools for the first time must present a birth certificate.

There will be a faculty meeting in the high school building Monday, September 6, at 9:30.

Humble No. 1 J. C. Mitchell recovered 170 feet of heavily gas cut mud in a 2-hour drill-stem test from 7,711-79 feet. Gas appeared at the surface in 21 minutes at the rate of 27,000 cubic feet per day. Maximum flowing pressure during the test was 85 pounds. No. 1 Mitchell is bottomed at 7,850 feet in Pennsylvania lime and shale.

## J. R. BLACKWELDER FUNERAL RITES SUNDAY EVENING

Funeral services were held at the Methodist Church Sunday evening for James Ross Blackwelder who died suddenly at his home about 11:15 Friday night. O. T. Sudduth and Co. was in charge of funeral arrangements and Rev. R. A. English, pastor, officiated at the services. Interment was made in Cedar Grove Cemetery.

Mr. Blackwelder was born in Rowena, Runnels County, November 20, 1888. He was married to Miss Ethel Nobles January 15, 1922. They came to Sanderson twenty-six years ago and he had operated a boot and shoe repair shop since their residence here. He had been a member of the Methodist Church since young manhood, being affiliated with the local Methodist Church. He was also a member of the Knights of Pythias.

Besides the widow, Mrs. Ethel Blackwelder, he is survived by two daughters, Ora Mae and Mrs. J. R. Dunman of Del Rio; two sons, James and Weldon, of Sanderson.

Mr. Blackwelder had been in failing health for over a year but was active in his business. He complained of not feeling very well about fifteen minutes before his death and died while his family was ministering to him before a physician was summoned.

## Returned Veteran To Be Buried With Full Military Rites Here

Military funeral rites Saturday morning at the graveside will follow a service at the Catholic Church for Senon Hernandez whose remains were repatriated from the European theatre.

The service at the church will be at ten o'clock and immediately following the local chapter of the Veterans of Foreign Wars will have charge of the services at the cemetery.

The body will arrive in Sanderson under escort early Friday morning and the services will be held Saturday morning.

Hernandez had lived in Sanderson for some time before going into the service. He was employed by Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Downum while they were in Fort Stockton and came here with them when they entered the hotel business here. He was employed by the Davis Drug Company at the time he entered the army. He was overseas only eighteen days when he was killed in action.

Surviving are the widow, Reynalda M. Hernandez, a small son, seven years of age, and his mother who now lives in Fort Stockton.

## JOE LYNN HERRING DIES AFTER FALL FROM HORSE

Joe Lynn Herring, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Herring, died in an Alpine hospital at 4:30 Saturday morning as a result of injuries suffered when he was dragged by a horse late Friday evening.

Young Herring, age 10, was riding a large and very gentle horse at his father's ranch. Mr. Herring and a ranch employee had checked on the whereabouts of the boy a short time before the horse came to the ranch house with a rope dragging and one of the boy's shoes caught in the rope. The boy was soon found in an unconscious condition and tracks indicated that he was probably dragged one hundred yards before his foot was released.

The family rushed the boy to Sanderson where he was met by a local physician who took him to an Alpine hospital. He died without regaining consciousness.

Funeral services were held at the Baptist Church Sunday afternoon at 3:30 with the pastor, Rev. Clifford Spencer officiating. Interment was made in Cedar Grove Cemetery with O. T. Sudduth and Co. in charge of arrangements.

Pall bearers included six uncles of the child: L. T. Wood, J. E. Barfield, Dee Taylor, J. F. Herring, Deb Herring and Mark Herring.

Besides the parents, survivors include a brother, J. T. Herring and a half-brother, Bennie Luxton.

## Registration Under Selective Service Act Begins Monday

Local headquarters for the registration of all male citizen from the ages of 18-26 under the Selective Service Act of 1948 will be set up in the courthouse at eight o'clock Monday morning with Frank M. Weigand in charge of the local board. Volunteer workers will provide the necessary clerical help to register the men. Seventeen working days will be needed to complete the registration as compared to one day in the 1940 registration. The form to be used will be about the size of a postcard and will contain sixteen questions. The questionnaire to be mailed the registrants later will contain many more information blanks to be filled in.

Specific days when men will register in the different age groups are as follows:

Men born in 1922 after August 30 will register on August 30.

Men born in 1923 will register on August 31 and September 1.

Men born in 1924 will register on September 2 and 3.

Men born in 1925 will register on September 4 or 7. This means there will be no registration on Labor Day.

Men born in 1926 will register on September 8 and 9.

Men born in 1927 will register on September 10 and 11.

Men born in 1928 will register on September 13 and 14.

Men born in 1929 will register on September 15 and 16.

Men born in 1930 before September 19 will register on September 17 and 18.

Hours of registration at the local board registration spots will be from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m.

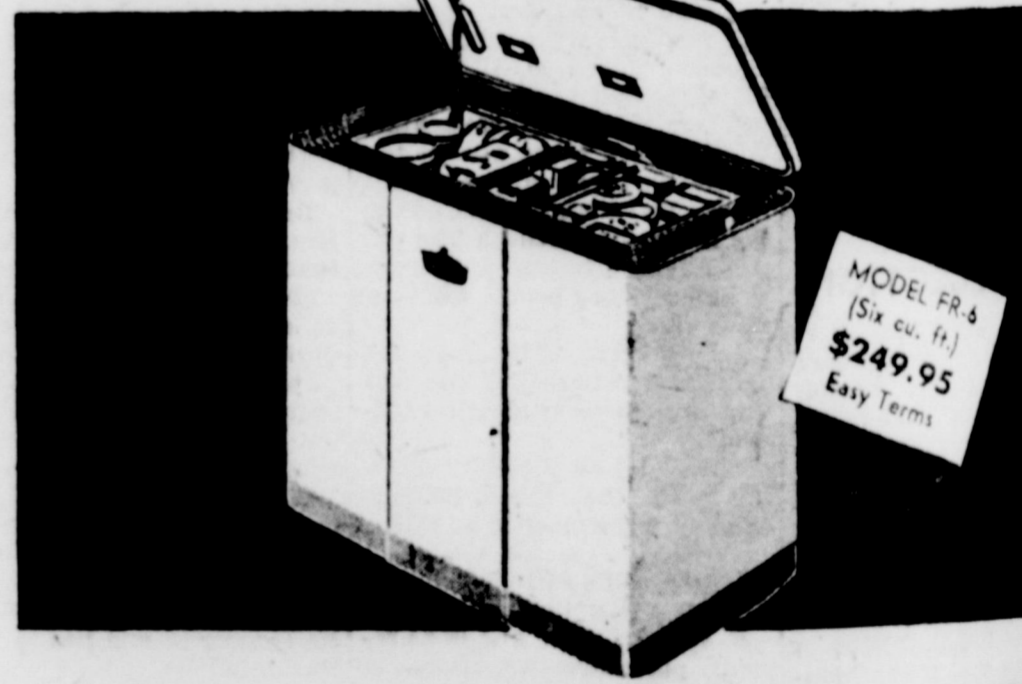
