## GIRL SCOUT DRIVE SETS GOAL OF \$800

The local Girl Scout drive will be launched Friday, October 1. Letters will be mailed to all residents of the county asking for contributions to the campaign and it is hoped that the drive can be completed in a week. The goal for the drive has been set at \$800. From this amount, the local troop will retain membership in the Permian Basin Council, make a payment on the Mire Peak Camp which will give all Scouts the privilege of attending the camp, pay for all crafts materials needed by the Scouts and provide some equipment for their hut which is still in the planning stage.

The work being done with the Girl Scouts and Brownies here is worthy of the support of the entire citizenship. Programs embodying recreational, cultural, and character-building activities for the girls are used.

The entire Girl Scout program is in the hands of women who serve as leaders, consultants, advisers, council and committee members.

The girls provide their uniforms but funds are necessary for other phases of the work.

## ALPINE BUCKS BEAT EAGLES 14-6 IN GAME LAST FRIDAY

The Alpine Bucks were present on the local gridiron when the Eagle squad fumbled themselves out of the possibility of winning last Friday night. Alpine's line set the pace and paved the way for that team to run up two touchdowns and allow two extra points to one touchdown for the Eagles.

The Eagles' offensive and defensive was very spasmodic in excellence. Several times it appeared as though the local boys were going to stop the other side of the double stripe only to have their offensive stopped by the charging Buck line or by a fumble.

Alpine received the first kickoff of the game and punted after three downs to their own 40-yard line. The Eagles carried the ball for two first downs to the Alpine 25-yard line where they lost the ball on downs. Alpine, in retaliation carried the ball down the field for two first downs to the Sanderson 26-yard stripe where they lost the ball on downs. The Eagles fumbled on their first play. Alpine recovered and punted after four attempts to make a first down. The first quarter ended scoreless with the Eagles in possession of the ball.

Their third down, Alpine punted on their fourth down and recovered the ball and lost the ball on downs. The two teams then exchanged fumbles; Sanderson once, Alpine once and the Eagles again, to set the ball up for a Buck touchdown. The ball was carried over on a sneak play and the extra point conversion was good. Sanderson received the kickoff late in the first half ending the second period after two scrimmage plays with the Bucks on top 7-0.

Sanderson received the kickoff after half time and made one first down then punted after failure to make ten yards in three plays. Alpine fumbled after three first downs and Sanderson carried the ball down the field on passes and runs to stop only after a goal had been made. The extra point attempt was blocked. Alpine received the kickoff and made their way down the field to threatening territory. A pass attempt was intercepted just before the third quarter ended. The Eagles had gained back six of their seven-point disadvantage.

The Eagles punted on the fourth down deep in their territory. The Alpine line again opened the way for the Bucks' speedy and elusive backfield to again score in the fourth period. They made their second touchdown on a line play good for about twenty yards. Their attempt at conversion was fumbled but picked up and ran over to make the score 14-6. The game ended shortly after the second Alpine touchdown.

The Eagles were much better on their passes than the Bucks. Their punting was for more yardage and first downs were equal. Both teams were using the T formation on all running and passing plays. The Alpine line seemed to be more adept at breaking into the backfield on the defensive and at opening holes on the offensive.

The Eagle touchdown was made by J. Harrell. Chamberlain to F. Harrell passes set up the touchdown play. Two other passes, Chamberlain to Harris in the first quarter and Chamberlain to Harris in the last quarter were both good for substantial gains. The Bucks attempted 12 passes, mostly little flat passes, and completed one. The Eagles attempted nine passes and completed five. J. Harrell was responsible for the most yardage gained by the backfield.

The Eagles will go to Fabens this week to engage that team on their home field. All who can are urged to attend the game.

Mr. Truman spoke briefly and assured the people here he would do all in his power to bring about conditions for better government, and in closing his remarks, said that if the people over the country would vote the straight Democratic Party ticket in November he would not have to worry about the housing shortage for another four years.
