BIG BALLOT READY FOR NOVEMBER VOTE

Wednesday marked the first day for the casting of absentee ballots for the November general election.

The ballot this year is record size, being 17x22 inches. In addition to the nominees of six parties for state and national offices and eight state constitutional amendments, there will be a list of district, county and precinct office-seekers.

The amendment regarding restricting should have the approval of all voters but the tax amendment is a debatable one on which there will be many opinions and conflicting views.

The other amendments to be considered by the voters include one which would provide workman's compensation insurance for county employees.

3% Discount On All 1948 Taxes During October

Tax statements have been mailed to Terrell County residents for 1948 taxes. All taxes paid in October will be discounted three per cent, those paid in November two per cent and all December tax payments will earn a one per cent discount.

SCHOOL ENROLLMENT 604 TO DATE

Enrollment in the Sanderson schools to date is 604 which is approximately the same figure as for several previous years.

LOCAL PAVING PROGRESSES

The paving project on the local streets is progressing rapidly this week with the starting of asphalt pouring about the middle of the week. It is expected that the work will be finished before the first of November.

The graders started working on the east side of town and are moving westward in front of the asphalt. The repair work has been completed on the already paved streets for the seal-coat which is authorized under the paving contract.

H. B. Zachry Construction Co. of San Antonio is contractor on the project at an estimated cost of \$18,500. Contract calls for flexible base and double asphalt coating of 55 blocks and a seal coat on 18 blocks paved several years ago.

Half of the cost is to be met by property owners on the streets to be paved; the other half is being borne by Terrell County. Money was collected last spring from property owners by members of the various clubs, under the direction of the Terrell County Civic Council. County's share will be financed by county warrants.

Russell Walker, city engineer of Fort Stockton, has been retained by the Terrell County Commissioners to supervise construction in the capacity of temporary county engineer.

M-SGT. ZENO GEERS DISCHARGED AFTER 13 YEARS SERVICE

Master Sergeant Zeno Edward Geers, of Dryden, a member of the 1893rd AACGS Group at Kelly Air Force Base, San Antonio, for the past two and one-half years has received his discharge from the Air Force.

He has been a member of the Air Force since July 11, 1935, when he enlisted for service at Dryden Airport. While serving at Dryden he became a charter member of the AACGS, which today is the third oldest organization in the Air Force.

Eagles Defeat Shorthorns In 20-0 Thriller on Local Grid

MARFA'S WINNING STREAK HALTED

The local football fans were treated last Friday night on the local gridiron when they witnessed a return of the old spark and drive common to last year's district championship team.

The Eagles received the first kick-off and brought the ball to their own 45 yard line but were forced to punt after failing to make their first down. Marfa fumbled the ball in their first time with the ball and Sanderson recovered it.

The Eagles again lost the ball on downs on the Marfa 5-yard line. Marfa again was forced to punt, this time to the fifty yard line. One pass, from J. Harrell to B. Chamberlain was complete but failed to make the necessary yardage and Sanderson again lost the ball on downs just before the first quarter ended.

Marfa was on their end of the field during the entire first period. When the second quarter began the Shorthorns lost five yards on a running play and quick-kicked. When Sanderson began the scrimmage they were unable to do much against the Shorthorn line, failed to complete one pass and punted. A long punt with the wind was nullified by the Marfa safety and J. Harrell recovered the ball on the Marfa 20-yard line for the Eagles. One pass across the left flat was incomplete for Sanderson then J. Harrell carried the ball off tackle for a first down. E. Smith, Eagle quarterback, went over the top for the first score.

The attempt at conversion failed.

Marfa received the kickoff on the east end of the field and failed to make first down yardage and punted. Sanderson's fumble, recovered by the Shorthorns put that team on the move for two first downs in a row and lost the ball on a pass interception by B. Chamberlain just before half time.

Sanderson kicked the ball to open the second half and the ball went into the first play on the Marfa 29-yard mark. The Shorthorns made two first downs for long gains, passed two incomplete and lost the ball on their 20. Sanderson punted to their own 43-yard line. Marfa was looming as a threat in the second half with their drive and power and yardage. On a wide run around their left end a

Man Charged In Two Assault Cases Faces Court Monday

Rafael Moncada, charged on two counts, will face trial Monday in District Judge Roger Thurmond's court when it convenes for the fall term. Moncada is charged with assault with intent to murder for the knife slashing of Luciano Trevino, Jr., about four months ago.

The week he was indicted by the grand jury for this offense, he was picked up by the sheriff's department for the alleged knife of a woman, Bernada Postos, while she was a passenger on an east-bound bus just out of Sanderson. The grand jury, still in session, heard evidence on this later charge and billed Moncada this time with assault with intent to murder with malice.

A civil case styled Mowery J. Smith versus H. L. Norris, et al, is on the docket for this term also. This case is a Trespass to Try Title suit, which has been pending for some time.

Marfa back fumbled the ball into the hands of B. Chamberlain who totted the ball about 80 yards east across the Marfa goal line. The extra point was made on a pass from Chamberlain to Marfa who returned the ball to their own 42-yard line. They made one first down, failed to complete a pass and punted on their fourth down. Sanderson started the play on their own 20 and made one first down. Two incomplete passes and scrimmage failed to net ten yards so the Eagles punted. Marfa started passing and threw two for failures before the third period ended.

Marfa's first play of the last quarter was a punt down to the Sanderson 25 yard line on the east end of the field. Sanderson made three first downs and had a pass intercepted by Marfa. Marfa came back with one first down and fumbled. Sanderson punted on their fourth down. Marfa fumbled the ball in their first play down in Sanderson territory. T. Hill carried the ball around the yard for a sizable gain and a first down followed by an end-around run with J. Harris totting for about 25 yards. This carried the ball up to scoring position and T. Hill reached pay-dirt right through the middle. A pass from Chamberlain to Smith made the extra point.

After the Sanderson kick Marfa started a barrage of passes which were all incomplete and punted on their fourth down. Sanderson made one first down before the game ended.

Marfa lost one attempt to score when a pass bounced in the end zone and on another pass that was just long of its mark into the end zone.

The Eagle team, even though it is composed of the same boys, is an entirely different team from the one which met the Alpine Bucks here and suffered mightily at the hands of that team. Their defeat over Marfa last week could cause a serious upset in District 6-B football and its outcome.

All of the Eagles were playing heads-up football against the Shorthorns. They had a small disadvantage of weight which was made up in their teamwork and team spirit. It's impossible to say that any man on the Eagle team was outstanding in the fact that it appeared that each was performing his duties to a high degree of perfection to assist each of the other ten.

Roman, flashing Shorthorn back, showed up well for his team. He was good for sizable gains each time he carried the ball and his elusiveness made him a difficult target for tacklers. Marfa uses the single and double wing formation. This Friday, October 15, is an open date for the Eagles and the following Friday San Felipe will come here for their first meeting with the Eagles this year in a non-conference game.

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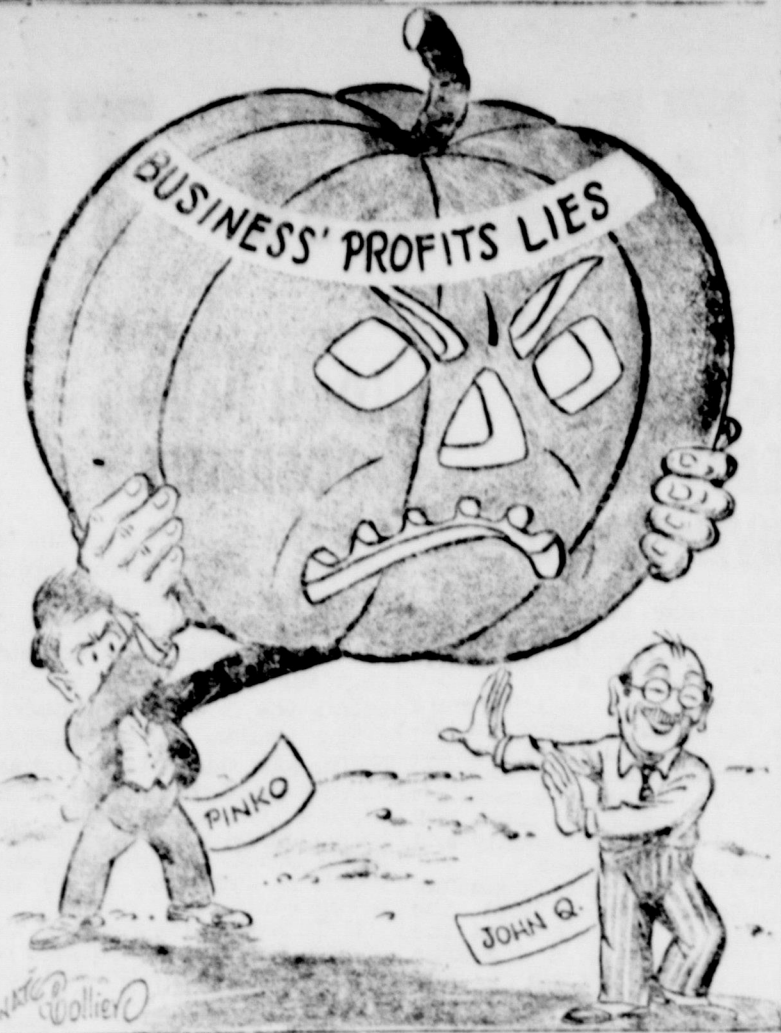
FOR REDISTRICTING

BE THOU AN EXAMPLE Paul, who was an old battle-scarred soldier of the gospel, exhorts Timothy, his young son in the faith, in these challenging words: 'Let no man despise thy youth; be thou an example of the believers, in word, in manner of life, in charity, in spirit, in faith, in purity.' The admonitions could just as aptly be applied to all God-fearing, Christian-principled men and women today. This is a decade of busy people. Everyone is dashing and hurrying from place to place - busy with the affairs of life. Many will not take time to read God's word and learn their duty and responsibility to-



ward Him. These same people, however, do notice the lives that others live before them and to a great extent are influenced by them.
