of that power to dominate all of Europe and destroy every possible vestige of Western democratic influences. Had Russia even gone through the motions of cooperating with the Western nations in implementing the peace, and had she shown even a modicum of restraint in her dealings with the little nations that border on her boundaries, it is doubtful if the American Congress and the American people would have the approval of anything resembling an effective foreign alliance.

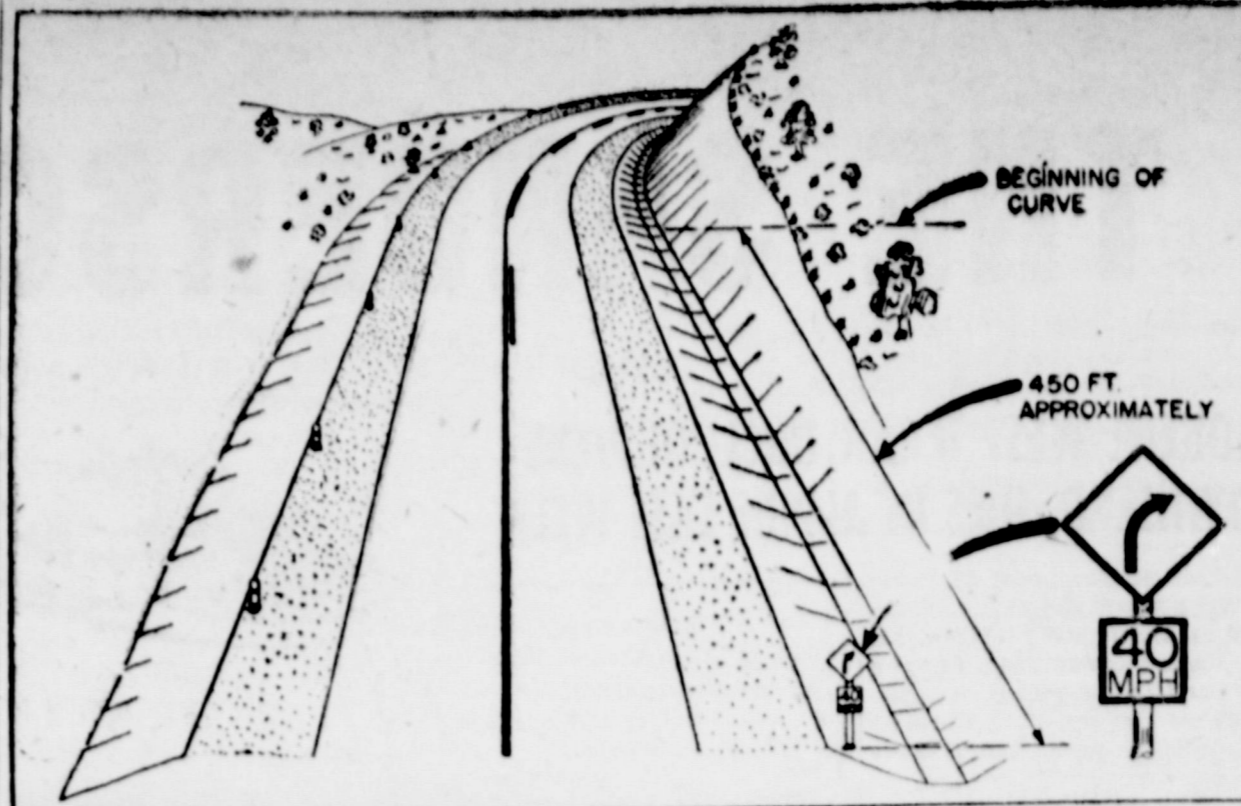
According to John M. Hightower, an AP foreign editor, "State department officials plan to consult leaders of Congress and the major political parties to find what they will support in the final drafting of a proposed treaty to create a North American mutual defense system." The countries which will be initially involved besides the U. S. are Canada, Britain, France, Belgium, Luxembourg, and the Netherlands.

Preliminary talks have already been held between the ambassadors of these nations and Undersecretary of State Lovett, who has been doing a great deal of quiet, but important spadework for the future while his chief, General Marshall, has been occupied with critical current problems.

Mr. Hightower reports that diplomatic authorities feel that a number of major points will survive negotiations and be formally enacted. Among them are: 1. The participating nations will form the nucleus of the non-communist alliance.

2. Other non-communist powers should be included. 3. If any of the ones involved is attacked, all the others will consider that they have been attacked as well. 4. Thereafter each nation would take "appropriate action" in accordance with its own particular constitutional processes.

This is indicative of the progress the west is making in cementing its strength against possible aggression. It is reas-

enable to assume that such an alliance would be followed by outright military aid on a large scale to the countries of Europe which join. All of them are militarily weak, to varying degrees, and they want planes, tanks, ammunition, and so on. And in view of many an alliance on paper wouldn't mean much unless it were solidly backed up by material power.

There is still another point that deserves wide mention — the courage that small European countries have shown in resisting Russia. That resistance is fairly easy for us, with our enormous military potential and our possession of a huge country which has been free of foreign invasion. It is a very different thing for poor and devastated countries which have been fought over at almost regular intervals for centuries, and which are within easy reach of the powerful Russian bear with his innumerable divisions, his planes, his submarines and his guns. The anti-communist leaders in those countries certainly do gain control — the example of Czechoslovakia alone is sufficient. And even the rank and file of Western sympathizers know that there would probably

be an unpleasant fate in store for them too — the communists obtain their forced labor gangs from those who oppose them. All in all, the peoples of Western Europe have shown a fine degree of resolution in standing up for what they believe to be right
