

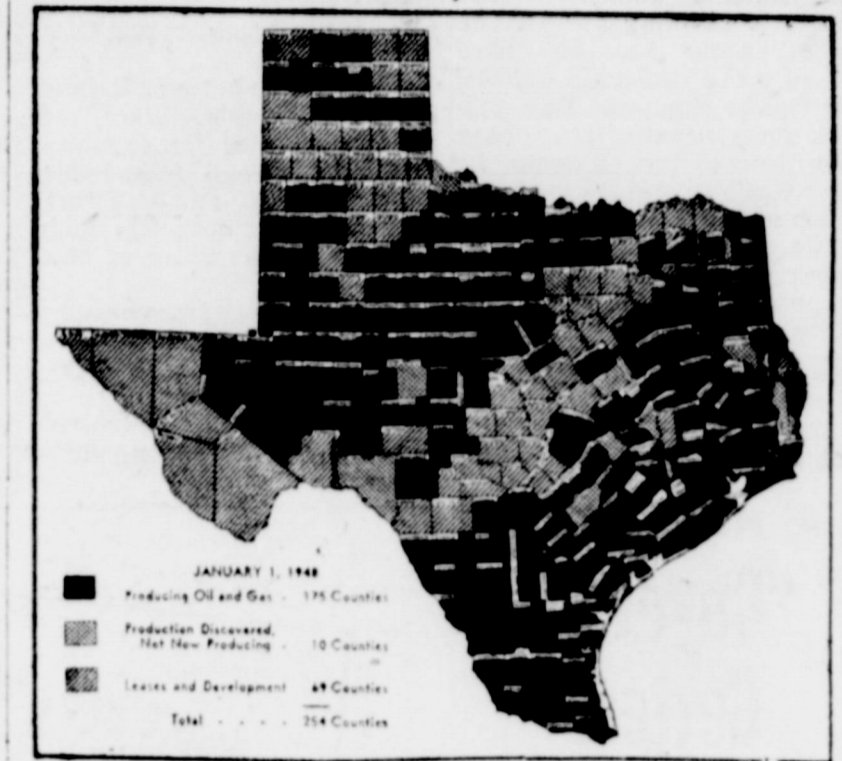

COMMITTEE TO HEAD CONSERVATION TO BE NAMED AT MEET

County rancher committee elections will be held in Terrell County on December 18, 1948, at the county office, Herbert A. Brown, chairman of the County Agricultural Conservaitn Committee announced today.

At these elections committee-men to administer the Agricultural Conservation Program and related programs for 1949 will be chosen. Since both the Agricultural Conservation Program and Price Supports are of vital concern to ranchers of this county it is to the best interest of each rancher to participate in this election.

This range program with its elected rancher committees gives the ranchmen an opportunity to administer their own program. It is truly a democratic method of administration.

Mr. Brown said that any person who is participating in the 1948 Agricultural Conservation Program who is eligible for a commodity loan or other price support or who has a contract with the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation is eligible to vote in the elections.

The voting will be in the local ACA office, December 18, 1948. Producers may vote by mail or at the central box.

Every rancher who is eligible to vote has a responsibility to cast his or her ballot, the chairman states. "We may well be at the cross-roads this year. We may neglect our opportunity to administer our own program and let control of agriculture slip away from us. Or we may unite back of the range program and build for a better, stronger agriculture in the future. It is our choice."

Nearly One-Third of Texas Under Oil & Gas Leases

Dallas, Nov. 30— About 58,000,000 acres of Texas land, nearly one-third of the state's area, has been leased for oil and gas exploration and production, a report published by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association indicated today.

Land has been leased from land-owners in each of the 254 counties the report showed, and there is oil and gas production in 175 counties at the first of 1948. Ten more counties have had production but are not producing now. During 1947, Kenedy, San Augustine and Sterling counties produced oil for the first time.

The Texas petroleum industry during 1947 paid Texas land-owners scattered over 254 counties, a total of \$331,738,000 for leases, rentals, bonuses, and royalties.

Landowners last year received more than \$89,348,000 in lease and bonus payments. The report said this sum was a "considerable income in view of the fact that only a portion of these leases will ever become productive."

"When the property is productive, the landowner receives royalty payments which average slightly more than one-eighth of the oil or gas produced," the report stated. "These payments in Texas during 1947 were \$242,390,000."

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BUTANE SHORTAGE AVERTING STUDIED

AUSTIN, Nov. 26 —An effort to head off a possible shortage of butane gas this winter was organized here Tuesday of last week.

Many Texans were cold last winter when their butane tanks ran out. Butane and propane is widely used for fuel in rural areas where piped natural gas is not available.

Butane dealers and producers agreed at a meeting called by Governor Jester's emergency fuel commission there was plenty

of butane — the problem was one of storage and distribution.

They concluded the long-range answer to such situations as last winter's local shortage is increased storage by producers, distributors and consumers.

Both groups named advisory committees to work with the fuel commission — an unofficial agency named by the governor last year when the situation became acute. They will be ready to act if a shortage threatens. Committee members have the responsibility to anticipate possible shortages in regions they represent.
