Patients will be cared for. This final emergency has been brought about by the occurrence of 2 nationwide epidemics in less than 3 years and a continuing steady high polio incidence. The large number of carry-over cases from the past two or hree years added to the tremendous number of cases stricken this year who will need hospital care for years to come will place a very heavy financial burden on Texas Chapters. It is estimated that should Texas not have one single new case of polio in 1949, the cost of continued care which must be met by Texas chapters will amount to more than \$900, 000.00 during 1949.

The 1949 March of Dimes in 1st provide enough money to re'nu'd the Emergency Aid Reserve Fund to secure the research program, and to provide continued service for those infantile paralysis victims who must remain in the hospital for years to come.
