Terrell Citizens Buy \$75,432.75 In Savings Bonds

The people of Terrell County bought \$75,432.75 worth of U. S. Savings Bonds during 1948, according to a year-end report by Harry Owens of Dallas, state director for Savings Bonds.

Mr. Owens said that Texans now own more than \$1.5 billion worth of Savings Bonds which earned \$42,372,000 in interest in the year.

To illustrate the practical aspects of thrift, as represented by the Savings Bond program, Mr. Owens pointed out that the annual interest from bonds held by Texans, if converted into residential construction, would build 4,237 homes costing \$10,000 each, or, if considered in terms of higher education or wages and salaries, would give a four-year college education to 14,124 students at the rate of \$750 per year, or provide an income of \$225 per month for a full year for 15,693 persons.

Mr. Owens said that of the state's total bond sales last year, Series E, the "people's bond" accounted for \$139,591,216.25, or 71 per cent.

"There are more Savings Bonds in the hands of the people today than ever before," he said. "Almost 70 per cent of all bonds ever issued are still in the possession of their original owners. The sale of Series E bonds in Texas alone during 1948 was \$4,940,447.50 more than for 1947."

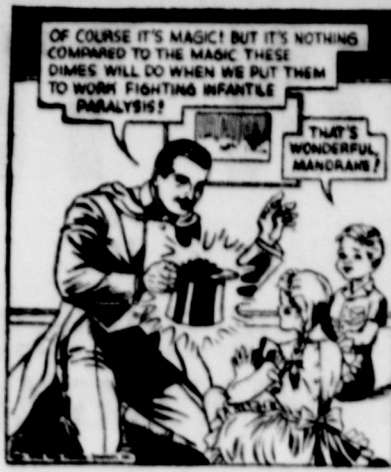
Both speakers lauded the Lobos for the victories, sportsmanship and good will created for Sul Ross during the season.

Help Sought In Preventing Epidemic Of Mumps In Texas

AUSTIN, January 20. —Commenting on the necessity for individual cooperation in effecting the control of mumps, now widespread throughout the state, Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, emphasizes the fact that the contagion factor is present before any symptoms appear, and strict isolation of all patients is the surest means of controlling this disease.

Mumps is transmitted by direct contact with an infected person or articles freshly contaminated by the secretions of the mouth or nose of persons having the disease. It takes from 12 to 26 days for mumps to manifest itself after infection occurs. The disease can be easily transmitted, but one attack usually establishes permanent immunity and second attacks are very rare.

The most easily recognizable characteristic symptom of the disease is a painful swelling of the salivary glands. Sometimes there is an involvement of other portions of the body causing disturbances in the digestive, nervous, circulatory and genito-urinary systems. The disease is usually accompanied by a temperature rise which more often than not is mild.

"Patients suffering from the disease should be isolated from other member of the family immediately upon the suspicion that mumps exists, and the family physician should be called in promptly," Dr. Cox said. "In the meantime, complete rest in bed is indicated. The doctor's orders should be followed strictly. Violating his instructions can lead to serious injury, which may permanently affect the patient's health."

A daughter, Juanita, was born to Mr. and Mrs. Ornato Garcia, January 19. She is the first child for the Garcias.

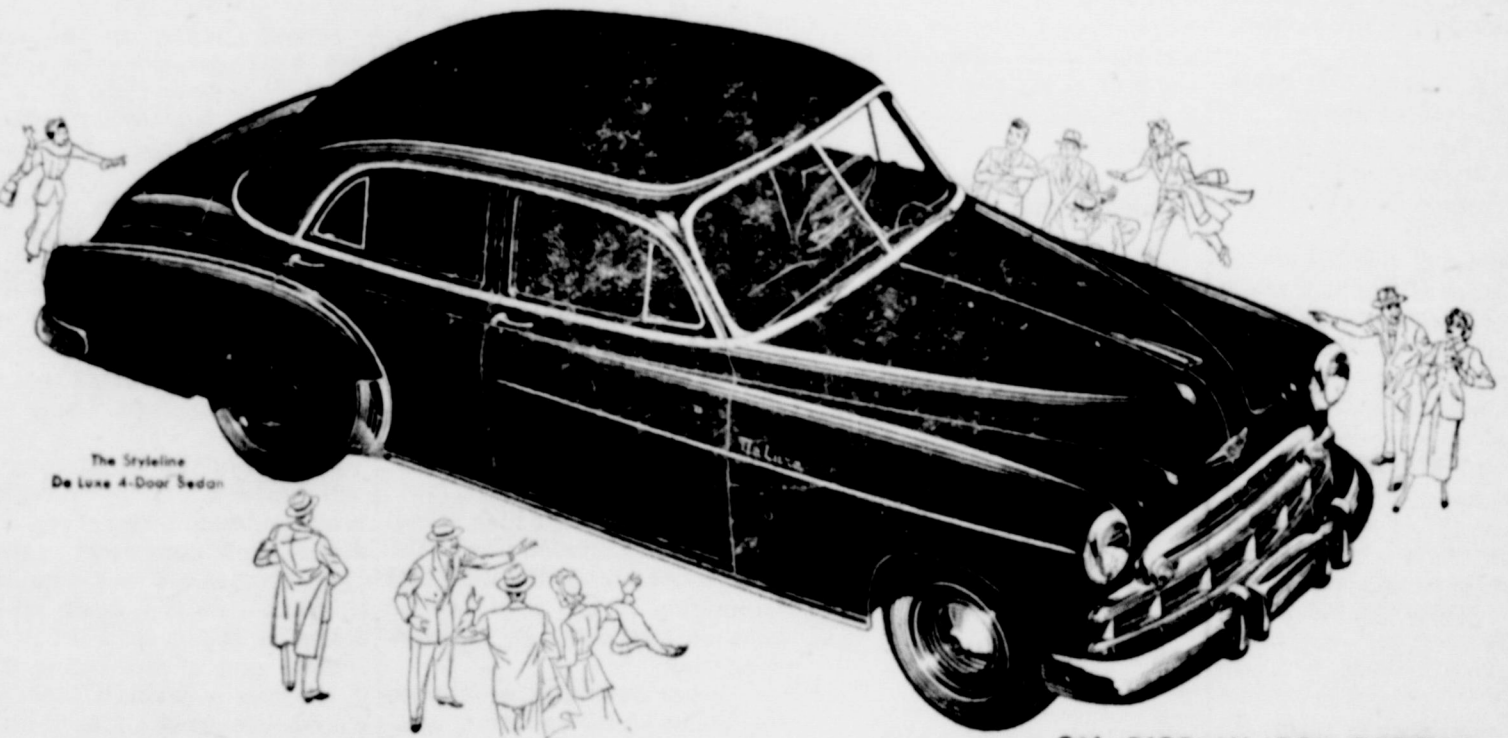

Pupils in the local schools made a personal canvass over the town last week with dime-cards in an effort to swell contributions to the March of Dimes.

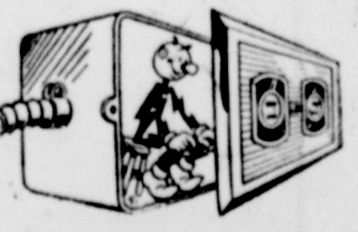

price control will not be imposed and it is doubtful if, under current conditions the President will ask for it. It is probable that a modified public housing bill will pass, but not so extensive a measure as the Administration favors. The military budgets will be the subject of much debate, and it is quite possible that the \$15,000,000,000 ceiling which Mr. Truman espouses will be exceeded. And, if coming events seem to justify it, an all-inclusive stand-by bill, to go into immediate effect if another national emergency is declared by Congress, may be passed.

Economic Highlights

Each session of each branch of Congress is opened with a prayer, in which a chaplain usually expresses the hope that the lawmakers will be blessed with a high degree of wisdom. That hope will be shared by everyone in the country to an unusual extent this year.

In the field of foreign policy, the Marshall Plan, probably with extensive revisions, will be continued. The acts of Paul Hoffman, in his role as chief, ERP, have met with general approval of the members of both parties. But there are great unanswered questions remaining — as, for instance, what if anything we shall do about China, and what changes may be made in our controversial policies in Greece, where American officers are to all intents and purposes active military leaders in the civil war. The fact that communism throughout the world has made great strides since the last Congress met, will not go unremarked.

On the domestic front, the first matters of business will be concerned with the legislative program laid down by the President during and after the campaign. As the outlook shapes up now, the Taft-Hartley Act will be extensively revised, but it will not be repealed in toto. Direct

eliminated outright or combined with others. The motive of the Hoover Commission is to give Congress a clear and detailed blueprint which will make remedial action possible.

Congress has a bombshell on its hands in the amain evidence produced by the Un-American Activities Investigation. The Whitaker Chambers-Alger-Hiss affair cannot be passed off without going into every ramification of the matter and finding out where the truth lies. It seems plain the confidential government information, some in the top secret classification, found its way into the hands of foreign agents, and that American officials must have cooperated in one fashion or another for this to happen. The temper of Congress is too ferret out what happened, and to make such occurrences impossible in the future.

of economic advisors, there is no hope for a substantial reduction in governmental spending "for years to come". In the view of others, that opinion is not necessarily right. That is one reason why the Hoover report on governmental reorganization has been so eagerly awaited in many circles.

This report, which is the work of a huge staff of experts working under the ex-President, is the most complete analysis of the mechanics of our government ever attempted. Excerpts from it have been published, and the whole report will be available before long. The purpose of the monumental work is to find ways and means to make government more efficient and more economical without eliminating any necessary service.

The report is critical of the military services, on the grounds that desirable cooperation among them in many matters has not been accomplished, and that each service maintains expensive, overlapping bureaus which should be consolidated. It believes that we have not made much progress toward the goal of unification; and that extensive reorganization of our system of administering the whole defense establishment is necessary.

The report recommends important changes in the manner of operation of the sprawling post office department, designed to place it on a sounder financial basis. At present, post office revenues all go into the general fund of the treasury and Congress makes appropriations each year for meeting the department's expenses. The report recommends that the post office keep its revenues and pay its overhead out of them. In this connection, the Postmaster General will ask for higher mail rates on some classifications.

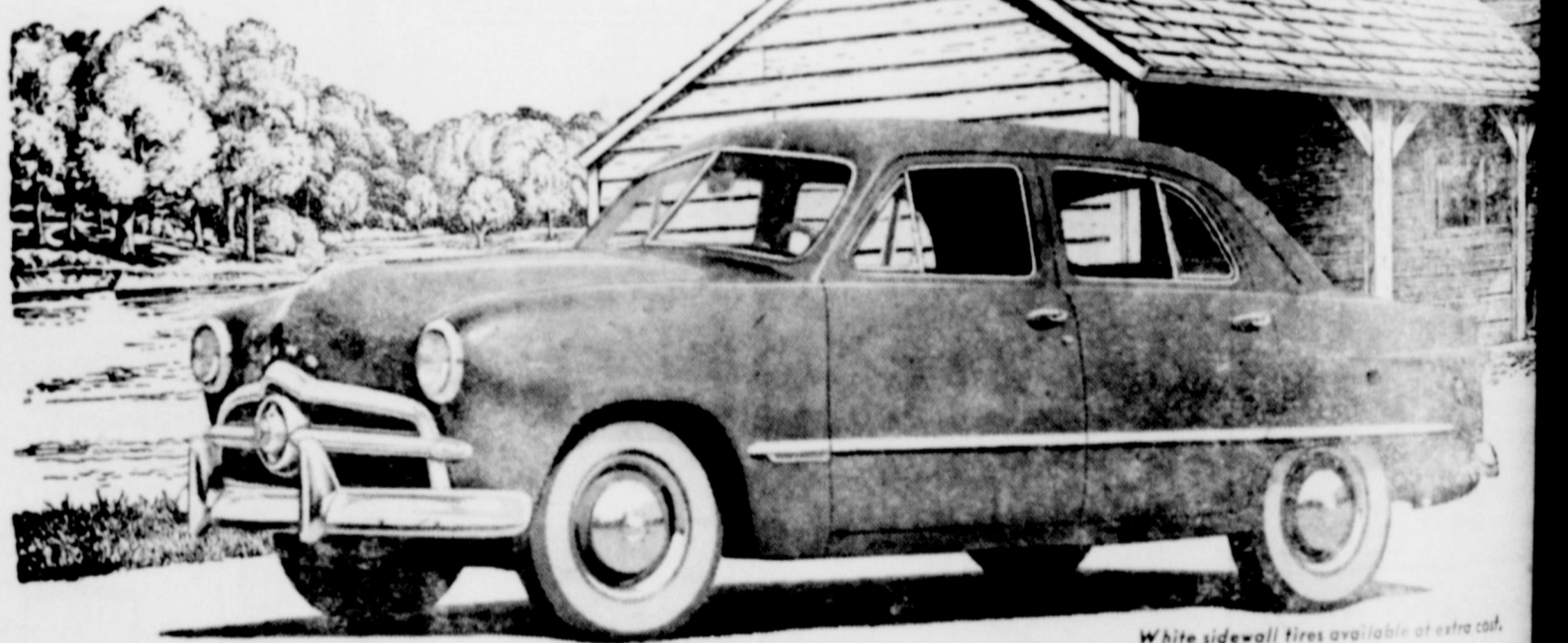

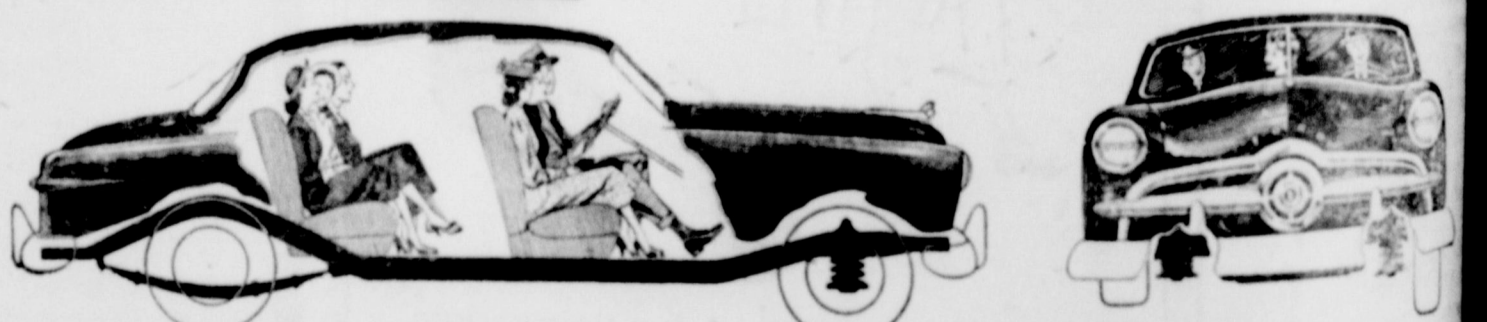
