FELIX VALLES HURT IN FREAK ACCIDENT SUNDAY MORNING

Felix Valles, 28, was seriously injured in an accident at the State Highway barn east of town Sunday morning.

Valles was working around a maintainer in the warehouse yard when his jumper sleeve was caught in the universal joint on the power take-off. When his body was revolved around the drive shaft, Valles suffered numerous bruises and cuts on the body and head and face. The drag on the engine caused the motor to stop due to the fact that it had just been started and was cold and when Valles was found it was necessary to cut a portion of the frame work of the maintainer away with a cutting torch to remove him between the braces and crossmembers of the maintainer. He suffered third degree burns on the back from lying against the exhaust until he could be extricated and he lost several of his front teeth.

After receiving treatment from a local physician Valles was taken to an Alpine hospital in an O. T. Sudduth and Co. ambulance and his condition is reported to be satisfactory.

Valles has been in the employ of the State Highway Department for eight years and has a wife and three children.

MITCHELL WELL SHOWS GAS, NO OIL

Humble No. 1 J. C. Mitchell, Terrell County wildcat, plugged back from 12,074 to 7,972 feet, perforated casing from 7,900-20 and from 7,930-50 feet in a Pennsylvania sand, swabbed 17 and 3-4 cubic feet and showed 125,000 cubic feet of gas daily, with no oil. Swabbing continued.

Increased Payments On Taxes Noted, 461 Poll Taxes Issued

Terrell County residents have flocked to the tax assessor and collector's office during the past week to pay poll and property taxes before the January 31 deadline.

After next Monday, property and school taxes will be subject to penalties and interest.

Poll taxes cannot be secured after Monday. Many voters do not expect to use a poll tax this year, but school trustee elections are scheduled for April and voters may be called upon at any time to vote in any special elections that may be called.

Of \$107,213.06 in taxes due, \$90,347.22 has been paid to date, according to W. D. O'Bryant, deputy tax collector.

Almost one hundred poll taxes have been paid during the past week bringing the total up to 461 which is over half of the usual voting strength of the county.

Schools Start Second Semester, Easter Only Holiday Scheduled

Monday marked the beginning of the second semester for the local schools. Final exams were given Thursday and Friday of last week.

A slight increase in enrollment in the Sanderson schools is noted for the second semester, according to C. G. Bradford, superintendent.

The next holiday scheduled is the Easter holidays for April 14-15. With Saturday and Sunday included this will mean four days holidays for the Easter season.

Pecos County Asks Bids For Fencing On Sanderson Road

Judge Dan Bihl of Fort Stockton gave notice last week that the Commissioners' Court of Pecos County would receive bids at its next term of court on February 14 on the construction of fencing along portions of a 19,338-mile stretch of Highway 285 between Sanderson and Fort Stockton.

The State Highway Department has requested the county to take immediate action to secure right-of-way deeds from affected land-owners and easement holders along the route, with exception that the stretch may be included in the March letting of the commission.

A fifteen-mile section of the road in the county northwest toward Fort Stockton already is under construction by H. B. Zachry Construction Co., with completion expected in the late spring or early summer. The section planned for March letting would connect with the portion now being built by Zachry, and would leave only two portions to be contracted — the extreme ends between the two towns.

Engineering work and plans are underway on both the Terrell County stretch of some 11 miles and the remaining Pecos County gap immediately southeast of Fort Stockton of about 18 miles.

In the fencing contract to be let February 14 allowance is being made for a considerable amount of present fence which remains where it is since the road follows present right-of-way in several places.

Specifications of the fencing work are being worked out by the court and may be obtained from Judge Bihl or Commissioner Clayton Williams in Fort Stockton.

HIGHWAY 51 ASSN. NOW INCLUDES TERRELL COUNTY

Judge R. S. Wilkinson and Sid Harkins attended a meeting of the Texas Division International Parks Highway Association in Littlefield early this month at which time Terrell County was voted into membership in Highway 51 Association.

One of the projects of the association is to get the highway from Sheffield to Sanderson paved and made a part of Highway 51 which connects with the Big Bend National Park.

Other business transacted by the body included the passing of a resolution to be sent to the Panhandle Water Conservation Authority in Amarillo asking that if a feasible site is found across the Canadian River, north of Vega, and the dam built, that it be so constructed to afford a crossing for the International Parks Highway.

Two series of cars, the Fleetline and Styleline, are included with De Luxe treatment an option in most body types. De Luxe cars lay increased emphasis on the styling of fabrics, trim and appointments.

EAGLE BAND TO PLAY IN CLINIC IN DEL RIO FEB. 5

Plans for the second annual Del Rio Band Festival Clinic on February 5 are being completed rapidly, according to word received this week.

Twelve bands will be given 30 minutes each before an audience and three judges for constructive criticism. After that they will be given an additional 30 minutes in a private room under the baton of a visiting judge.

Bands planning to attend include the following: Bracketville, Comstock, San Felipe, Eagle Pass, Sonora, Carrizo Springs, Crystal City, Fort Stockton, Sanderson, Pearsall, Marathon, Uvalde and Del Rio.

The bands will play a march and two overtures of contest selection. Criticism from the judges will enable each band to correct and perfect its renditions before contest time, it was announced.

After a barbecue at noon and a parade, a two-hour rehearsal will be held for 100 top-ranking band members, chosen from the participating bands. An all-star concert will be given that night in the auditorium. At the conclusion of the program a trophy will be awarded the outstanding band.

Judges will be H. A. Vetter of Luther Burbank High School in San Antonio, R. A. Dhossche, of Tech High School in San Antonio and John Carrico of Sul Ross in Alpine.

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Long-Awaited Beneficial Rain Soaks Entire County Area

TERRELL COUNTY ALLOTTED \$41,600 FOR 1949 BY ACA

All of the funds now available for Terrell County producers have been allocated by the County Agricultural Conservation Association, Louise R. Klemer, secretary, announced today.

The year's total allotment for this county was \$41,600, nearly twice the amount for 1948, which was \$27,800.

Allocations were made to 57 producers of this county in 1948. The local secretary said the 1949 program has been completed and producers anticipate a highly successful year in soil building and saving.

The following are the practices approved for Terrell County: Construction of terraces for which necessary outlets and water-ways are provided; construction of diversion terraces to control excess water; leveling for irrigation land for which water is available; drilling or digging wells for livestock water; installing pipe lines for livestock water; construction of earthen dams or reservoirs for livestock water or erosion control; construction of concrete or rubble-masonry dams or drops for livestock water or erosion control; elimination of destructive plants on noncrop pasture and range land; reseeding range or pasture land by deferred grazing; establishing or improving permanent pasture by seeding adapted pasture grasses, pasture legumes, or mixture of grasses and legumes; application of potash and superphosphate.

The first general rain to fall over Terrell County in over two years came last Friday and Saturday. John Harrison, J. Garner, Austin Nance and A. A. Shelton, who ranch in the south part of the county where drouth conditions have prevailed for over two years, report at least an inch of rain on their ranches. The one and one-half inches of rain for January is above the normal amount expected.

The moisture that has come to this area during the past two weeks has almost been absorbed to the last drop. The moisture which turned to ice and the snow which fell the first of last week melted slowly. Little water was noted in draws and ditches after the slow steady rainfall of Friday and Saturday. Heavy fogs settling over the country in the evenings have been indicative of the prevailing moisture.

Weeds have begun to come out almost as if by magic after the warm weather and sunshine of the past week. The sheep of the area which have been fed for several months have stood the cold wet weather with no shrinkage or losses. A few small flocks of ewes are lambing now but February and March is the general lambing season.

An inch of rain was recorded in Sanderson on the official gauge over the week end. A fresh norther blowing in Monday evening and freezing temperatures Tuesday also saw .03-inch rainfall which froze as it fell.
