County To Fight Flies

Terrell County Commissioners in regular session Monday, authorized the purchase of a spraying machine to be used in keeping outbuildings and trash dumps sprayed during the fly-breeding season.

The move was taken after Commissioner Jack Laughlin stressed the need for more sanitary measures in Sanderson.

Dr. J. C. Kern, county health officer, stated to the court that breeding places for flies could be eliminated or curbed by the use of the spray if the garbage is collected frequently and with the cooperation of the property owners in providing proper trash barrels and places to burn all refuse before the collections are made. It was suggested by the health officer that every family be asked to place garbage containers at the alleys where they will be easily accessible to the haulers.

Old oil drums may be made into desirable trash burners, the health officer stated, and with frequent burnings it will greatly aid in the prevention of fly-breeding. The use of lime in all out-door toilets was also suggested as a means of sanitation.

Commissioners B. Carson, Sid Harkins and Charlie Turk were in accord with Commissioner Laughlin in the sanitary move.

County Judge R. S. Wilkinson presided at the meeting.

Nathan E. La Crosse Dies Here Monday, Buried in Del Rio

Nathan E. LaCrosse, 52, died in the bunk house of the T&NO railroad here Monday about 9:30 p. m., following a heart attack. He was a freight conductor on the T&NO and resided in Del Rio.

A funeral home in Del Rio sent an ambulance for the body that night. Funeral services are tentatively set for Friday pending the arrival of a sister, Mrs. T. B. Croal, who, with her husband, are en route to Del Rio from Las Vegas, Nevada. Several nieces and nephews are the only other survivors.

Mr. LaCrosse attended the local theatre early in the evening and a man in an adjoining room heard him fall about thirty minutes after he had gone to his room. A local physician, who was summoned, pronounced him dead after examination.

He had resided in Del Rio for 45 years and had been in the employ of the railroad for 28 years.

Funeral Services For P. R. Benavides Saturday Afternoon

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at St. James Catholic Church for Protacio Ramirez Benavides, 50, who was the victim of an accident at Harrell's Dairy last Thursday morning. Burial was in Santa Rita Cemetery with O. T. Sudduth and Co. in charge of the arrangements.

Survivors include the widow, Mrs. Andria Saenz Benavides and three children, Maria Louisa, Rosa and Juan Jose.

Benavides, with Samuel Faz, was digging a hole adjoining an old cesspool which had been abandoned several years at the dairy. The concrete wall of the old pool suddenly collapsed and the debris and refuse pinned his body to the wall of the hole. Liquid was about eighteen inches over his head and he died from asphyxiation by drowning. Faz was not in the nine-foot hole at the time of the accident.

Lynn Harrell, owner of the dairy, and other men, made several futile attempts to remove his body from the hole and finally had to dip the refuse out and then dig the debris and refuse from around the body.

The accident occurred about 9 in the morning and it was almost 12 before the body was recovered.

W. H. Nessmith's Father Dies Sunday

TERRELL COUNTY WELCOMES EARLY SPRING WEATHER

The cold wave predicted for this section of Texas for the past week failed to materialize. Instead, balmy weather with bright sunshine has prevailed for two weeks. A high wind out of the south reached dust-storm proportions for a short time Monday and local residents expected that to usher in the cold wave. A slight drop in temperature was noted Wednesday but it is Spring weather in Terrell County.

GROUND BROKEN FOR FIRE HOUSE

Work was started this week on the new fire house for the Sanderson Volunteer Fire Department. O. J. Cresswell is the contractor for the building which is expected to cost around \$3300.

The building committee met this week to lay the final plans for the structure which will be built on the lot just south of Hal Tyler's Repair Shop. It is the plans of the committee to carry out in every way possible the needs of the fire department and the wishes of the people of Sanderson. Since the building will be expected to last for many years, the firemen and the committee feels that no expense should be spared in insuring a stable structure and one that will be serviceable with the expected needs of the group.

The firemen this year will endeavor to press the fund-raising campaign to supplement the money on hand that will go toward the cost of construction of the new building with letters to be mailed out to the citizens. Each year the firemen appeal to the citizens through their past efforts and work in obtaining a 25 per cent good fire credit for all fire insurance policy holders, thus making a saving of \$3,000 annually to the insured. This fact alone, bringing to mind that it is because of the efficient fire-fighting crews that the community has had since the organization of the fire department, proves that money invested in prevention and control of fires does pay, and that those who are insured are the only recipients of the benefits is not, of course, true, since all the residents derive equal protection from the fire department.

Work on the building is expected to last about five weeks.

LEE SHARP CONNECTED WITH NEW PAPER

A new paper, "The West Texas Livestock Weekly," made its debut this week with Volume 1, Number 1. It is published in San Angelo, Texas.

In a letter to W. P. Wallace, Jr., president of the Board of Trustees of the Del Rio Independent School District, under date of February 12, Mr. Wallace was informed that the Del Rio public schools had been removed from the list of accredited schools until the segregation of Latin-Americans and Anglo-Americans had been corrected, according to the agreement with the board of trustees and Dr. L. A. Woods, state school superintendent, on his recent visit to Del Rio.

The trustees had been allowing the Latin-American pupils to attend the school of their choice after Dr. Woods had notified them that they would have to place all Latin-American and Anglo-American pupils of the same grade in the same building or take the risk of losing their accredited rating.

The Del Rio School board has asked for a hearing before the State Board of Education as a repeal from the ruling of Dr. Woods. When the hearing is held the finding of the state board will constitute an affirmation or reversal of the order of Dr. Woods.

In the event the board upholds Dr. Woods, the Del Rio School Board may appeal to the state courts.

WOMAN SUES FOR \$20,000 AFTER USING WAVE KIT

"You'd surely know which one had used the home-waving kit on her hair," a New Hartford woman says in a suit against half a dozen defendants, which was docketed this week in Hartford Superior Court.

According to Mrs. Lillian Prout use of a chemical waving kit left her sick and partly bald.

In the suit drawn by Atty. Charles N. Segal the first against the company in that area—Mrs. Prout asks for \$20,000 damages to pay her for pain and suffering and humiliation, and to reimburse her for medical care.

According to the complaint, Mrs. Prout bought a home-waving kit and "applied the contents thereof in accordance with the instructions in the package."

Immediately afterward, she

complains, "she experienced an intense burning and inflammation of the scalp and surrounding tissues shortly thereafter her hair began to break off and fall out; her scalp became tender and itchy and scaly; bald areas of the scalp resulted and are multiplying; and there is grave danger she will become completely bald;" and in addition she suffers severe headaches and has suffered a severe shock to her nervous system.

The lawsuit is directed against a company which does a multi-million-dollar business in manufacturing the kits; the owner of the drugstore where it was purchased; and four wholesale firms as distributors.

She bases her action on the charge that the kits contained dangerous chemicals and ingredients, and that she didn't know the danger of them but that the defendants did, or they should have.

MEDICAL PRICES WILL INCREASE

Shortages always raise prices. The Texas Medical Association, by restricting enrollment in Texas medical schools to barely enough to replace deaths and retirement has cut down our supply of doctors, especially in our rural areas, thereby causing a shortage and higher fees for services, while 3,000 pre-med students find the gates barred against them.

This same medical association now plans to get control of the supply of all competitive healing professions, so they can cut off replacements in these healing professions and make the shortage even more acute and thus raise the prices higher than today.

The Basic Science Bill (H.B. 63) is designed to give the Med-

ical Association complete control of all branches of the healing arts and it is being pushed by unlimited funds and a high-priced lobby. 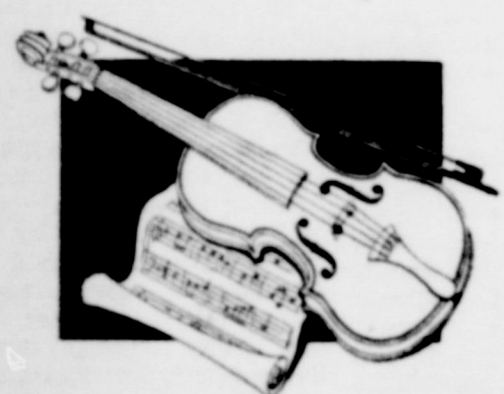

KITCHEN MEMO
Hot weather is no time to fash about meals. Introduce cool King Neptune salad with a hot soup, supplement salad and soup with nourishing wheat toast waters, add iced tea and ice cream and you have a simple evening supper. For the salad, combine one 12-oz. can flaked tuna fish (1 1/2 cups), 1/2 cup diced celery, 1 cup diced cucumber and 1/2 tsp. grated onion. Mix 1 tsp. lemon juice, 1/2 tsp. catsup, 1/2 cup mayonnaise, add to tuna fish mixture, season with salt and pepper, toss lightly, chill. Wash 4 tomatoes, remove stem, chill. Cut tomatoes into fourths, petal fashion, only about two-thirds, enough to spread petals. Stuff with fish mixture. Serve on crisp salad greens. Serves 6.

Your automatic washer uses up from 20 to 30 gals. of hot water while you are washing for a half hour to an hour. Because of its "quick recovery" an automatic gas water heater keeps well ahead of such increased hot water demands in the home. Leftover sandwiches can be well wrapped in wax paper and damp towel and put in the refrigerator. Next day take them out, spread with melted butter or margarine and toast under the broiler flame. Corduroy play clothes and towels need not be ironed when dried in an automatic gas dryer. Just take them out when faintly damp, and smooth with the hands. The button holes of wool sweaters often stretch during washing. Sew them up before laundering to keep them in their original shape.

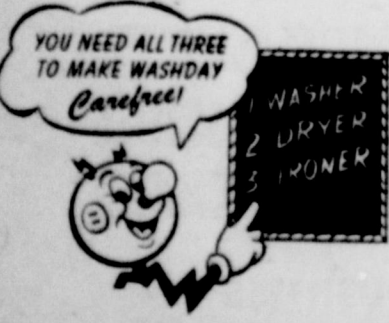

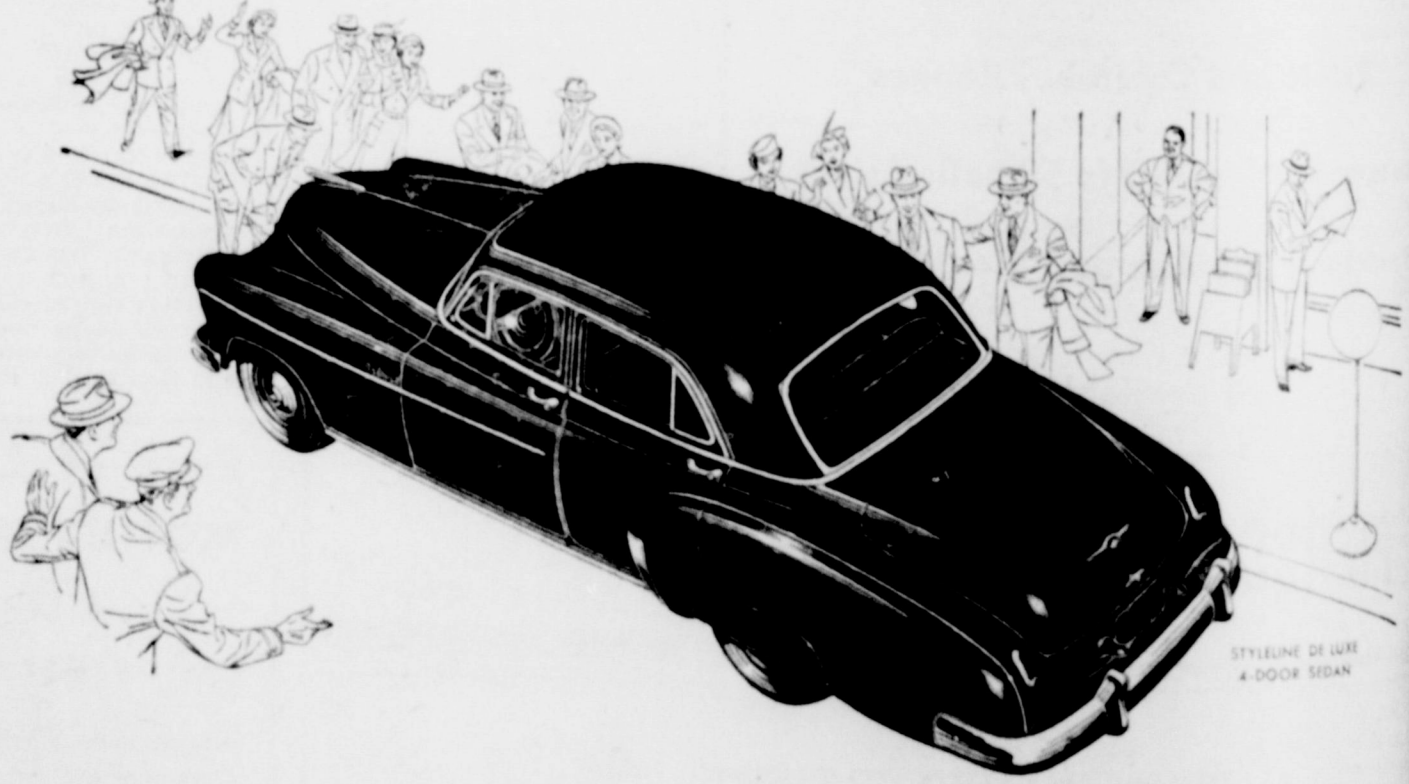
