**Rehearsals Started For Legion's Show 'Laff It Off' Mar. 30-31**

Rehearsals are under way for "Laff It Off," the local talent show being sponsored by the American Legion to be presented Wednesday and Thursday, March 30 and 31 at the Sanderson High School Auditorium for the benefit of the Legion building fund.

The cast includes about 100 people who are to impersonate famous newspaper columnists and other names in the news. It is billed as the Big Scoop in Home Talent Productions and depicts the headlines come to life. From all indications it promises to be what the name implies; a show where everyone will "Laff It Off."

Judge R. S. Wilkinson will impersonate John Q. Public and Mrs. L. H. Gilbreath will be Mrs. John Q. Public. These two average Americans will introduce each scene as they read their newspapers with their two children, Dorothy McCarley and Johnny Calvin.

One of the high spots in the show is the impersonation of local news — "Frontier Celebration."

D. L. Duke will be master of ceremonies and will portray Gene Autrey for this portion of the show. Ruel Adams will act as Jack Benny's Rochester; and Mrs. Hugh Rose will give the comedy impersonation of Judy Canova; L. H. Gilbreath will be the old-time settler, Pappy Chiselfinger, who has come to join in the festivities. Songs of yesterday will be featured by Harvey Rogers, with C. G. Riggins calling the square dance for the gay old blades and belles.

In this scene the old-time settlers of the community will be interviewed and acclaimed for their service in building the community.

Variety is brought into the show by the use of a quiz pro-

gram scene in which Mr. John Q. Public asks the audience to "Rhyme for Riches." Wilton Dishman will impersonate the Inquiring Reporter and will also give prizes to those in the audience who answer his questions.

Cousin Katy, a charming young lady who does musical reading and songs in various scenes, will be played by Mrs. C. E. Yeates. Hedda Hopper, the famous lady of movie and newspaper fame, is portrayed by Miss Louise Klemmer. 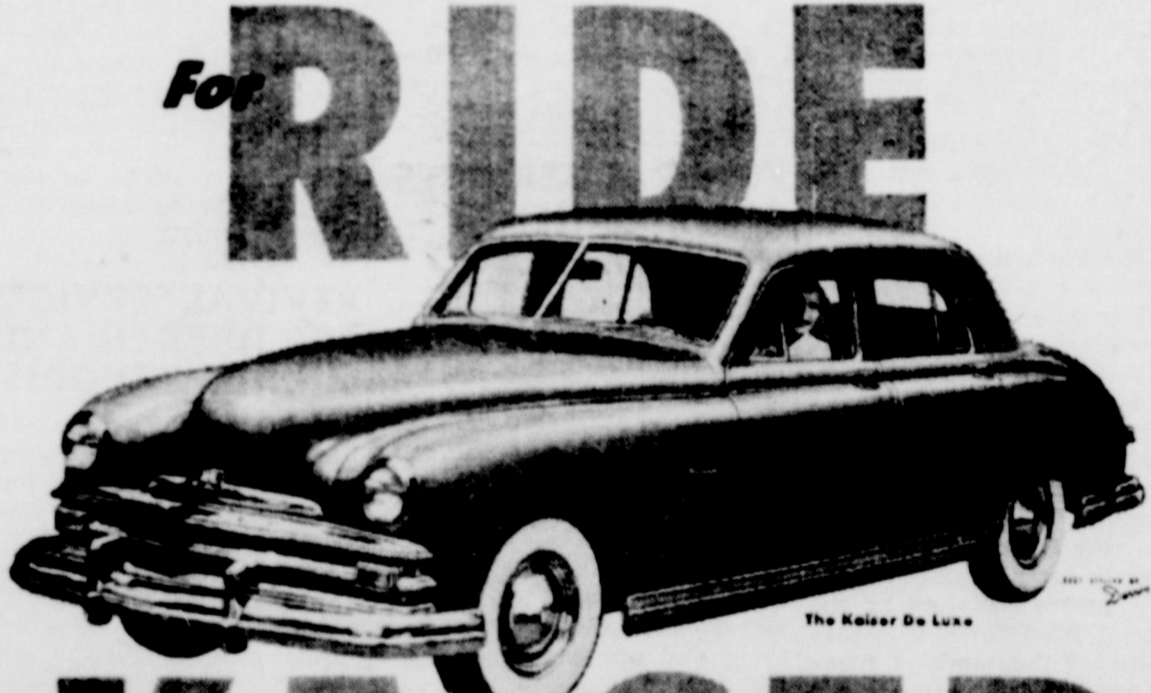

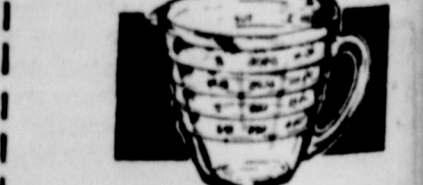

**Realism In Shooting 'Canon City' Break Carried Too Far**

That realism can be carried too far, even in a semi-factual movie, was the lesson learned by the cast and crew of Eagle Lions' exciting, blood-tingling, suspense drama "Canon City", opening Sunday at the Princess Theatre.

To match the thrilling action of the real life break of twelve convicts from Colorado State Penitentiary, which astounded the nation last December, Director Crane Wilbur had the actors and crew go through all the motions of the actual prison escape.

In one of the chase sequences, Bud Wolfe, one of the players, was driving and skidded so badly into a ditch that the car was demolished. Wolfe was badly shaken up and suffered bruises and contusions.

Jeff Corey, playing the ringleader of the escape mob, had to smash through a screen door, just as it was done in the actual break. He hit the door hard enough to open a wound in his hand which required three stitches to close.

A tumble from a 16-foot embankment caused some torn ligaments in the leg of Robert Bice, another actor, as he was escaping from the screen posse.

The scenes recording the break from the prison itself, done in 17 below zero weather, sent more than a dozen members of the "Canon City" crew and cast to the prison hospital to be treated for frostbite and exposure. Because of the sub-zero temperatures more than four hours were necessary to film the sequence.

Bryan Foy, who produced this exciting movie, said he was sorry for all the accidents which incapacitated the players and delayed production, but after seeing the picture itself declared himself overwhelmed by the stark realism of the picture.

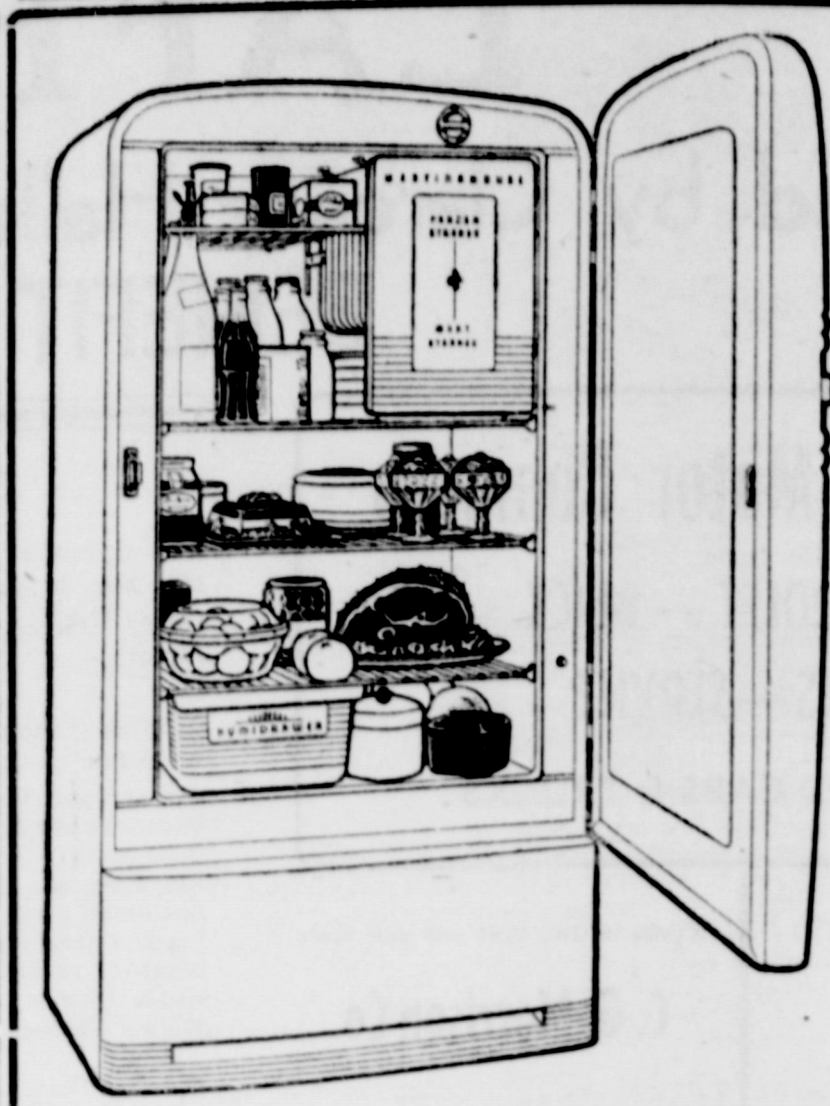


