**Pfc A. V. Chalambago To Be Re-Interred Here Saturday P. M.**

The remains of Pfc Aurelio Chalambago arrived by train Thursday night and funeral services are planned for Saturday afternoon at 2:30 in interment in Santa Rita Cemetery where the V. F. W. will be in charge of military rites.

He was inducted into the army at Fort Bliss, March 17, 1942. In May 1933 he arrived in England and was in the invasion of the continent June 6, 1944. On July 4 he was wounded in action in Normandy and was sent back to England for four months hospitalization.

**Assn. Seeks State Designation Sheffield-Sanderson Highway**

Approximately 475 stockmen gathered at Balmorhea Saturday to see the results of the seventh sire-progeny tests conducted by the Madera Valley Experiment Station there.

Of 34 groups in the 128-day tests, the calves of Publican Domino 128 owned by Jack Williams of Paint Rock showed the best gain.

The bulls of N. M. Mitchell were among the closely competing groups in the test. They showed an average of 2.43 pounds daily gain.

**DEL RIO BURGLARY SUSPECTS TAKEN HERE SATURDAY**

Local officers picked up two men here Saturday in connection with a reported robbery of two rooms in a Del Rio hotel. The suspects, who gave their names as Vardeman Gates, 23, and Robert Ladner, 31, were taken from a train in the local yards after officers here were notified by the sheriff's department at Del Rio of the burglary.

The suspects had numerous items of clothing which were identified as being the stolen goods from the hotel rooms. The men named an accomplice who remained in Del Rio and was later picked up by the Del Rio officers.

Gates and Ladner were returned to Del Rio Friday where they will face charges of burglary.

**Driver Charged With DWI After Monday Night Collision**

Clarence Barbee of San Antonio was charged with driving while intoxicated in Pecos County Tuesday after a collision on Highway 90 near Long-fellow Monday night.

Barbee had Mr. and Mrs. Robert Lenamond, hitchhikers, in the car with him when his car collided with a car driven by Mrs. Earl Stirman of Alpine. Mrs. Stirman was accompanied by her son-in-law, Zack Blair, who is recuperating from an auto accident he was involved in while in Mexico with the Bureau of Animal Industry.

Announcement was made Tuesday that L. S. Platt of Marfa had sold his interest in the Spears Drug Store to R. V. Spears, now the sole owner. The deal was effective Monday.

Platt has been a frequent visitor in Sanderson during the past two years looking after his business interests here and working in the store during rush seasons. He and his family are moving to Dunagan, Mo., to make their home.

**ROTARY TO MEET AT KERR WELL NEXT WEDNESDAY**

At the regular weekly luncheon of the Rotary Club Wednesday it was decided to have the next meeting at the Kerr well west of town. The group, with their Rotary Anns and guests, become feed.

With the turning of spring weather area ranchmen have been busy marking lambs and shearing. Generally the lamb crop over this section is around 80 per cent. Some reports of excellent percentages have come in from some sections while others cut the average down much lower than present conditions demand.

Wool prices have been steady at 75c for long wool and 80c for short wool and lamb prices at around 21c. The maximum prices for lambs and wool will be necessary to help pay for the feed used by the ranchmen during the past year.

There has been very little wool activity and few contracts on lamb crops during recent weeks.

**X-RAY SURVEY TESTS 327 PEOPLE**

Only 327 residents of the county took advantage of the opportunity to have a chest X-ray made last week end. This is approximately 209 less than had X-rays made by the mobil unit last year.

Mrs. E. J. Hanson, health chairman of the Sanderson P-T-A, assisted by local volunteer workers, set up offices in the vacant building next door to the Community Public Service Co. for the three days the unit was here.

Reports of positive or negative findings will be made at an early date to those who had the X-rays made.

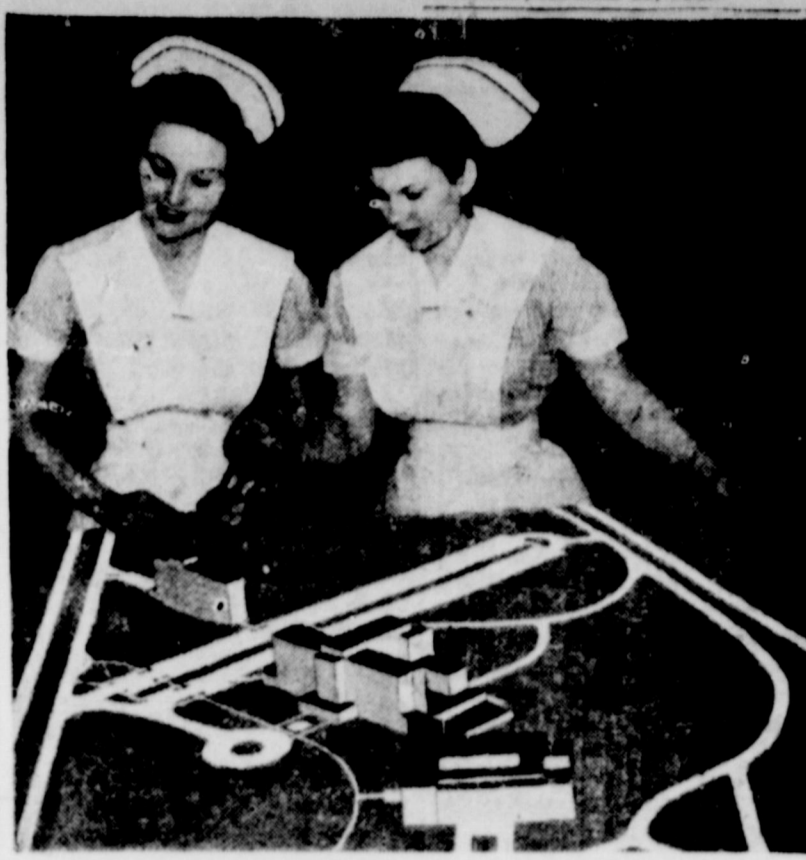
