## N. M. Mitchell's Bulls Rate 2nd in Progeny Tests in Balmorhea

Approximately 475 stockmen gathered at Balmorhea Satur day to see the results of the seventh sire-progeny tests conducted by the Madera Valley Experiment Station there.

Of 34 groups in the 128-day tests, the calves of Publican Domino 128 owned by Jack Williams of Paint Rock showed the best gain. The bulls which entered the station at 591 pounds and finished out at 912 averaged a gain of 2.5 pounds per day. The heifers averaged 2.01 pounds gain per day.

The bulls of N. M. Mitchell were among the closely compet. boys and ten are girls. ing groups in the test. They showed an average of 2.43 pounds daily gain.





In the first six weeks of the year






