LOCAL FIRMS RECEIVE ALL BIDS

Work was started on the new First Presbyterian Church of Sanderson Monday of this week. The structure will be of hollow tile, plastered inside and out, and will consist of two buildings, the main building and an educational annex connected by an enclosed arcade.

The structure will be on the corner lot just south of the Presbyterian parsonage and will cost around \$35,000.00, according to C. C. Mitchell, building chairman. He said the construction would require about five months, barring unforeseen difficulties.

The main building will include two classrooms, a bell tower and pastor's study in addition to the sanctuary and choir room. It will be 79 feet by 32 feet. The windows will be stained glass with a memorial picture window in back of the pulpit.

The annex building will house an auditorium, three class rooms, a kitchen and rest room. It will be 30 feet by 50 feet.

Both buildings will have modern indirect lighting, and gas blower-type heating units. To date, no furniture has been selected but plans are under way to have all furnishings in a modernistic style.

Contracts for the building were let to the following: R. E. Corder, contractor, Alamo Lumber Co., The Kerr Mercantile Co., Pierson Bitane Co. and O. T. Sudduth, Inc.

The members of the building committee asked that their appreciation to the business men and merchants for the cooperation in submitting the bids be expressed through this medium, and they are happy to announce that all work and materials will be secured locally.

JURY INCOMPLETE FOR JEFF BANNER TRIAL AT MENARD

Picking a jury for the trial of Jeff Banner on murder charges in Menard, Texas, proved to be slow Wednesday. Six jurors were chosen from twenty-nine veniremen questioned.

The trial scheduled to begin Monday was postponed after physicians stated that Banner was not able to stand trial because of an eye infection.

Banner is on trial for his life, charged with the slaying of Alvin Parker, 34, last Christmas Eve. The slaying victim allegedly met his death during an argument over onion on a hamburger served to him in Banner's Menard County Cafe.

He reportedly died from knife wounds inflicted with a steak knife in the back. The slaying reportedly occurred shortly after Parker threw a bowl of hot chili into the face of Banner's brother, who was working in the cafe.

Monday in court, defense attorney Robert E. Lee of Mason entered a plea of innocent of the charge. No mention of self-defense was made.

The 51-year-old cafe operator has been free under \$7500 bond since one week after he was arrested and charged with the crime.

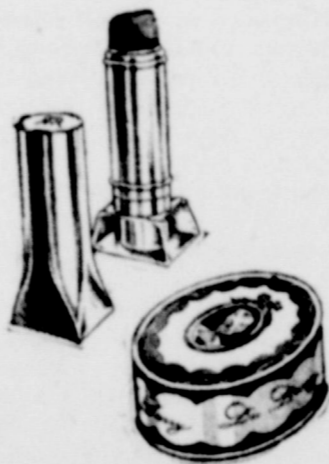

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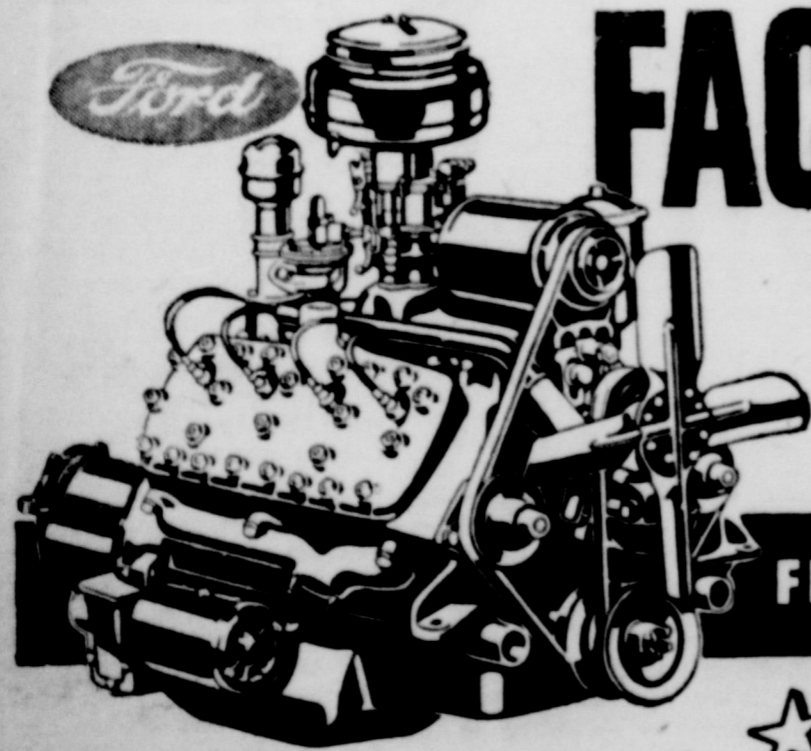
