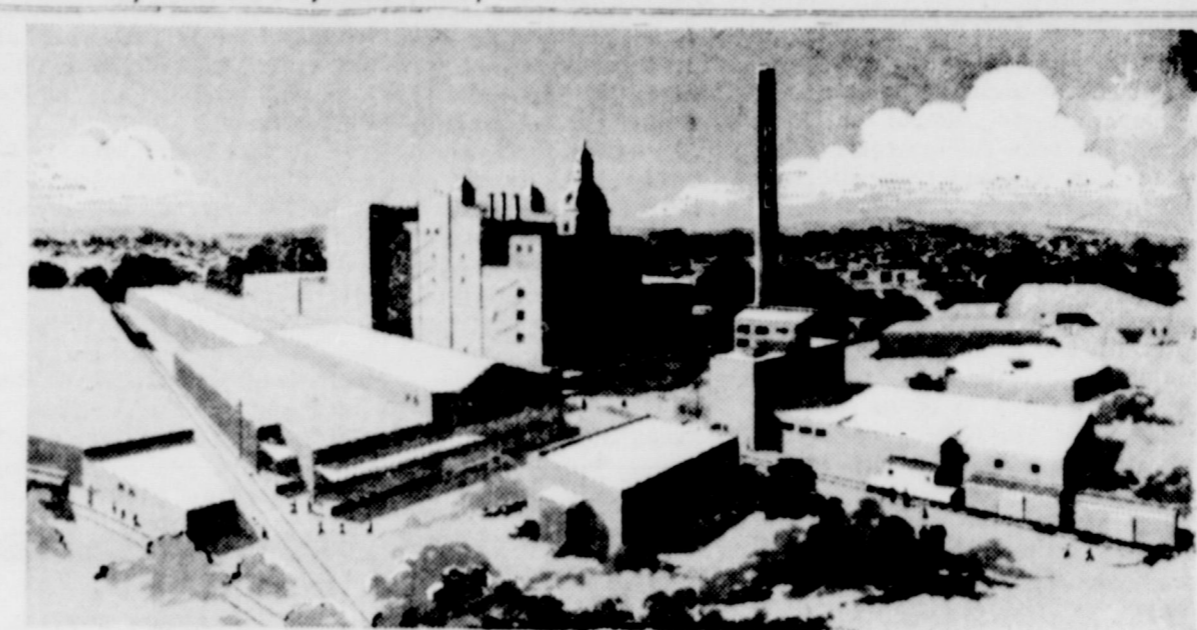

## BREWERY HAS INCREASED PLANT FACILITIES 65% IN NEW BUILDING

Located on eight and one-half acres of its own land in almost the exact center of San Antonio, the Pearl Brewery has recently completed many additions to the plant. The new building which is insulated and refrigerated now contains seventy-two large storage and fermenting tanks increasing the brewing and aging capacity to sixty-five per cent. The new warehouse has added 40,000 square feet to the storage capacity of the brewery. When the brewery was established in 1886, it employed 35 people and had twelve horse-drawn wagons. Today there are 340 employees and the brewery has its own electric locomotive and tracks and a fleet of 72 cars.

## Construction On American Legion Home Is Started

## HAYNES KILLS TWO PANTHERS SUNDAY ON RIVER RANCH

Bill Haynes killed two female panthers on his ranch on San Francisco Canyon Sunday. Largest of the cats was 6 feet and 8 inches long and weighed about 130 pounds, while the other was a kitten measuring about 4 feet in length and weighing about 35 pounds. These killers were tracked down with dogs and killed after the kitten had lost his foot in a trap. About three weeks ago Mr. Haynes killed a large male lion weighing about 140 pounds. The Haynes ranch is about 5 miles from the mouth of San Francisco canyon on the Rio Grande. It is believed that most of these predatory animals come from across the border. There is no doubt in the minds of the ranchers in this area, but that the animals are harbored and allowed to breed in the protection of the Big Bend National Park. This menace to stockmen has been the subject of many protests to park authorities urging the elimination of all predatory killers in the park area.

## Public Service Well Delayed by Fishing For Tools at 265 Feet

Work on the Community Public Service Co. water well being drilled northwest of town near the present supply well, was halted this week while the crew fished for tools dropped in the 26-foot hole. G. One string was recovered and the fishing job continued late Wednesday night as the crew endeavored to recover the other string. ## Deadline for Dog Registration Near

Eighteen dogs have been registered in the county treasurer's office to date. Thirty days will have lapsed Wednesday of next week since the recent ordinance requiring the registration of and tax on dogs was passed. According to article 1371a of the Texas Penal Code all dog owners will be subject to a fine not to exceed \$100 or 30 days in jail if charges are brought against said dog owner for failure to register and pay tax on dog or failure to muzzle dogs between sunset and sunrise if allowed to run loose, or for failure to allow dog to be destroyed if so ordered by proper constituted authority or for failure of property owner, renter or lessee to put out signs at all entrances to property where poison is put out.

and all activities which benefit from tourist business. It is a burden on parents of students who are traveling to school; on people visiting relatives; on people who must travel because of illness and death in the family; on individuals attending conferences and on traveling for health and recreation.

Canada recently dropped a similar tax. It has been repealed on travel to foreign countries receiving Marshall Plan aid.

The argument for repeal of a three per cent tax on freight shipments has an equal force of appeal. Such a tax is discriminatory. It penalizes producers who must ship their product a greater distance to markets.

The National Federation of the Blind has requested space to help "Honor the White Cane" movement. This is a most worthy cause and we cannot pass up an opportunity to make mention of it. Let's help this move in every way possible. More will appear later on this subject.

The Sanderson Retail Merchants Association now organization. Practically every retail-

er in Sanderson now has membership in the organization. It will serve this community well if the business men get in and do their part. It should be pointed out that the organization of such a group here will serve to better credit conditions for those who deserve credit and who show their appreciation for such courtesies by prompt payment of their obligations. Dr. E. S. Clifton, North Texas State Teachers College English professor, who is conducting a research project to study speech habits of Texans, recently drew some conclusions that will hardly hold water. We favor research projects on all matters where enlightenment may be forthcoming for the edification of others, but when an English professor, uses state money to make a study and publishes his findings, he should be able to deliver something.

Dr. Clifton says you don't have to see a West Texan walking to tell him from his East Texas brother — his speech habits will mark him most every time. The learned professor says the chan-

ces are a West Texan has never heard of "binky" milk; whereas any East Texan knows that it is soured milk. The words "where" and "nor" tend to come out as "whur" and "nur" when West Texans use them, he says.

Dr. Clifton should at least get west of Dallas to really know how West Texans talk.

For his information we might say that there are more college graduates per capita from West Texas than from any other part of the state — we might make it from any other part of the United States. And, to be sure, some of them never learn to speak the English language properly, some never amount to more than a little country weekly editor but they manage to get along without the teachings of professors who make surveys without leaving the college campus.

Rain keeps coming to this part of West Texas and if it continues we will be talking like the web-footed East Texans from the piney woods.

One West Texas rancher belatedly on a certain day — imagine a native making such a wager. It did rain on that day. Now he says it will rain before this week is over. I'll bet a cup of coffee he's right.

"Don't matter 'whur" he came from "nur" "whur" he got his information. I still say he's right.
