The Lions Club came back Friday night after their defeat by the Firemen earlier in the week to win over the Railroad team 25-9.

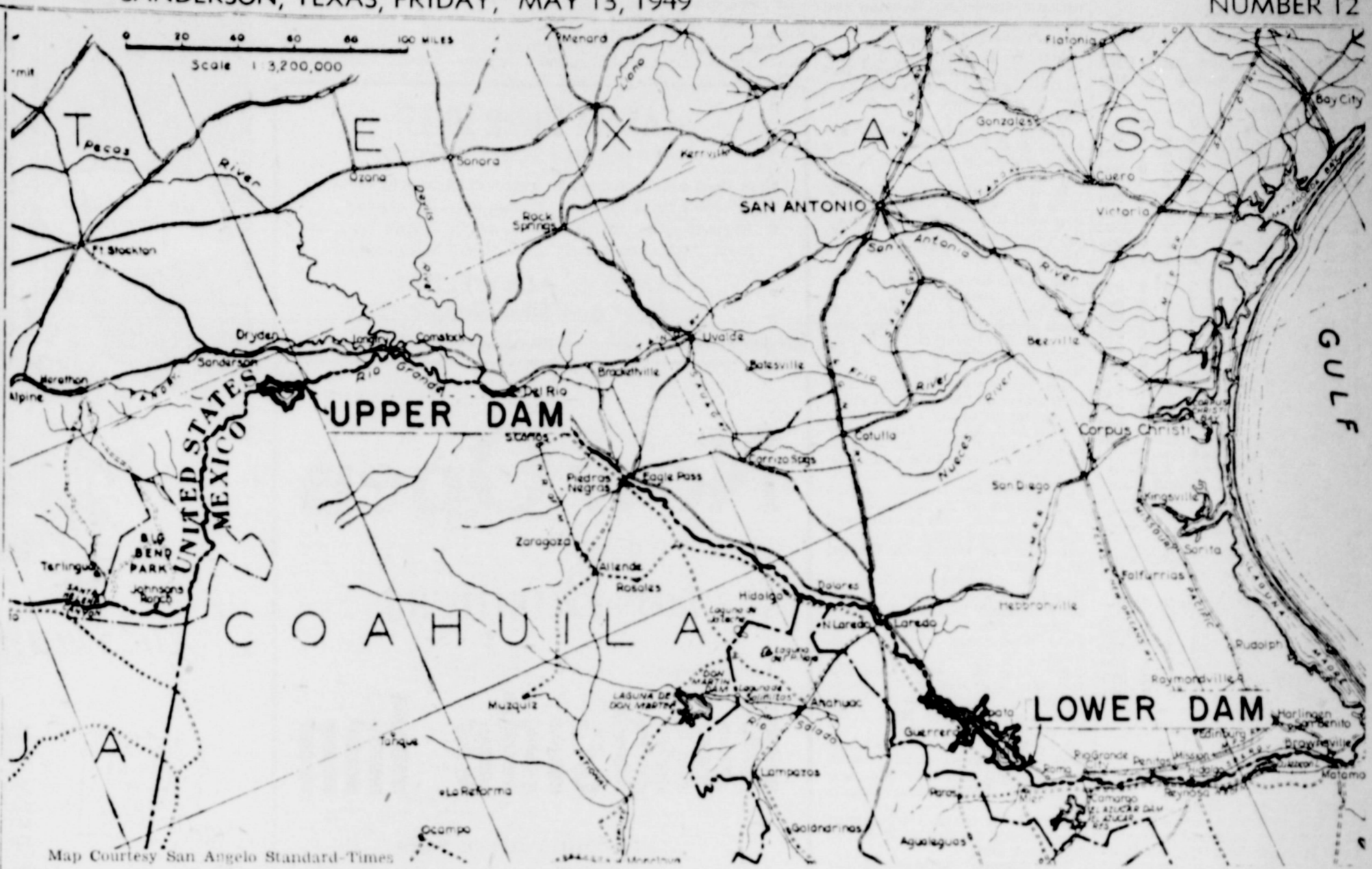
Marquez pitched the first four innings of the ball game for the Lions and allowed 4 singles, 1 double, walked 6, hit 4 batters and struck out 2.

Plans are being completed for the two giant flood control dams on the Rio Grande River by the International Boundary and Water Commission.

These projects are planned to harness the turbulent international boundary river and will create two huge reservoirs which will serve both the United States and Mexico.

Unlimited facilities for fishing and boating will also be offered, while camping and picnic parties may find sightseeing pleasant in the scenic country.

The site of the upper dam is located almost due south of Sanderson and will be accessible by car to most of the water edge on this side of the lake.

Estimated cost of the two dams is set at approximately \$66 million. The lower dam is estimated at \$36 million and the upper dam will be around \$30 million.

The Martin site for the upper dam will call for a dam crossing the river at a point where the steep rock bluff on each side will afford perfect abutments for the structure.

TEXAS BIGGEST BRAG

On Sunday, May 22, the Dallas Morning News will publish a "Texas Unlimited" issue, a souvenir edition of approximately 200 pages and weighing five pounds or more.

This international work was made possible by the signing of a treaty on February 3, 1944. The treaty relating to the conservation, control, distribution and use of the available water supply of the Rio Grande below Fort Quitman, Texas, and of the Colorado and Tijuana Rivers in Mexico.

Under this treaty equitably apportioned water of the two main international streams and provisions for the construction or utilization of such works as are necessary to make the division of the resources economical and efficient are assured.

The International Boundary and Water Commission headquarters in Ciudad Juarez and is represented by sections from the United States and Mexico.

The two governments also agree, in article 7 of the treaty, to construct, through their respective sections of the Commission, such plants for generating hydro-electricity at the international storage dam as may be recommended by the commission and approved by both governments.

Flood control work needed in the flood area of the dams is to be handled by both countries where needed. This work will include levees, floodways, grade control structures, and works for the canalization or rectification of some reaches of the river.

At a joint meeting of the Commission in Mexico City in March it was deemed necessary to harness the upper reaches of the water shed in order to protect the lower storage basin.

Therefore in fixing the capacity of the lower reservoir it was found to be necessary to provide adequate upstream storage.

Prior to the Mexico City conference the Commission had made a number of preliminary geological and reconnaissance and topographic surveys of possible dam sites between the Santa Helena Canyon and the mouth of the Pecos River.

These studies indicated the Agua Verde (Martin Canyon) site as the most feasible.

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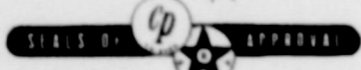
