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Work Progressing On Presbyterian Church Building

Although the shortage of some materials have held up the work on the construction of the new Presbyterian Church, the work is going forward rapidly and the buildings are taking shape. The outside walls and roof are on the educational building and the sanctuary walls are nearing completion. Work has started on the interior of the educational building.

The building site is located just south of the Presbyterian manse.

Since some materials have been difficult to find, a tentative completion date for the new structure has not been set.

GARDEN CLUB TOUR VISITS SIX RESIDENCES

Members of the Sanderson Garden Club and friends went on a garden tour Sunday afternoon to view some of the lovely gardens of the area. Members of the club shared hosts duties at each of the gardens visited.

Starting at the H. E. Ezelle home at three o'clock, the party viewed a yard terraced to retain water and discourage the washing away of soil on the hill. Running roses frame the doorway entrance to the front porch. Beds of blooming annuals and fruit trees, including an apple tree with fruit were noted. Lemonade was served to the guests.

At Mrs. J. W. McKee's, the distinctive feature of the garden is a sun-heated pit where coleus, ferns and geraniums grow in profusion. Leading to the pit is a grape arbor and a hedge which divides the vegetable and cutting garden from the lawn. On the south side under a large pecan tree are bulb and iris beds.

Orderly flower beds were noted at the ranch home of Mr. and Mrs. John Carruthers, Sr. The beautiful rock house is landscaped in front with evergreens and a large lawn, with beds curbed in concrete on the sides along the fence and the house. Chinese elm shade trees and a lawn were the attractive features of the back yard with a large bed of larkspur near the back entrance to the house.

The home of Mr. and Mrs. James Kerr is noted for its many trees, including grafted native and seedling pecan trees; peach, fig and apricot with fruit and native hackberry trees. Little bird houses painted in bright colors and made by Mr. Kerr, swing from limbs in all of the trees. Blooming annuals border the front walk and a large bed of snapdragons and stock on the west side. A large bed of sweetpeas is by a back fence where also are found several of the loquat shrubs.

The garden of Mr. and Mrs. Web Townsend at their ranch home achieves succession of blooms almost the year round. Specializing in roses of which there are more than fifty bushes with but few in bloom, the garden is composed mainly of perennials. Carpet grass and Chinese elm trees make a beautiful lawn. Petunias of all varieties and colors were an interesting note.

The garden at the ranch home of Mrs. and Mrs. W. G. Downie is only three years old. Perennial beds of columbine, azalea bushes and irises are on the north side of the yard with annuals in the beds in the back. Of special interest was the lath house for tropic plants located near the cold frame in the vegetable garden. Punch and cookies were served at the last stop.

OLD PECOS RIVER BRIDGE SOLD TO GUATEMALA

The dismantling of the old SP railroad bridge over the Pecos River was begun Monday. A large crowd of railroad officials, business men and newspaper representatives were present to witness the start of the work. The bridge has been sold to Guatemala for re-installing over a deep river in that country. Tens of thousands of rivets have been removed in order to expedite the lifting of the pieces with cable as all portions of the bridge are to be saved.

The new bridge was placed in service December 21, 1944.

Work on the old bridge which is built of wrought iron was begun in 1891 and completed over a year later. The bridge was 2180 feet long with the base of the rail 321 feet above the water in the river.

REPAIRS COMPLETE ON SYCAMORE CREEK BRIDGE

Sycamore Bridge on Highway 90 east of Del Rio was opened to traffic Thursday. After being closed after the floods, traffic east crossed Sycamore Creek on the low water structure at a point below the bridge. Even slight rises in the creek have frequently closed the road to traffic while repairs were being made to the bridge.

Four spans of the bridge were washed completely away and were replaced and nine spans had to be re-aligned.

10,946 ACRES SCHOOL LAND IN COUNTY UNSOLD

AUSTIN, May 19—State Land Commissioner, Bascom Giles, states there is still public land for sale in Texas.

The unsold land includes 10,946.39 acres in Terrell County. Not much of the land, as Texans measure it, is unsold. Less than one per cent of the once colossal public domain is available to high bidders as the unsold acreage has dwindled to a total of 1,325,875.70 acres. (The total acreage of the state is 6,172,870,000.)

Not all of the million acres can be purchased, Giles explains. The domain is administered by the School Land Board, of which Giles is chairman.

"No school lands within five miles of oil or gas production can be sold," he pointed out.

When there is sufficient demand, the School Land Board authorizes the sale of specified tracts. A public sale is advertised and information about the tracts applied by the General Land Office upon request.

Sale is by sealed bids. The bidder, if conforming with all regulations, is the new owner.

The terms are 20 per cent down with 40 years to retire the balance at 5 per cent interest. The Permanent School Fund retains one sixteenth free royalty in all oil production and one-eighth free royalty in sulphur production.

He formerly resided here and attended the Sanderson High School until he enlisted in the Navy three years ago. He now resides in Corpus Christi and completed sufficient work while in the service to be awarded the diploma.

Small Net Gain In Scholastics For Terrell County

Mrs. John Harrison completed the scholastic census in Terrell County this week. There are 796 scholastics in the county for the 1949-50 term, an increase of 166 over last year. However with losses from pupils moving to other places of residence and from scholastics who became 18 years old, there is a net gain of only twenty-five or thirty pupils.

There are 74 children to be enrolled in September for their first year in school.

Rattlesnake Killed On Front Porch Of W. Grigsby Home

A sudden influx of poisonous snakes in Sanderson last week caused several residents of the town to begin cutting some of the weeds that have started coming up in profusion since recent rains. One of the snakes was killed on the front porch of the Walter Grigsby home late Friday afternoon.

Mrs. Grigsby and her daughter, Sarah Pat, came home and went in the front door of the house but failed to notice the snake which was lying there. Shortly after their arrival, Mrs. Dick Sullivan came to the house and while standing on the front porch noticed the snake. Some neighboring men were called over to kill the reptile. The snake was about three feet long.

Friday night George Gann, local constable, killed a copperhead snake about two feet long in front of the Club Cafe. This is the second snake of this species that has been reported in this immediate area.

A rattlesnake was seen crossing the street between Mrs. A. D. Brown's residence toward Clyde Griffith's house late Friday night, but eluded would-be killers in the tall grass on the edge of the street.

This should serve as sufficient warning to eliminate all possible hiding places for the reptiles around the premises. Children should be warned not to play in the tall grass and weeds and to be forever watchful for snakes.

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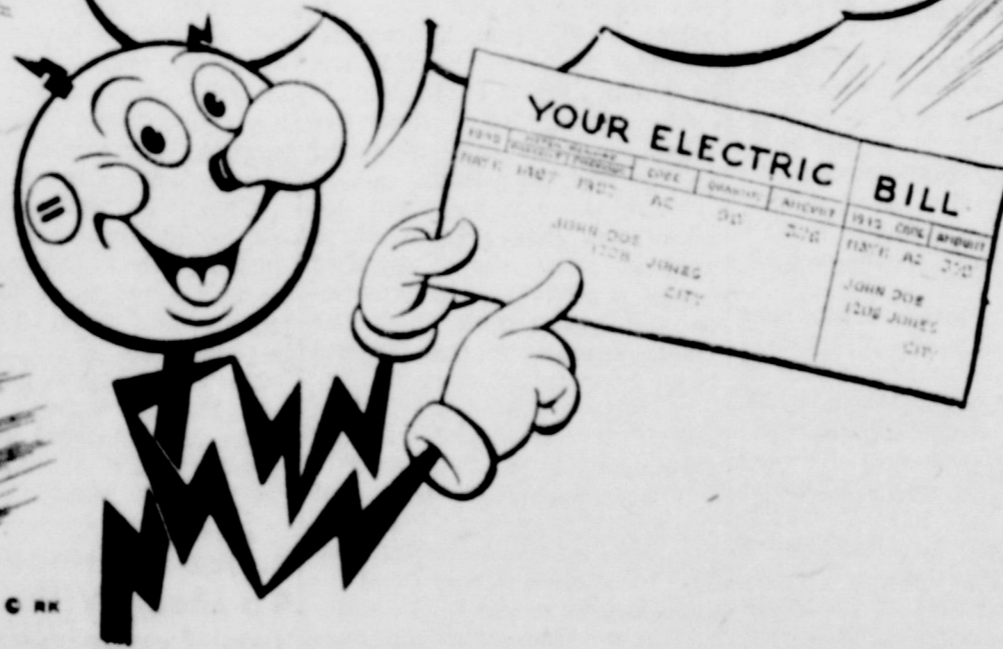

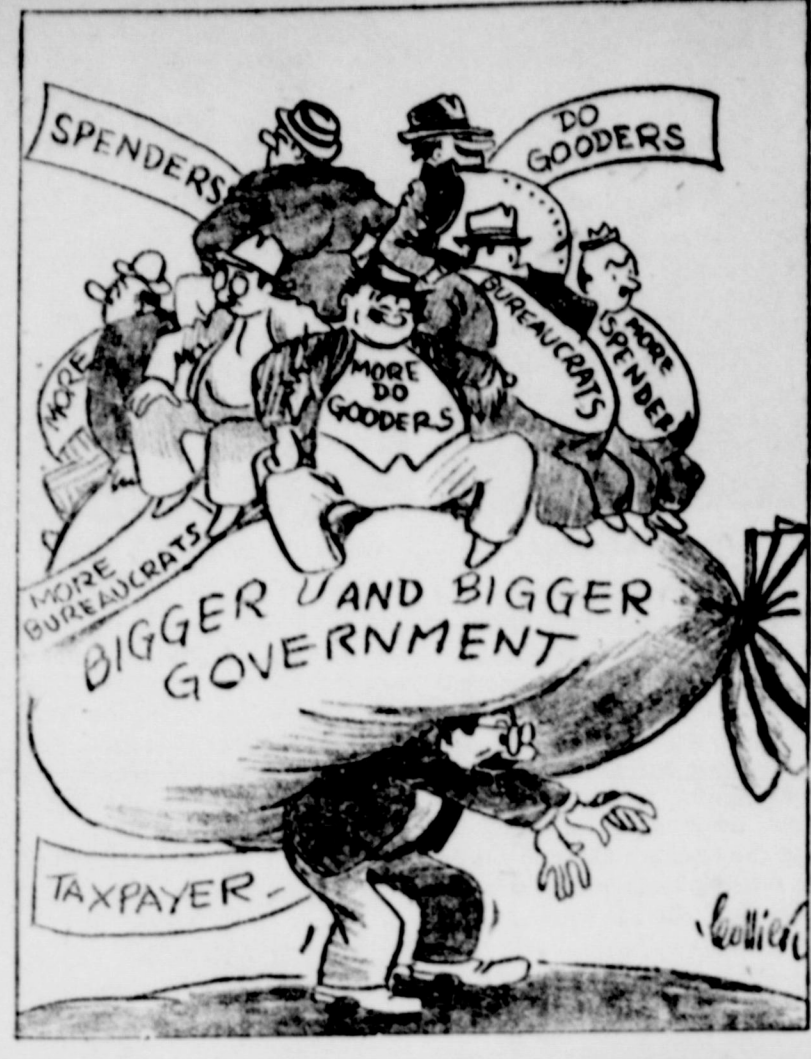

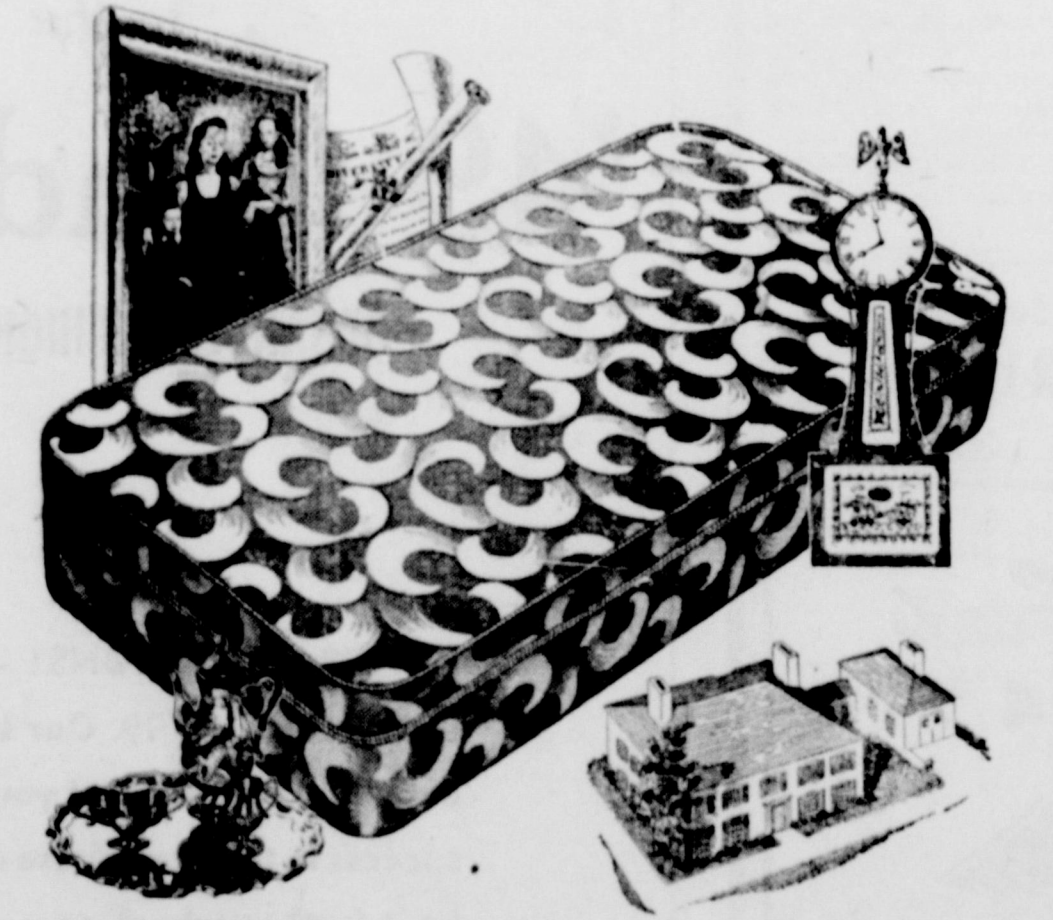
