BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE

Section 1. That Section 7 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as

"Sec. 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall provided by law. be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a General Election, a Judge, who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall be licensed to practice law in this State and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court in this State, or both combined, for four (4) years next preceding election, who shall have resided manner that each voter shall in the district in which he was vote on such machine for or elected for two (2) years next against the Constitutional preceding his election, who shall Amendment. reside in his district during his term of office, who shall hold his office for a period of four (4) years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature. The Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law. He shall hold the regular terms of his Court at the County Seat of each County in his district at least twice in each year in such a manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have the power by General or Special Laws to make such provisions concerning the terms or sessions of each Court as it may deem necessary

"The Legislature shall provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent, or is from any cause disabled or disqualified

from presiding The District Judges who may be in office when this amend-ment takes effect shall hold





BE IT RESOLVED BY THE OF TEXAS

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be known and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:

Section 62-c. The Legislature

is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but any system so authorized and establish shall be approved by a vote of the people in said county. 


