HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22

proposing an Amendment to Article V, Section 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Judge of the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 7 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereinafter to read as follows:

"Sec. 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law.

For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a General Election, a Judge, who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall be licensed to practice law in this State and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court in this State, or both combined, for four (4) years next preceding his election, who shall have resided in the district in which he was elected for two (2) years next preceding his election, who shall reside in his district during his term of office, who shall hold his office for a period of four (4) years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature. The Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law. He shall hold the regular terms of his Court at the County Seat of each County in his district at least twice in each year in such a manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have the power by General or Special Laws to make such provisions concerning the terms or sessions of each Court as it may deem necessary.

"The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent, or is from any cause disabled or disqualified from presiding.

"The District Judges who may be in office when this amendment takes effect shall hold

their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on September 24, 1949, at which time all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation

for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3

proposing an Amendment to Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution relating to sessions of the Legislature and what may be considered thereat and an Amendment to Section 24 of Article III relating to compensation of Members of the Legislature, specifying the time when the Amendment shall take effect if ratified; and providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the State Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the State Senate and House of Representatives shall receive from the State Treasury an annual salary of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3600), to be paid in monthly installments on the first of each month.

"They shall also be entitled to mileage in going to the seat of government for each session of the Legislature and returning therefrom, which mileage shall

not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty cents (\$2.50), for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel from a table of distances to each county seat prepared by the State Comptroller.

Sec. 2. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 5. Two (2) regular sessions of each Legislature shall be held, and until otherwise provided by law, the time of the convening of the first regular session shall be at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each odd-numbered year, and of the second regular session, at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each even-numbered year.

"At other times, when called by the Governor, the Legislature shall convene in special sessions."

"Appropriations for monthly recurring expenses and salaries paid by the State shall be made for a period of not more than twelve (12) months."

"At the second regular session of each Legislature, only proposals to amend the Constitution and to make appropriations to pay monthly recurring expenses and salaries and such other measures only as four-fifths (4-5) of the Membership of each House may determine shall be considered."

Sec. 3. The Amendment's proposed herein, if ratified, by the people, shall become effective January first, A. D. 1950.

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

Each voter shall express his vote on the proposed Amendment in the manner provided by law.

Sec. 5. The Governor of this State shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Section 19 of Article 16, so as to provide that the qualification of no person to serve as a juror on grand juries and on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex; providing that existing provisions of the Constitution shall be construed in conformity herewith; providing that existing

provisions of the Constitution shall be construed in conformity herewith; providing for the submission of this amendment to a vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof; and making an appropriation for such purposes.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 19 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualification of grand petit jurors; provided that the qualification of no person for service on grand juries or on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex, and no person shall be exempt from service on grand juries or petit juries on account of sex."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this Resolution and the Constitutional Laws of this State, and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the vote of the qualified electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 48-b, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment of health units, and authorizing a tax in support thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended, by adding a new Section to Article III of said Constitution to be designated Section 48-b, reading as follows:

"Section 48-b. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county-city health units and the operation thereof and to author-

ize counties and cities to provide a tax of not to exceed twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property in counties and cities for the purpose of financing the said county-city health units; provided that no such tax shall be authorized except by a vote of the people residing in the city or county in which said tax shall apply. The foregoing tax shall be levied only on county valuations."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the

Legislature to pass laws for creation and operation of county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof.

Against the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for creation and operation of county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof.

Each voter shall scratch leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of State of Texas shall issue necessary proclamations for election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendment thereto.

**Economic Highlights**

The recent shifts of key men  
within the Soviet government  
have stirred up an apparently  
endless discussion as to whether  
this may be the prelude to some  
dramatic new tangent in Krem-  
lin policy. The iron curtain is so  
opaque that no one can answer  
that with certitude at this dis-  
tance. However, the experts, af-  
ter mulling over all the available  
facts and guesses, have generally  
come to the conclusion that the  
changes stem from perfectly  
reasonable, which have a relatively  
small influence on the relations  
of Russia with the West.

The most important change  
was the supplementing of Molot-  
ov with Vishinsky as Foreign  
Minister. The easy conclusion  
was that Molotov was in dis-  
grace, and would disappear from  
public life, as Litvinoff did years  
ago. But Molotov remains a  
member of the Politburo, and  
that is infinitely more important  
than any cabinet post. So it can  
be logically argued that Stalin  
delided he could be of more value  
if kept at home. It wouldn't  
surprise the experts if he was  
made Premier before long.

The key to the whole business  
may be found in conditions with-  
in the Soviet Union and her  
satellite states. Things aren't  
going as well as the Communists  
want. The difficulties with Tito  
have provided the most publiciz-  
ed example of this. But what is  
happening in Yugoslavia is also  
happening, though in a different  
way and on a smaller scale, in  
Hungary, Bulgaria and else-  
where. The Soviet-dominated  
governments are experiencing  
special trouble in bringing the  
peasants into line.

Furthermore, it looks as if the  
Kremlin is far from satisfied  
with its own people's ideological  
fervor. U. S. News puts it this  
way: "The old idea was that the  
elite of the Communist Party,  
which has only 6,000,000 members  
in a country of about 210,000,000  
people, would have faith in Com-  
-munist ideology and execute the

orders. Now the Politburo has  
ordered a tremendous campaign  
of missionary work that is de-  
signed to sell the idea of com-  
-plete faith in the eventual tri-  
-umph of Communism to the en-  
-tire Russian people. That cam-  
-paign is not the kind of thing  
that can be put across over  
-night."  
What effect may all this have  
on the great issue of peace and  
war? It is clear, if these opinions  
are correct, that Russia is plan-



**KITCHEN MEMO** BY JEAN CLARKE

Only one half-pound of inexpen-  
-sive meat serves four people and  
saves a few dollars when you  
make *American Chop Suey Melt*.  
1 *lb. fat in large skillet or Dutch*  
oven. Add 1 *medium chopped onion*.  
Fry until onion is yellow. Cube  $\frac{1}{2}$   
*lb. lean fresh pork shoulder* and  
brown. Add 1 *cup diced celery*,  $\frac{1}{4}$   
*diced green pepper*,  $\frac{1}{2}$  *lb. wash-*  
*rooms (optional)*,  $\frac{1}{2}$  *cup uncooked*  
*rice*, 1 *tbl. salt*. Dissolve 2 *bouillon*  
*cubes* in  $\frac{1}{2}$  *cup boiling water* and  
pour over mixture. Cover closely  
and bring to a boil. As soon as  
steam escapes from cover, turn flame  
down to simmer point and cook 25  
to 30 mins.

Try flavoring salad dressing for  
fruit salad with peanut butter.  
Blend  $\frac{1}{2}$  *cup peanut butter* with  $\frac{1}{2}$   
*cup dressing*.

One of the causes of coarse cake  
texture is baking in too slow an  
oven. The thermostat of your gas  
oven can be set to the exact degree  
of heat needed to overcome this bak-  
-ing problem.

Youngsters won't object to castor  
oil when it is stored in your gas  
refrigerator in a wide-mouthed jar  
until it's gummy to make it taste-  
less. Then just add to ice cold  
orange juice.

Research by the gas industry re-

of retirement and disability  
pensions for appointive officers  
and employees of the several  
counties of this State; providing  
that participation therein by  
counties shall be voluntary, and  
authorized by the qualified  
voters of such county, and pro-  
-viding that administration of  
said system may be committed  
to the same body set up to ad-  
-minister the statewide munici-  
-pal retirement system author-  
-ized under Section 51f of Article  
III.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE  
LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE  
OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article XVI  
of the Constitution of the State  
of Texas be amended by adding  
thereto a new Section, to be  
numbered Section 63, which  
shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature  
shall have the authority to pro-  
-vide for a statewide system of  
retirement and disability pen-  
-sions for appointive officers and  
employees of the counties of

this State under such a plan  
and program as the Legislature  
shall authorize; provided that  
participation therein by counties  
shall be voluntary, and shall  
first be authorized by vote of  
the qualified voters of such  
county. Administration of  
such system may be committed  
to the same body as may be set  
up to administer the municipal  
retirement system provided for  
by Section 51f of Article III."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Consti-  
-tutional Amendment shall be  
submitted to the qualified elec-  
-tors for members of the Legis-  
-lature at an election to be held  
throughout this State on the  
fourth Saturday in September,  
1949; and at said election the  
ballots shall have printed there-  
-on the words "FOR the Consti-  
-tutional Amendment authoriz-  
-ing a statewide system for re-  
-tirement and disability pen-  
-sions for appointive county officials  
and employees," and "AGAINST  
the Constitutional Amendment  
authorizing a statewide system  
for retirement and disability  
pensions for appointive county  
officials and employees." Each  
voter shall strike out one of said  
clauses on his ballot, leaving  
the one unmarked which ex-  
-presses his vote upon the pro-  
-posed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the  
State of Texas shall issue the  
necessary proclamation for said  
election, and shall have the  
foregoing proposed amendment  
published as required by the  
Constitution for proposed  
amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. If at said election, a  
majority of the votes cast are  
"FOR the Constitutional  
Amendment authorizing a state-  
-wide system for retirement and  
disability pensions for appoint-

ive county officials and employ-  
ees," the foregoing proposed  
amendment shall become Sec-  
-tion 63 of Article XVI of the  
Constitution of Texas, and pro-  
-clamation shall be made by the  
Governor thereof.

Sec. 5. The sum of Five Thou-  
-sand Dollars (\$5,000.00), or so  
much thereof as may be neces-  
-sary, is hereby appropriated out  
of any funds in the Treasury of

the State of Texas not otherwise  
appropriated, to pay the expen-  
-ses of such proclamation, notice  
and election.

Giles Says Procedure For Acquiring Land Under Vet Program To Be Kept Simple

By BASCOM GILES, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Chairman of the Veterans' Land Board

(Editor's Note: This is the concluding article of a series of three by Bascom Giles explaining the newly created Veterans' Land Board Program.)

In keeping with the terms of the legislation creating the Texas Veterans' Land Board, its administration and operating policies will be kept as simple as the problems of this huge program will permit.

The fact that approximately 13,000 veterans have already contacted this office for information on the working details of the plan indicates the commendable desire of veterans to own a farm or ranch home under the idea originally conceived by the author five years ago.

Paper work involving application to participate has been cut to the minimum. Each successive step has been shorn of all encumbering delays.

For example, proof of the applicant's eligibility can be established by submitting a certified copy of his honorable discharge plus substantiation that the applicant was a resident of Texas at the time he entered military service and is still a legal resident at the time of application for land program benefits.

Each veteran will be limited to one purchase not exceeding \$7,500 cost to the Board. He will be required to pay not less than five per cent down and execute an on-or-before note for 49 years at three per cent interest for the balance.

Should a purchaser desire to acquire a tract of land costing NOT more than \$10,000 he will be required to pay the difference between \$7,500 and the purchase price plus the five per cent down payment on the \$7,500 loan.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature of the State of Texas to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts; providing for the Governor's proclamation and submission to the electorate.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section to be designated as Section 60, reading as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by law for the establishment and creation of hospital districts in the counties of this State under such conditions as the Legislature may fix by law, and to provide for the support of said districts by a tax on the ad valorem properties situated in said counties, providing, however, that before any such district shall be created it shall be approved by a vote of the people in said district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts; and

"AGAINST The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said causes on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

ment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

Proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is, hereby amended by adding to said Article a new section, to be known and designated as Section 42-d, reading as follows:

"Sec. 42-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Three (3c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof, provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the state at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention district."

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention district."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 32

proposing an Amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto another Section following Section 15, providing that the Legislature may provide for trials in lunacy cases without a jury; further providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows:

"Section 15-a. The Legislature shall have the authority to enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for waiver of trial by jury in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Section 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in September, A. D., 1949, at

which election all ballots shall be printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases" and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases."

Each voter shall scratch out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19**

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote of the people therein.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be known and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:

"Section 62-c. The Legislature is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but any system so authorized and established shall be approved by a vote of the people in said county. Any Civil Service System established by virtue of this Section shall apply to appointive offices only, and the limitations on term of office heretofore provided by Section 30 of this Article shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of said Civil Service System. This section shall not apply to counties having a population less than seventy-five thousand (75,000) people."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all bal-

lots shall have printed or written thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein"; and

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1**

Proposing an amendment to Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution, repealing the provision making the payment of a poll tax a qualification of an elector; requiring the Legislature to pass a general registration law for voters; providing for the necessary election, proclamation and publication by the Governor, and making an appropriation.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is amended hereby so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that before offering to vote at any election a voter shall have registered as an elector before the first day of February next preceding such election. This provision shall be self-enacting. The Legislature shall pass a general registration law requiring registration of voters at a time not later than the first day of February for each election to be held for that calendar year, and the Legislature shall have power to prescribe a registration fee. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the 24th day of September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of

Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

### KITCHEN MEMO

The men, bless 'em, love any food with chocolate flavoring and it's the thoughtful wife who keeps chocolate cookies on hand in the cookie jar for between-meal nibbling. For *Chocolate Meringue Cookies* sift together 2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar, 1 tsp. flour, 1/4 tsp. salt. Beat 3 egg whites until stiff. Add sugar mixture 2 tbsps. at a time until thoroughly blended. Fold in 2 squares unsweetened chocolate (melted and cooled), 1/4 cup shredded coconut, and 1 tsp. vanilla. Drop from teaspoon on lightly greased baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (375°F) for 10 mins.

A two or three-burner gas hot plate is inexpensive to operate and a helpful addition in the laundry when starch must be cooked or handkerchiefs boiled.

If your family likes pork chops, try simmering them in pineapple juice over a low flame. Then place in a 400-degree oven for about 20 minutes.
