The Organized Reserve has changed its system of awarding training credits for retention in the Active Reserve, Col. Oscar B. Abbott, Executive for the Texas Military District, announced recently in Austin. The change will make it easier to earn sufficient credits to remain in the

The system of obtaining credits by "hours" has been discarded for a system using the "point

Under the original regulations, a Reserve Corps officer had to earn 30 hours a year to remain in the Active Reserve. Eight hours was allowed each for each two-hour armory train-

Minimum requirements for retention in the Active Reserve is now 27 point credits a year, including 15 points which will be allowed for membership in the Active Reserve, Only one point will be allowed for one day of Brake to Laramie, Wyoming, and duty, whether it be for active or C. 
