Dave Cunningham Buried Wednesday

David Houston (Dave) Cunningham of Pumpville died here early Monday morning after receiving medical treatment here for a week for a heart ailment. He had major surgery and had seemed to improve in health until two weeks ago. He had been a retired cattleman for about 12 years due to failing health.

Funeral services were held at ten o'clock Wednesday morning at the Baptist Church with Rev. Clifford Spencer officiating, assisted by Rev. Conrad Smith of Presidio Arrangements were under the supervision of O. T. Sudduth, Inc., and burial was in Cedar Grove Cemetery. Masons were in charge of graveside services.

Mr. Cunningham was born in Goldthwaite, Texas, April 16, 1888, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Cunningham. With his family he went to San Angelo as a boy and received his education there. He lived in Hemphill County where he had ranching interests until he came to Terrell County in 1925. In 1935 he was married to Mrs. Dorothy Walsh. They moved to Pumpville about eight years ago after ill health had forced him to abandon active ranch work.

Mr. Cunningham was in the navy during World War I. He served as commissioner of precinct 4 in Terrell County for two terms, resigning during his third term. He was a member of the Baptist Church at Pumpville.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Dorothy Cunningham and children, David, of Pumpville, Bobby Walsh and Mrs. Jim Condra of Dryden, and Mrs. Len Dillion of Spokane, Wash.; five grandchildren, Jimmie and Dorothy Condra, Beth and Robert Glenn Walsh and Barry Dillion; one brother, Conn Cunningham of Fort Stockton; five sisters, Mrs. J. Garner of Sanderson, Mrs. Fee Bee Griggs of Dallas, Mrs. H. C. Burch of Houston, Mrs. Gordon Hornsby of Roanoke, Alabama, and Mrs. Walter Emison of Brownwood.

CHANGES IN SYSTEM MAKE CREDITS EASIER IN ACTIVE RESERVE OFFICER'S CORPS

The Organized Reserve has changed its system of awarding training credits for retention in the Active Reserve. Col. Oscar B. Abbott, Executive for the Texas Military District, announced recently in Austin. The change will make it easier to earn sufficient credits to remain in the Active Reserve.

The system of obtaining credits by "hours" has been discarded for a system using the "point credit" plan.

Under the original regulations, a Reserve Corps officer had to earn 30 hours a year to remain in the Active Reserve. Eight hours was allowed each day of active duty, and 2 hours for each two-hour armory training meeting. A schedule of credits was also set up for various miscellaneous activities and for extension courses.

Minimum requirements for retention in the Active Reserve is now 27 point credits a year, including 15 points which will be allowed for membership in the Active Reserve. Only one point will be allowed for one day of duty, whether it be for active or inactive duty.

An officer on a 30-day tour of duty will receive 30 points, and he will receive the same number of points by attending 30 armory training meetings. As an officer will be credited with 15 points for membership in the Active Reserve, he actually will have to earn only 12 points throughout the year.

Highway 90 Funds Increase With Local Contributions

Funds were solicited this week by officers of the local Highway 90 Association for the purpose of advertising the benefits of this route for traffic from San Antonio to El Paso.

In the letter Mr. Downie urged all who could to attend a hearing in Austin on July 21. The Border Trails Association has obtained a hearing with the State Highway Commission at 10:00 a. m. on that date.

The caravan of cars to attend will assemble in Castroville at 7:30 Wednesday evening, July 20, for a meeting of the directors before going on to the Austin hearing.

Economic Highlights

By now, the American public must be thoroughly confused over the various communist-spy cases that have been in the headlines so long.

The judges and the juries will decide on the merits of these and other cases. However, certain recent developments, directly affecting the FBI and the Department of Justice, need clarification.

There has been a widespread criticism of the publication of an FBI report which indicated that a number of very well-known people may be communists or communist sympathizers.

The FBI report in question was never supposed to be made public, and was never supposed to be conclusive evidence.

proposed, pending and inconclusive investigations. As the first line of defense against the communist underground, it is the FBI's duty to run down reports it receives, wherever they may lead, even though it knows most of them may wind up in blind alleys.

This being so, why was such a report ever made public? That is an interesting and important story. The government, in the Coplon case, wanted to restrict the reading of it to the judge and jury. This gave Miss Coplon's lawyer just the opportunity

dinal principle of American justice that defendants be protected he was looking for. It is a car from secret evidence. The judge backed up the lawyer — obviously he had no choice in the matter. He said, "If this case endangers the Government, the Government should not be here." In other words the Department of Justice had the choice of producing the alleged evidence, even though in the FBI's opinion this would endanger the national security, or it could refrain from producing it and let the case against Miss Coplon go by default.

HOW TO SHOOT A RIFLE

By ARTHUR E. COOK
National and Olympic Rifle Champion
Trigger Control



Control of the trigger can make or break you as a shooter. The accepted movie hero technique of yanking at the trigger with hardy more than a glance at the target is a loss. You can't hit anything consistently that way.

When your sights are aligned on the target the only way to get off the shot is to squeeze the trigger with such a smooth and steady motion that you do not disturb that aim. The trigger is squeezed by a steady movement of the forefinger only.

Speed and smoothness in the trigger squeeze can be combined but it takes practice and the best way to practice is with an empty gun. Aim at a small bullseye across the room and carefully let-off each shot. Since the rifle does not actually fire you can see your mistakes.

Another thing—while squeezing the trigger stop breathing and relax. The rise and fall of the chest while breathing will throw you off the target. Relaxation will reduce your pulse beat, which is another disturbing factor in precision aiming.

One final hint—always follow through. By that I mean keep looking through the sights at the target even after the shot is fired. This prevents movement of the gun before the shot has left the muzzle and often enables you to see where your shot hit when you are shooting in the field.

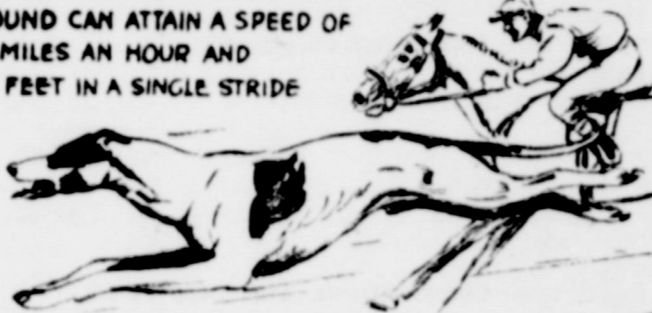
