FUNERAL SERVICES SATURDAY FOR MRS. H. C. SHARP

Funeral services were held at the Methodist Church at Pontotoc at 10 o'clock Saturday morning for Mrs. Hiberna Catherine Sharp, 87, who died in a hospital in San Saba Thursday morning.

Mrs. Sharp was a former resident of Sanderson, coming here with her late husband in 1910 and residing with her son, Fount Sharp, in Pontotoc, Texas, for the past thirteen years. She had broken both hips in falls during recent years and had been an invalid for the past ten years.

Survivors besides the son, Fount, include another son, Harry, of Sanderson and two daughters, Mrs. S. R. Ord and Mrs. Jennie Qualtrough of El Paso thirteen grandchildren, including W. R. Ord and Mrs. W. E. Hines of Sanderson, and eight great grandchildren. All attended the funeral services.

Dove, Quail, Deer Seasons in County Remain Unchanged

Deer hunting season and bag limit for the country west of the Pecos River remain the same as last year, according to word received from the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission.

Blacktail (mule) deer and whitetail shooting will begin Sunday, November 6, and conclude on Friday, November 11, Armistice Day.

The bag limits are one black-tail and one white tail. Quail season is from December 1 to December 31. The limit is 12 a day and 24 in possession.

Dove season west of the Pecos runs from September 1 through October 15, 10 a day and 10 in possession.

Dove season holds favorable prospects at present for nimbros with ample quantities of the birds in the Terrell County area at present. Quail have been seen in larger quantities than last year and their range has been over a wider territory.

OWENS RAM TOPS ANGELO SALE AT \$600 LAST WEEK

SAN ANGELO, August 4—Four hundred and sixty Rambouillet rams sold for an average of \$89.92 at the San Angelo Sheep Sale and Show last week.

Twenty-eight stud rams sold for an average of \$251.78 compared with a \$249.63 average last year. Top heavyweight yearling ram, consigned by Claude Owens of Fort Stockton, sold to Miles Pierce of Alpine for \$600. Pierce's lightweight yearling champion went to Dr. H. A. Wimberly of San Angelo for \$260 in a pen of seven.

Mrs. Ora Quigg, whose husband, Raymond, was killed June 17 when thrown from a horse as he attempted to rescue a girl from a run-away horse, has sold the Quigg ranch to Billy Neal, Jr.

Neal will take possession of the ranch October 1.

Mrs. Quigg has leased the 18,000-acre Ross Roberts ranch located 20 miles north-east of Sanderson and will move to that ranch on October 1.

Mrs. Quigg will be assisted in the ranch operation by her brother, 17-year-old Jim Bob Altizer, and her sister, Blanche Altizer, of Del Rio. Jim Bob will be remembered as the 1948 world's champion school boy calf roper. The title was won at Kerrville.

Mrs. Quigg has sold all of the rodeo stock which was her husband's specialty until his death, and will devote her time to orthodox ranching. She plans to run 4,000 sheep, 100 head of Brahman cattle and 1,500 head of goats on the Sanderson ranch.

Lamb Movements Start To Bring Range Relief

Movement of lambs to feeders started in a big way last week and continued shipments will bring more activity as stock men close out the marketable stuff.

Otho Adams shipped some 16,500 head of lambs from this point in the past few days. Lambs from Carl and Bill Cochran, Tom Herring, Johnny Williams, Townsend Bros., C. C. Mitchell, Keith Mitchell, Albert Appel, Monte Corder, Sid Harkins and Johnny Robert made up the shipments which went to Illinois and Missouri feeders to be ready for market.

Current prices prevailed in local transactions, Mr. Adams said. Sam Bell has contracted his lambs for delivery in October.

S. L. Stumberg and son, Temple, spent a week in San Angelo during the recent sheep sale and show there.

Stumberg took delivery on 3 Madsen Rambouillet stud rams at \$200 per head. He also purchased around 600 head of yearling ewes from the two San Angelo auction rings.

Stumberg reported 1.8 inches of rain on his place last week and R. N. Allen reported from 1-2 inch to 1 3-4 inches on his place.

Scattered rains over the Sanderson area has helped range conditions generally but there are some areas in this section that are suffering from the continued drought.

Ranchmen indicate that unless more rain comes in the next few weeks it will necessitate moving more stock from the ranges.

RESULTS OF TREK TO AUSTIN SHOWN IN HIGHWAY ORDER

An order to map makers to print Highway 90 and Highway 290 in the same color has been passed by the Texas Highway Commission in Austin following the appearance of a 67-man delegation in the interests of Highway 90, according to John L. Dodson, Jr., president of the Border Trails Association.

Dodson stated that he had a letter from Roy J. Davenport of Uvalde which read:

"Before the Commission adjourned their meeting they passed an order to the map makers that hereafter Highway 90 and 290 would appear on the state map in the same color. I hope the advertising committee for the association will keep active and at work so we will have appropriate signs directing winter traffic over Highway 90.

The group attending the hearing was commended for the interest shown in so large a delegation, and the commission assured the delegation that all their complaints would be given consideration.

With the accomplishment of the equal designation on the state highway maps there is no doubt but that 90 with the scenic advantages will draw its share of the traffic.

PRE-SCHOOL CHECK-UP URGED FOR CHILDREN

The month of September brings a return of school days and thousands of Texas boys and girls will be returning to classrooms for the next nine months. Every one of these children, according to Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, should be as free as possible from all physical defects that can be corrected, and protected against other diseases which frequently spread through classrooms.

A complete medical and dental check-up is of the utmost importance in getting the child ready for school. Eyes, ears, nose and throat and teeth should be carefully examined, and all remediable defects corrected or placed under treatment. Such defects can lead to serious impairment of growth and progress academically, socially and emotionally.

Defects of hearing and vision handicap a child in his class work, and often result in the false impression that he is backward and unable to learn. Such defects can often be corrected, and the child is not only more progressive in his school work, but is a happier, better balanced individual as a result of being more socially acceptable. Dental defects should be corrected not only for cosmetic reasons, but because good teeth enable a child to chew his food properly and thus promote good digestion and bodily nourishment.

"In addition to correcting such defects as already exist, young children should be protected by immunization against disease, when possible," Dr. Cox said. "Immunization is safe and dependable, and every child is entitled to this protection against disease."

Mrs. M. Vineyard, Former Teacher Here, Dies In Del Rio

Mrs. Minnie Belk Vineyard, 65, died at her home in Del Rio Monday morning. Funeral services were held in that city Tuesday afternoon.

Mrs. Vineyard came to Sanderson after attending the teachers college at Huntsville and taught here until she was married to O. J. Vineyard in 1913. She had resided in Del Rio for thirty-one years.

Survivors include two sons, O. J. and Bonny Vineyard of Del Rio and a daughter, Miss Onis Vineyard who is a Baptist missionary in Brazil.

Economic Highlights

When, in his inaugural address, President Truman called for a "bold new program" that would eventually banish hunger misery and despair from the free nation's of the world, the repercussions were heard around the globe. The President spoke in highly generalized terms and gave no details. But it was clear to all that this was a tremendous concept which would require many years to accomplish even in small part, and that the problems and the costs would be incredibly vast and complex. Since then, the program has been endlessly discussed, and from all sides. Some experts, who are sympathetic with the Presidents humanitarian purpose, have come to the view that the problems may be insoluble and that even the desirability of the program is subject to grave doubt. One of these is William Vogt, the scientist whose challenging and controversial book, "Road to Survival," in which he dealt with the exhaustion of natural resources, caused something of a bombshell a year ago. Mr. Vogt considers the Truman program in an important article in the Saturday Evening Post of July 23 called "Let's Examine Our Santa Claus Complex." Mr. Vogt points out that 1-

500,000,000 people "with living standards far below ours are concentrated in the so-called undeveloped areas." A high percentage of them are illiterate. They know nothing of modern science. If we gave them the tools and seed and other assistance there is no guarantee that the gifts would be properly used. But even if this were to be overcome, there is far more to the problem than money and tools. Mr. Vogt believes that the undeveloped lands are "intrinsically poor and require far greater investment of capital, labor and management to produce a much smaller return than could be had in the United States." They lack good soils, usable timber -- the most basic essentials of what we consider proper living standards. Finally, if we should set out to remake much of the world in our own image, we will run into a problem that might prove the most difficult of all -- the faiths and traditions of proud peoples with cultures older than ours, who seem primitive in our eyes but not in their own. Mr. Vogt says, "We bring down prices by standardizing a potter in Mexico's Tlaquepaque, on the other hand, with a distaste for monotony, charges more for standardized work. If we mechanize and standardize his work,

change him from a creative artist to a machine tender, shall we be raising 1 1/2 standard of living, and will he like it?" Our idea of what civilization is, in other words, is not shared by everyone else.

National Foundation Makes Loan For Local Polio Relief

Terrell County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis received from national headquarters of the March of Dimes organization last week a check for \$1,325.00 to assist in payment of local polio patients' medical care, it was announced today by W. W. Sudduth, chapter chairman. The money was requested from the emergency epidemic aid fund because the local chapter, which retains 50 percent of March of Dimes proceeds each year for financial assistance to polio patients, whose families cannot pay full costs unaided, has run out of funds. Terrell County Chapter is presently providing funds for the care, in whole or in part, of two patients stricken this year. The local chapter contributed \$700 to the Pool for Epidemic Aid and the balance of \$625 spent to date by the local chapter will have to be repaid to the National Foundation, which advanced the loan.

So far this year national headquarters has advanced \$3,244,909.95 to chapters as a result of increased incidence of infantile paralysis plus a heavy carryover of cases from 1948, year of highest incidence since 1916, said Mr. Sudduth.

The local polio fund netted \$25.00 this week by local contributors. They include J. C. Mitchell, \$10; H. A. Finger, \$5; J. S. Nance, \$5; and T. A. Herring, \$5.

Physiotherapy Machines Being Manufactured Here By Doctor

Known to local residents as the manufacturing plant and research work that may open possibilities in the treatment and cure of the crippling effects of polio, arthritis and muscular atrophy, or any muscular or circulatory impairment, Dr. M. Randall is manufacturing physio-therapy machines in the work shop of his home. The machines have been on the market for many years and in use in Kansas and surrounding territory, being manufactured in Kansas City. Before the war, the machines were manufactured in Houston and Antonio but both offices closed after the shortage of critical materials. The Rancher has plans to re-open the Houston office.

Order to not cause a stoppage in the making of the machines, Dr. Randall plans to move equipment from the Kansas office piece-meal to San Antonio.

Randall built the hollow-wood and steel building which now occupies on the side of the hill in the west part of town. The clinic and it is so arranged they still plan to open a site at some future date at the site after another story has been added to provide living quarters. Since they own the property to the Bustin Canon site, they have plenty of room for expansion of both manufacturing and clinical facilities.

With the expected expansion of manufacturing, Dr. Randall will hire additional help as soon as he is able to produce an increase of a machine a day.

The physiotherapy machine which holds all of Dr. Randall's work, is now enclosed in a case similar to a cosmetic case which is light and compact and can be easily carried by an adult. It can be used anywhere on AC electric service. The machine resembles a radio, but indicates if the current is on and a hand is moved over on a dial to regulate

the current. Two electrodes may be applied to any portion of the body where physio-therapy is needed. A very small child may be taught to operate the machine which balances muscular action. The machine literally forces muscles to exercise when coordination is impaired or retarded.

Dr. Randall is now manufacturing a combination body and foot exerciser machine, which, while in a larger case, is also light enough in weight to be carried by hand. He has plans for using a small electrode under the cast in case of fractured bones when the muscles of the limb may be exercised during the period of bone-healing and the use of the limb be practically normal after the cast is removed.

A machine has been donated to the local polio committee and one is being sent to the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation. The machines may be leased, rented or purchased at prices that seem cheap to the long period of physio-therapy treatment available in hospitals and clinics. Then, too, by a patient being treated at home, the bed as well as the skill of doctors and nurses is available for other patients, for, after all, physio-therapy treatments require more or less the same procedure for a long period of time.

Dr. Randall is doing research work with the idea of a machine that will take the place of an iron lung. This machine will induce artificial respiration in its present state but will not meet the requirements of an iron lung. For many years a plastic surgeon of renown, Dr. Randall is giving all of his time, study and interest in recent years to the field of physio-therapy. His chief interest seems to be from a humanitarian standpoint when the joy of relief brought to crippled patients means more than dollars and cents for the use of the machine.

Mrs. Randall, who is a physio-therapist and also a beautician, is in charge of sales of two beautification machines — a face exerciser and a reducing machine. She is leaving Sunday in order to be in the Kansas City office for a few weeks before going on the road to renew franchises and set up the machines in new offices. She carries on an intensive advertising campaign for the equipment.

Expected to be one of the largest goodwill visits ever made to Mexico, the trip's headquarters has been established in San Antonio. Point of departure will be Laredo, on September 3. The journey will last 10 days and will be made in special air-conditioned trains.

One of the many highlights in Mexico City will be a presidential banquet to be given in honor of the visitors by President and Mrs. Miguel Aleman at Casino Militar on Sept. 14. Other dignitaries of the Mexican government also will be present.

The Foreign Relations Committee of the San Antonio Chamber of Commerce has endorsed the trip as a worthy good will trip. The committee this week launched plans for filling two or more cars in a special train, under the direction of LeRoy G. Denman, Jr., its chairman. It is expected that other Chambers in the state will make similar plans.

GILMER-AIKIN BILL CAUSES TEACHER FIELD TO EXPAND FORTY-FOUR PCT.

AUSTIN, AUGUST 4 — Impact of the improved financial conditions for teachers under the new educational program for Texas has already been felt.

A survey of sixteen private and state-supported colleges and universities by the Texas State Teachers' Association shows an increased enrollment of graduate students this summer over last year of 2,957.

As told, the sixteen schools have 9,599 students taking post-graduate work as compared with 6,642 last summer, an increase of 44.5 per cent.

Comments of educators also show that passage of the Gilmer-Aikin bills, which com-

pletely reorganized the state school system, definitely has caused teachers to seek masters degrees or take refresher courses.

"Better prepared teachers will be reflected in more adequate education of our children," Charles H. Tennyson, director of public relations for the teachers association, said Saturday.

"Our survey of the colleges indicates that most of the students in the first summer term of the graduate schools are teachers."

"Under terms of the Gilmer-Aikin bills, teachers receive substantial pay increases, but

those holding masters degrees and who have several years classroom experience are especially benefited."

The increase in post-graduate work in all sixteen of the colleges is especially outstanding, Tennyson pointed out, in view of the fact that in many of the schools enrollment for the summer courses other than graduate work decreased.

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HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22
 Proposing an Amendment to Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Judge of the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law; providing for election proclamation and submission to qualified electors of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 7 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Sec. 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a General Election, a Judge, who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall be licensed to practice law in this State and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court in this State, or both combined, for four (4) years next preceding his election, who shall have resided in the district in which he was elected for two (2) years next preceding his election, who shall reside in his district during his term of office, who shall hold his office for a period of four (4) years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature. The Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law. He shall hold the regular terms of his Court at the County Seat of each County in his district at least twice in each year in such a manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have power by General or Special Laws to make such provisions concerning the terms or sessions of each Court as it may deem necessary.

"The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent, or is from any cause disabled or disqualified from presiding.

"The District Judges who may be in office when this amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 8, 1949, at which time all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5
 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the State Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the State Senate and House of Representatives shall receive from the State Treasury an annual salary of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3600), to be paid in monthly installments on the first of each month.

"They shall also be entitled to mileage in going to the seat of government for each session of the Legislature and returning therefrom, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty-cents (\$2.50), for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel from a table of distances to each county seat prepared by the State Comptroller.

Sec. 2. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 5. Two (2) regular sessions of each Legislature shall be held, and until otherwise provided by law, the time of the convening of the first regular session shall be at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each odd-numbered year, and of

the second regular session, at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each even-numbered year.

"At other times, when called by the Governor, the Legislature shall convene in special session."

"Appropriations for monthly recurring expenses and salaries paid by the State shall be made for a period of not more than twelve (12) months.

"At the second regular session of each Legislature, only proposals to amend the Constitution and to make appropriations to pay monthly recurring expenses and salaries and such other measures only as four-fifths (4-5) of the Membership of each House may determine shall be considered."

Sec. 3. The Amendment proposed herein, if ratified, by the people, shall become effective January first, A. D. 1950.

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

Each voter shall express his vote on the proposed Amendment in the manner provided by law.

Sec. 5. The Governor of this State shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4
 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Section 19 of Article 16, so as to provide that the qualification of no person to serve as a juror on grand juries and on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex; providing that existing provisions of the Constitution shall be construed in conformity herewith; providing that existing provisions of the Constitution shall be construed in conformity herewith; providing for the submission of this amendment to a vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof; and making an appropriation for such purposes.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 19 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualification of grand and petit jurors; provided that the qualification of no person for service on grand juries or on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex; and no person shall be exempt from service on grand juries or petit juries on account of sex."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors"; and

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15
 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section to be known as Section 48-b, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment of health units, and authorizing a tax in support thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended, by adding a new Section to Article III of said Constitution to be designated Section 48-b, reading as follows:

"Section 48-b. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county-city health units and the operation thereof and to authorize counties and cities to provide a tax of not to exceed twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property in counties and cities for the purpose of financing the said county-city health units; provided that no such tax shall be authorized except by a vote of the people residing in the city or county in which said tax shall be levied. The foregoing tax shall be levied only on county valuations."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified

electors of this State at the election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamations for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19
 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote of the people therein.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section to be known and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:

"Section 62-c. The Legislature is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but any system so authorized and established shall be approved by a vote of the people in said county. Any Civil Service System established by virtue of this Section shall apply to appointive offices only, and the limitations on term of office heretofore provided by Section 30 of this Article shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of such Civil Service System. This section shall not apply to counties having a population less than seventy-five thousand (75,000) people."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed or written thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1
 Proposing an amendment to Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution, repealing the provision making the payment of a poll tax a qualification of an elector; requiring the Legislature to pass a general registration law for the necessary election proclamation and publication by the Governor, and making an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is amended hereby so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that before offering to vote at any election a voter shall have registered as an elector before the first day of February next preceding such election. This provision shall be self-enacting. The Legislature shall pass a general registration law requiring registration of voters at a time not later than the first day of February for each election to be held for that calendar year, and the Legislature shall have power to prescribe a registration fee. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in

counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37
 proposing an Amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto another Section following Section 15, providing that the Legislature may provide for trials in lunacy cases without a jury; further providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 15, to read as follows:

"Section 15-a. The Legislature shall have the authority to enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for waiver of trial by jury in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, A. D. 1949, at which election all ballots shall be printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases"; and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases."

Each voter shall scratch out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the state at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide), the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts"; and

Sec. 3. That the Governor of the State of Texas issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

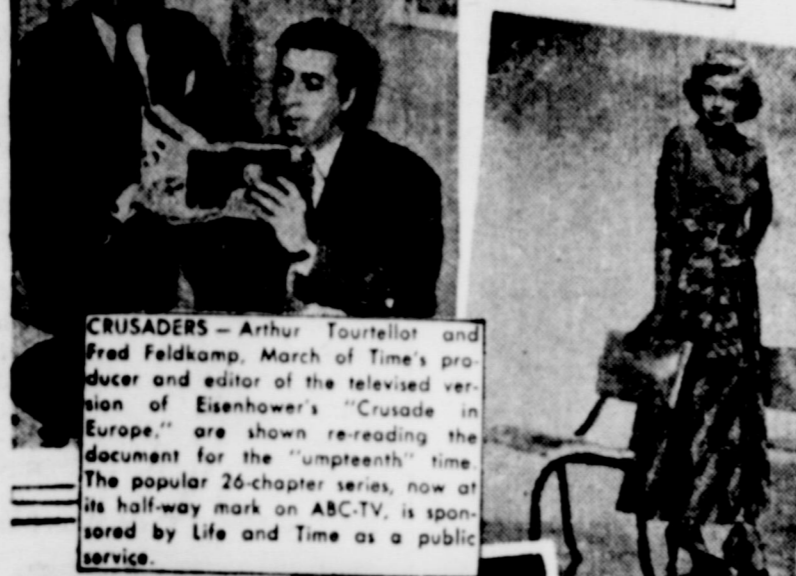
SANDERSON BOY PROMOTED TO AIRMAN

SURVIVES OPERATION — Richard Morse, 5-months-old of San Diego, Calif., recovers from an operation in which a broken needle was removed from his heart.



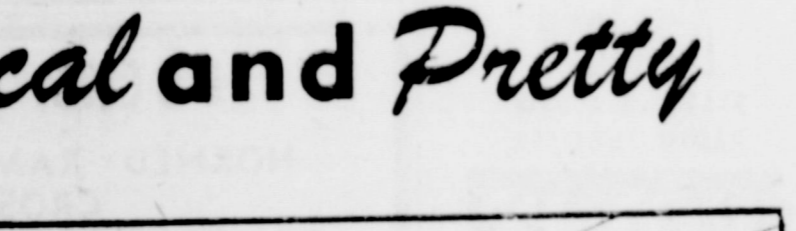

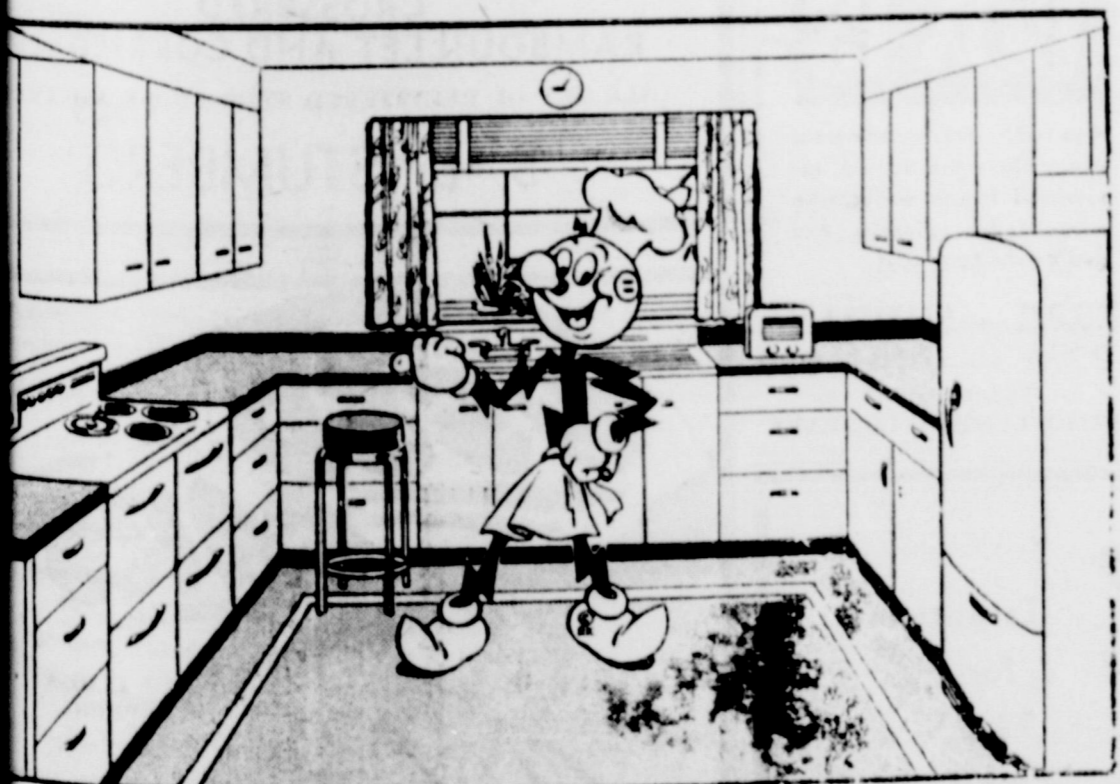
