Emmett L. Tiner Named Head Of Voc. Ag., Area II

Emmett L. Tiner, professor of vocational agriculture in the Alpine High School, has been named Supervisor of Vocational Agriculture of Area II effective September 1 by the Texas State Board for Vocational Education. His office will be at Sul Ross State College where he will be professor of Range Animal Husbandry.

Tiner graduated from Abilene High School in 1934, received the Bachelor of Science Degree in 1939 and the Master of Arts Degree at Texas A & M College in 1948.

Tiner succeeds Wilton E. "Bill" Williams who resigned to become professor of range animal husbandry and director of the division of vocations at Sul Ross on September 1.

Miss M. Bracher New District Agent

On September 1 Miss Margaret Bracher, home demonstration agent for Pecos County, became a district agent with the Texas Extension Service. Her resignation was announced early in August. The local Ranch Home Demonstration Club is affiliated with the Pecos County clubs.

The promotion for Miss Bracher follows a decade of unusual activity in state and national organizations of home demonstration agents. She came to Fort Stockton after twenty years of service in Harrison County at Marshall. In her new position she will have headquarters at College Station, traveling a district yet to be assigned. Her successor for Pecos County has not been named.

Universal Fishing License Required After August 31

Your artificial fishing license expired on the last day of August, and the recent session of the Legislature made some changes you should know about before you fail to renew it, and go off fishing.

Your new license will cost you \$1.95, and will replace several "special" licenses required in many counties, as well as in your own county. The old license sold for \$1.10.

The universal license, enacted by the 51st Legislature, sponsored by Rep. Doyle Willis of Fort Worth, may be obtained in the same manner as the artificial lure license now is obtained.

However, anglers should check the law's exemption provisions closely before venturing out on a fishing excursion.

It is the plan of the Legion committee to start selling tickets to the dance in the very near future and give the affair plenty of publicity so that everyone will have an opportunity to participate.

Plans for furnishing the new Legion home in the eastern part of town were discussed at the Tuesday night meeting. Next regular meeting of the post will be September 8 at the new home with families of Legionnaires as guests for a Dutch lunch after the business meeting. This will be the first meeting in the building, and although it is not furnished, chairs and tables will be moved in for the temporary furnishings.

LEGION COPS LOCAL PENNANT IN 5TH GAME

The American Legion softball team was declared winner of the local softball championship as they won the last game of a 3-out-of-5 playoff by 6-4. The Firemen were the winners of the trophy last year but turned the Higgins Cup over to the Legionnaires for them to keep until a winner is declared next year.

The Firemen went to bat first and the first three men went down on outs. The Legion came to bat and scored 3 runs in the first inning on 2 hits and 3 walks. The Firemen scored 1 run in the second inning and at the end of the inning the score was 3-1 with the Legion ahead. The Firemen failed to score in their half of the 3rd, and the Legion scored 2 runs in the last half, making the score 5-1. In the first of the 4th the Firemen got a man on base on an error, the second batter hit into a forced play at second and was safe at first on the fielder's choice. The third batter hit a double, putting a runner on second and third, followed by a fielder's choice hit putting the runner out at home leaving a man on first and third with 2 outs. Good Posture Aids Physical Growth

AUSTIN, Aug. 15 — Correct posture in school children, and adults as well, is necessary to proper physical and mental development, says a warning from the Texas State Department of Health. "Good posture is a sign of self respect and plays an important part in winning the respect of others," said Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer. "Many of the ills of childhood and the deformities of adult life have their beginning in poor posture acquired during childhood," he said, "and it is particularly important that the child's posture conform to nature's dictates. Most children are born in good physical condition and yet examination of large groups of school children show a high per cent to be suffering from poor posture. These lessen the size of the lung capacity. Abdominal organs may also be pushed out of natural position, which may seriously interfere with their action. These conditions must be corrected before the body is able to attain normal weight and nutritional standards. "School children who have poor posture are said often to average lower in attendance and in school mental and physical activities than those who have good posture. A child may be unable to hold his body in an unnatural position by a desk that is too high or too low. Desks and work tables should be just high enough to allow the feet to rest on the floor and the forearms and hands to rest upon the top, without the shoulders being hunched up. "Begin early in life to teach your children to stand straight and sit straight for health and self-confidence, and they should grow into strong, well-built men and women.

trict in the state. And if such election should be held, not a single member of the present legislature could then run to succeed himself. They have simply voted themselves out of a job if the amendment carries.

Another proposed amendment for voters' consideration is the one permitting women to serve on juries in Texas.

We believe that is a good one. The men can see that their "war department" gets on a jury and then he will be free to go fishing or meet with the fellows for a few hands of poker. There should be some restrictions on that amendment. It should have provisions made for the kind of apparel to be worn. If play suits are permitted it would create a playful attitude in the court room, and we believe, would be detrimental to the morale of the court and attorneys, not to mention the male members of the jury. Baby sitters is another problem that is not provided for in the proposed change.

From 1945 through 1947 the War Assets Administration was trying to sell a government-owned building in Baltimore but found no buyers. While this structure sat empty, the Government Printing Office paid over \$200,000 annually for equivalent but less desirable space in the same city. The War Department also paid \$2,619 for rental on two tractors worth \$500 each.

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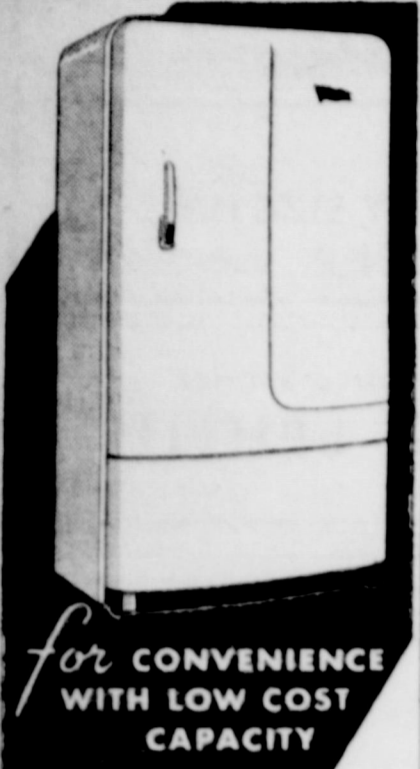
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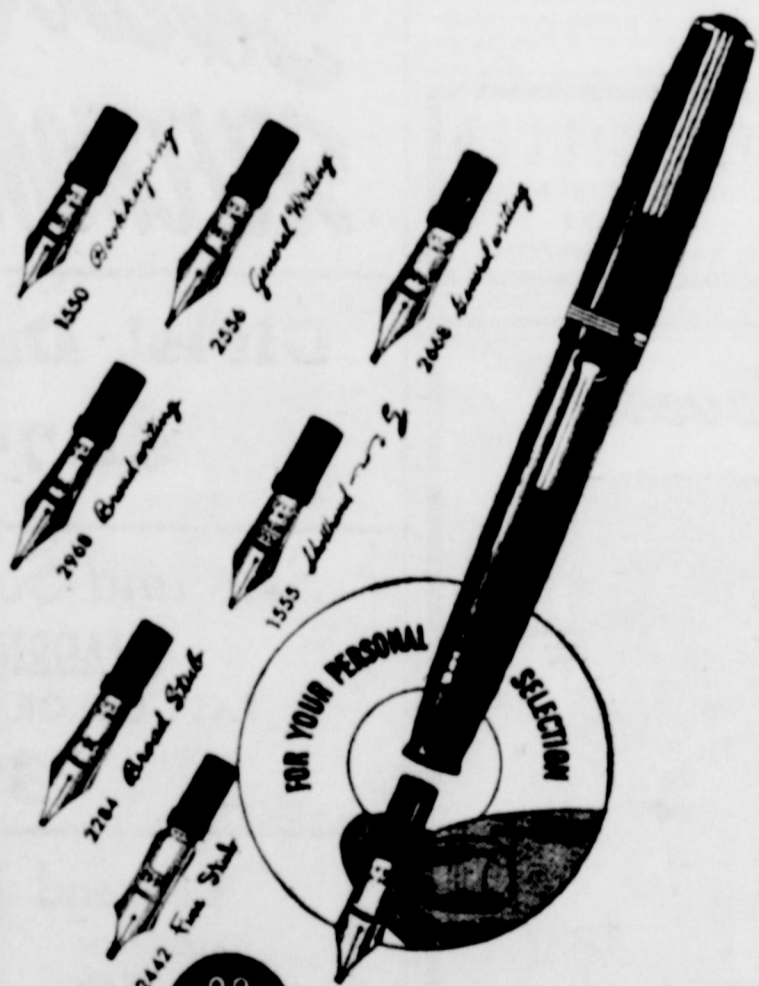

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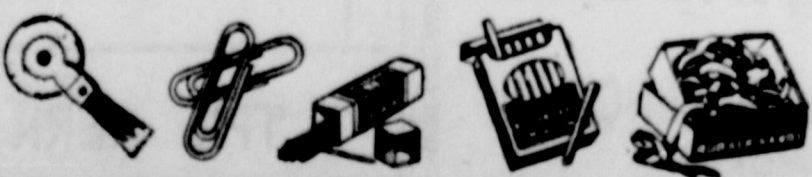
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
