Schedule Changes On All Passenger Trains Announced

Change of schedule on all passenger trains serving Sanderson on the Southern Pacific was announced this week, according to A. C. Smith, local agent for the railroad.

Sunset Limited, westbound train No. 1, will leave Sanderson at 6:30 a. m. instead of 7:50 a. m.; The Argonaut, west bound train No. 5, will leave at 11:00 p. m. instead of 12:20 a. m.

Sunset Limited, eastbound train No. 2, will leave Sanderson at 7:55 p. m., instead of 7:10 p. m.; and Argonaut, train No. 6, will leave at 5:30 a. m. instead of 5:45 a. m.

These changes, as announced will be effective commencing Sunday, October 2, Mr. Smith said.

Diesel-electric engines have been in use on some of the passenger trains for the past two weeks and will be used exclusively as soon as more of the units are available. The locomotives are three-unit equipment. It is expected that streamline equipment will be put into service soon to allow for greater speed than the old-type coaches.

Changes Made In Marriage Laws

According to House Bill 588 which was passed during the recent session of the 51st Legislature, both the parties concerned in getting a marriage license must have seriological tests by a duly qualified physician in a laboratory approved by the State Health Department. Also, the license must be used within fifteen days of issuance, or the procedure will have to be gone through again, says Ruel Adams, county clerk.

Formerly only the prospective groom had to take these blood tests, while the bride was exempted. Formerly, too, if a license was once issued, it was good indefinitely.

Adams states that this is to go into effect October 5.

"West Texas has a distinct advantage over most sections west of the Mississippi River," the survey says. "It has several cotton mills in addition to its newly acquired wool mills, which will furnish a nucleus of skilled help, one of the first requirements in establishing an industry."

Although the water shortage in West Texas is referred to, the survey says there are many places in West Texas where adequate water is available for such an industry.

Impetus can be given to the development of the industry in West Texas by a vigorous integrated education and research program," the survey shows.

A warning is issued, however, against expecting to find a bonanza in the industry, "but rather to build a solidly founded industry established on sound economic principles, which will grow of its own merit."

Irrigation Makes Prolific Garden and Orchard Here

Proof of the fertility of Terrell County soil with abundant water supply available was again evidenced last week when Mr. and Mrs. Keith Mitchell brought some of their tomatoes into the Times office.

The tomatoes were unusually large and meaty. The vines had been very prolific during the summer months and are now holding a large crop of green tomatoes.

Besides the tomatoes, they have had squash of two varieties and onions and beans in their garden which is irrigated from wells. A few pumpkins and watermelons remain now.

Their orchard produced an abundance of fruit also this year — the first year that most of the trees have borne. There are peach trees, pears, apricots, cherries, and grapes of several varieties. Apple trees are not yet old enough to bear and late freezes killed the early figs so that the later ones will probably not mature before cold weather.

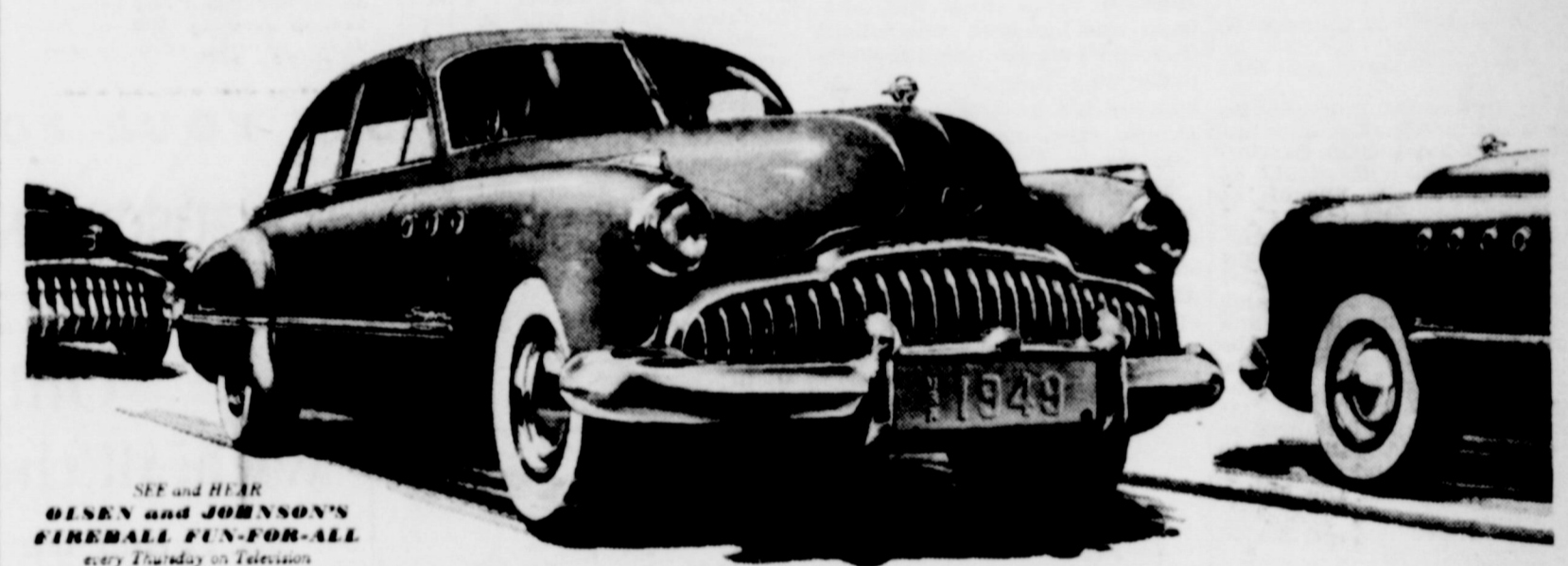

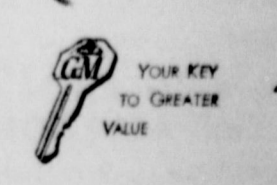
