If the county vote on November 8 approves the bond issuance in the amount of \$50,000 toward the construction of new buildings for the local school the Columbian Securities Cor-poration of San Antonio will be the purchaser of the bonds, according to J. G. Barry, superin-

tendent of the local schools. The purchasing company will pay all costs of proceeds of issuing the bonds, including the legal fees, election forms, printing of bonds, etc.

Accord to Mr. Barry the bonds will draw an interest rate of 21/2 per cent interest payable semi-annually, and \$5,000 bonds to be

retired each year for 10 years. Mr. Barry addressed local civic clubs last week following the order of the election on November 8 by the Commissioners Court explaining the need for the additional buildings and stressing the urgency of the voters' support for the proposed bond issuance by explaining that there would be no tax increase to the property owners and the principal would be paid back by the transferring of funds as set up in the financial administration of the school. He explained that any of the members of the school board would be glad to outline the plan as proposed by the body and clarify any ques-tion that might arise on the part of the voters.




