## BUCKS TAKE EAGLES 19-13 IN CLOSING MINUTES OF THRILLER HERE FRIDAY NITE

Football fans who needed the promise of plenty of action in a football game came out to the local stadium last Friday and were not disappointed in what they saw in the way of excitement and thrills. Many Alpine fans were on hand to lend to the support of their team and rooting was continuous from spectators, pep squads and bands.

Alpine won the game in the closing minutes of the fourth period 19-13.

Passes galore spotted the air and were responsible for most of the long gains of both teams, although several splendid runs by the backfielders netted several yards each.

Sanderson drew pay in their

opening try with the ball after receiving the kickoff when Olivares threw a pass to Smith that was good for 56 yards and a touchdown on third play of the game. An Olivares to Smith pass was responsible for the Eagles' second touchdown in the third frame. This pass was for 23 yards. A Chamberlain to Flores pass gained the extra point after the second touchdown.

The Bucks made their first touchdown on a scrimmage play after driving the ball down to the 1-foot line. Their second in the second period was on a 67-yard run through the middle and their third was a pass good for 54 yards.

The Eagles were in scoring position in the second period just before the half when they got the ball down to within a yard of the goal and one play before the whistle failed to put them across the goal.

Again in the third period the Eagle had the ball on the Alpine 4 and were unable to go across. Their fourth down pass in the end zone was touched but missed by the receiver.

Neither the Eagles nor the Bucks were very successful in their attempt at line plays and many times during the game the team with the ball either just made the line of scrimmage or were thrown for a loss. Both lines were working beautifully in their blocking and defensive work and afforded little time for a play to get under way. It was noted that Olivares was afforded all the protection to be expected when he went back to throw a pass, often times the Eagles being in complete control of the situation for his benefit.

Many of the fans who witnessed the game stated that it was one of the best games they had seen on the field in several years and definitely the top game for the Eagles this year. Both teams were in top sportsmanship form, with a minimum of penalties for infractions jeopardizing the safety of any of the players.

Both the Alpine and Sanderson bands performed during the half time. The Alpine band was spectacular in that it had a corps of 8 majorettes who performed baton twirling feats in unison for the spectators. The Sanderson band went on the field at halftime to present a new school song for the pleasure of the fans. The music for the song was written by W. R. Lewis, band director, and the words by Supt. J. G. Barry.

## FUNERAL SERVICES FOR NOTLEY M. SCOTT IN SAN ANGELO

Funeral services were held in San Angelo Friday for Notley M. Scott, 62, well-known Terrell County ranchman who died of a heart ailment in that city Wednesday afternoon. Burial was in Fairmont Cemetery.

Scott had lived in San Angelo for the past ten years but had continued to operate his 700-acre ranch forty-eight miles south-west of Ozona.

Residing at the Cactus Hotel with Mrs. Scott, he became ill in his hotel room early in the afternoon and died on the way to the hospital. A native of Illinois, Mr. Scott came to Texas at the age of eighteen. Two years later he bought a seven-section ranch in Terrell County from the late Joe Nance and built up the ranch to its present forty sections.

Using the S-Bar brand, he raised cattle, sheep and registered quarter horses. His original stock of Rambouillet sheep were bought from A. G. Anderson of Pecos County about the same time that he bought the first part of his ranch. He began using Suffolk sheep in 1932 to increase the mutton qualities of his flock.

He was married to Miss Bob Hicks of San Angelo November 22, 1922. The only survivor besides the widow is a brother, Dr. Preston B. Scott of Alexis, Illinois.

Mrs. Bustin Canon and Lindsey Hicks are sister and brother of Mrs. Scott and with Mr. Canon attended the funeral services.

## DEER, FEW, FAT, BEING KILLED IN LOCAL AREA

The first three days of the deer season this year netted few deer to hunters but those that were brought through here were exceptionally fat and good size. The moonlight nights opening the season caused varied opinions from hunters and ranchmen as to the location of the deer in the daytime. The consensus is that they graze during the bright nights and lay down in the day time. Some say that they are up on top of the mountains and others believe the deer to be deep in the canyons and some, who are splitting the difference recommend hunting about half way up.

Several white tails have been killed in the northeastern part of the county but relatively few blacktails have been taken from where they were reported to be numerous.

Estimates of hunters who have gone through Sanderson since last Friday range upwards of 500.

## Abilene Man Named Texas Chairman For March of Dimes Fund

New York, N. Y., Nov. 10.—Ed S. Stewart, prominent Abilene businessman, has been appointed Texas State Chairman of the 1950 March of Dimes, Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, announced today. It is Mr. Stewart's second year as head of the fund raising appeal in Texas.

As chairman, Mr. Stewart will be in over-all charge of planning and organizing the annual polo drive, and will coordinate activities of all city and county campaign directors in the state. The March of Dimes is conducted each January by the National Foundation and its 2,800 county chapters to finance the nationwide fight against polio in the fields of patient care, scientific research and professional education. The 1950 appeal will be held January 16-31.

Mr. Stewart, a native of Waco, has been long active in civic affairs and welfare work. A West Texas food broker for 17 years, he is now owner of the Abilene Candy Manufacturing Company. During the first World War he served overseas with the Army's Corps of Engineers. A past president of the Abilene Chamber of Commerce and the Rotary Club, he was Taylor County director of the American Red Cross War Fund in 1943 and 1944.

Commenting on Mr. Stewart's re-appointment to Texas' top March of Dimes post, Mr. O'Connor declared that the National Foundation is now facing the "most crucial period" in its 12-year history.

He described the 1949 polio epidemic as the worst on record, with more than 40,000 cases expected by the end of the year. "By December," he said, "the Foundation and its chapters will have spent \$31,000,000 assisting polio victims throughout the nation."

Mr. O'Connor also pointed out that by mid-summer the national epidemic aid fund had run "dangerously low" and the organization was forced to conduct the recent Polio Epidemic Emergency drive as a "stop-gap" measure to carry it over until the regular drive.

From January 1 through September 30, he said, the National Foundation sent more than \$7,000,000 to hard-hit chapters that had exhausted their own March of Dimes funds in caring for local polio patients.

## Vets To Receive Disabled Pay Raise

Austin, Nov. 8.—Veterans of World Wars I and II and of the Spanish American War will receive increased disability and dependency payments estimated at \$112 million annually under the provisions of a bill recently signed by President Truman, the Texas Military District announced here today.

The Veterans Administration estimated that 2,024,000 veterans will be affected under the section liberalizing disability and death benefits. Men of World War I with disabilities presumed to be service-connected will get full compensation instead of the current 47 per cent.

Provisions of the bill applicable to veterans of all three wars increase the length of time for which payments may be made for arrested cases of tuberculosis and set up a new disability schedule based on \$150 monthly for total disability and \$15 for 10 per cent disability. The old rate was \$135 and \$13.80.

In addition, the bill grants a monthly allowance to widows with a child or children; and states that veterans with 50 per cent or more disability will receive additional payments for dependents.

## Grand Jury Indicts Iowa Man For Local Burglary Tuesday

The 63rd District Court grand jury indicted David L. Cunningham of Des Moines, Iowa, who was charged with burglary, last Thursday.

The jury was sworn in by District Judge Roger Thurmond and took evidence on the alleged burglary of Jimmie's Steak House the previous week. Cunningham was apprehended in Del Rio and taken from a train there. He had the missing articles from the cafe in his possession at the time of his arrest, according to officers.

The accused man was reported to have admitted to the burglary and he informed the sheriff's department that he is now serving a suspended sentence in Iowa.

The young defendant is being held in the Terrell County jail awaiting trial, Sheriff J. S. Nance said.

Two other indictments were returned by the grand jury which they billed Earl (Whitey) Durdan and Howard Chaney for burglarizing a freight car in the T&NO railroad yards here. These two men have not been apprehended but were implicated in the box car robbery by Harry Nathan Westinghouse of Houston, who is being held in jail here. The trio will be charged in Federal Court, according to C. E. Weeks, special agent in charge of FBI in San Antonio.

Ed Riggs, marshal, came after Westinghouse Thursday and took him to Del Rio where he will be held for the Federal Grand Jury.

O. T. Fisher and Jimmy Roberts were released Wednesday.

## AUSTIN HUNTERS HERE FOR BLACKTAIL HUNT

Avin Vandygrift, chief clerk in the land office at Austin, J. H. McQuown and Charles R. Leggett, both with the State Land Office; Donald Jackson, sporting goods dealer; E. C. and Roy Thomas, lumber dealers, were here this week from the capitol city for a deer hunt. The party was on the Red Roak ranch.

The bonds were voted 110 to 27. Precinct 1 voted 78 for and 15 against; Precinct 2 cast 16 for and 8 against while Precinct 3, with only 12 votes, approved the issue 10 to 2. Independence box cast 6 votes for the issue and 2 against.

Terrell County named A. R. Dennison as their choice for the position on the State Board of Education from District 16. Dennison polled 67 votes while Herman (Heinie) Rosch of El Paso received only 24. Board members from the state's 21 Congressional districts will form a state board of education, which will appoint a commissioner to assume the duties of the present state superintendent of schools.

In district tabulations the El Paso candidate won almost two to one, according to late incomplete count.

Amendments approved were No. 1, which pertains to county civil service employees retirement; No. 3, creating hospital districts; No. 7, District Court proceedings; No. 8, Rural Fire Prevention and No. 10 which permits women to serve on grand and petit juries.

## SCHOOL BOARD TO SEEK BOND REFUND AT HUGE SAVING

The school board of the Terrell County Common School District, composed of Jimmy Caroline, Hugh Rose and J. A. Mullins, and Supt. J. G. Barry, County Judge R. S. Wilkinson, and County Attorney Jack Hayre will leave this week end for Austin to appear before the State Board of Education to ask for the release of the bonds now drawing 5 per cent interest.

Supt. Barry said that if the bonds were released they will be refunded at 2 1/4 per cent and 2 1/2 per cent making a total saving in the next seventeen years to the district of \$34,000 in interest cost.

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Vets Serial Number Indicates Order Of Insurance Refund

The Veterans Administration announced last week the order in which National Service Life Insurance checks will be mailed to veterans, commencing in January.

The lower the last three digits of a veterans serial number, the sooner he will receive the special refund. In case a veteran had more than one serial number while in the service, the VA will go by the number of his insurance.

With no deadline for the filing of applications, blanks continue to come in at the rate of about 10,000 a day, with about 13,500-000 veterans making application for the refund to date. About 10,000,000 checks are supposed to go in the mails the first ten weeks after payment begins.

Repayments totalling \$2,800,000,000 are due 16,000,000 veterans with checks to range from 90c to \$528, depending upon the amount of insurance carried and the length of time he paid premiums.

According to the planned procedure, veterans whose serial numbers end with 000, 001, 002, 003, 004, 005, 006, 007, 008, and 009 will be the first in the group to receive checks.

In the second group are veterans whose serial numbers end with 010 through 019. Next comes those with serial numbers ending 020 through 029.

This procedure continues until the final group — 990 through 999 — is reached.
