TURKEY SHOOT SUNDAY AT 1:30 P.M.

The annual Fire Department's Turkey Shoot will be Sunday afternoon at 1:30 at the site on Sanderson Canyon usually used for that purpose. Promises of good weather are in store for the event and turkeys and chickens have been bought to supply the hunters with good targets for shooting. The turkeys will be shot at from 100 yards with any rifle of the shooters' choice, and chickens will be shot at from 60 yards with 22 calibre rifles and turkeys will be the targets for pistol fans from 25 yards. Open sights will be permitted, but no scopes will be allowed by the Firemen. Hunters and shooters can bring the gun of their own choosing for the shoot.

In last year's shoot, the wind was icy and strong and prevented local gun fans from doing even average on the range, but the fall weather seems to be in favor of the shooters rather than the turkeys.

Local Firemen use the money raised to help to buy equipment for fire fighting and attendance is urged to support the worthwhile program. The Firemen must pay for the turkeys at market price out of the proceeds, before a profit can be realized.

BOND REFUND GRANTED; HUGE INTEREST SAVING

Two members of the school board of the Terrell County Common School District, James Caroline and J. A. Mullins, Supt. J. G. Barry, County Judge R. S. Wilkinson, County Attorney J. M. Hayre and Sid Harkins returned Tuesday night from Austin where they appeared before the State Board of Education to seek the release of old bonds drawing 5% interest. Senator Hill D. Hudson of Pecos assisted the committee in presenting the case and the request was granted.

The bonds will now be refunded and re-issued to draw 2 1/4% for the first \$55,000 and 2 1/2% for the balance. They will be retired in seventeen years, making a net gain to the district of \$34,000 in interest alone.

Many Hunters But Few Deer During Six-Day Season

The six-day deer season west of the Pecos closed at sundown Friday with many disappointed and unsuccessful deer hunters blaming the weather on the scarcity of bucks seen to even provide a shot. Clear nights and warm sunny days caused the deer to graze at night and lie in secluded spots during the day.

A larger number of nineros were on hand locally and passing through here to the mountain country than were observed last year. The ratio of deer brought back appeared to be even smaller than last year. However, every deer this year was fat and some fine eating was provided by those successful in getting their buck. Most of the deer killed were blacktails and several fine head and horn specimens were noted.

Deer season in the hill country opened Wednesday and will last until December 31. Flag tail deer are native of that area with two bucks for the season limit.

CITIZENS URGED TO PAY POLL TAXES

Mrs. Eddie Leatherwood, deputy tax collector, wishes to remind all Terrell County citizens to pay their poll tax. She stated Monday that but few residents had paid poll taxes as they were waiting the outcome of the election and the possibility of the passing of the proposed constitutional amendment to abolish the poll tax in Texas.

After final tabulations of the Texas voters on the proposed amendments have been made and the amendment favoring the registration of voters instead of the poll tax failed to pass, poll taxes are now payable in all Texas counties.

All persons expecting to vote in any election next year, unless exempt, must pay his poll tax by January 31, 1950. Poll taxes may be paid at the same time as other taxes but they must be paid in person.

Next year will be an election year for state and county offices and every citizen should pay his poll tax.

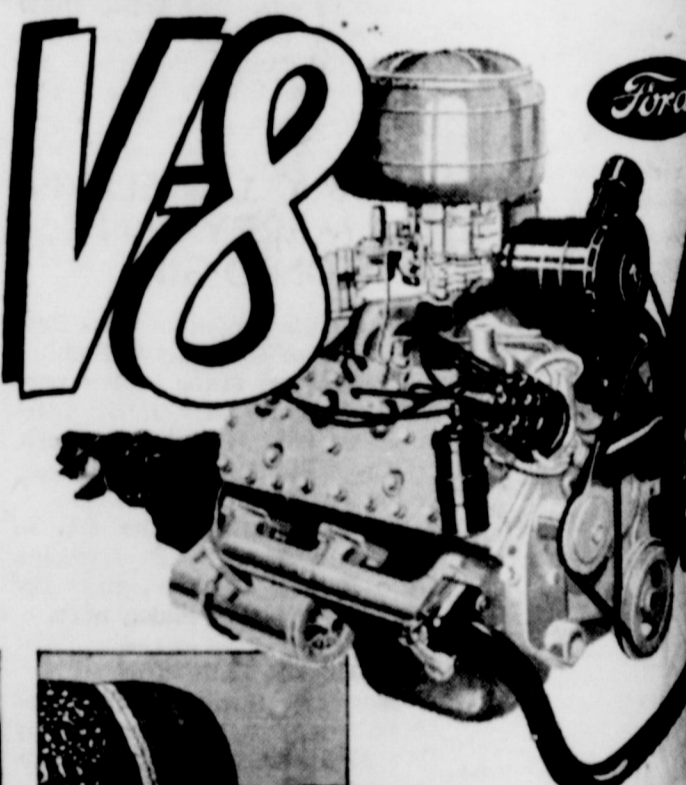

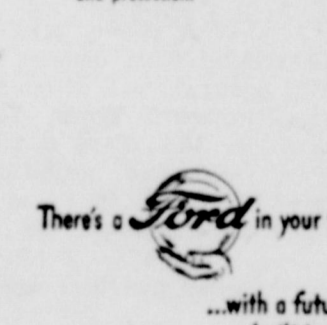

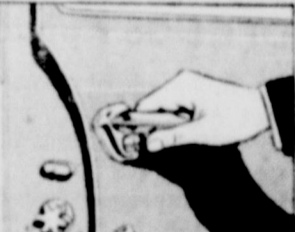

The State of Texas says
Butane and Propane Dealers
Must KNOW Gas

The Law of the State of Texas REQUIRES that EVERY PERSON or FIRM — EVERY ONE — who installs or connects butane and propane (liquefied petroleum) gas systems, equipment or appliances MUST BE LICENSED by the Gas Utilities Division of the State Railroad Commission. These licenses are issued ONLY AFTER an applicant has taken a WRITTEN examination and PROVED his knowledge of the characteristics of butane and propane gases, and his experience in handling such equipment and his knowledge of the State's Rules and Regulations governing ALL butane and propane installations.

BUTANE and PROPANE LICENSES ARE SEPARATE and DISTINCT

NO OTHER license of ANY kind permits ANY person or firm to make such installations or connections. Plumbers and Master Plumbers are NOT PERMITTED by Law to perform such work UNLESS they have this Specific, Separate and Distinct License issued by the Gas Utilities Division of the Railroad Commission. Because a merchant SELLS appliances for the use of butane and propane DOES NOT mean that merchant or any of his employees may LEGALLY install or connect this equipment for you.

Some plumbers, some merchants and their employees HAVE passed this examination and are properly licensed to do such work. But ALL have not. And the Law of Texas says the man who installs or connects ANY butane or propane equipment MUST have this particular and specific license. This law was passed to protect YOU and YOUR FAMILY.

NO OTHERS ARE QUALIFIED

The man who holds a license as a butane and propane installer — this license issued by the Gas Utilities Division of the State Railroad Commission — is experienced in this work. He is trained for his job. He KNOWS the rules and regulations set up by the State for YOUR protection. He has PROVED his qualifications by written examination. HIS work will be done in full accordance with the Law. He — and ONLY he — can do his work LEGALLY.

BE SURE YOU'RE SURE

Don't take a chance. Don't let "just anybody" tamper with or work on your butane or propane equipment. Be SURE the man who does is PROPERLY AND LEGALLY LICENSED TO DO THIS WORK. Be sure You're Sure!

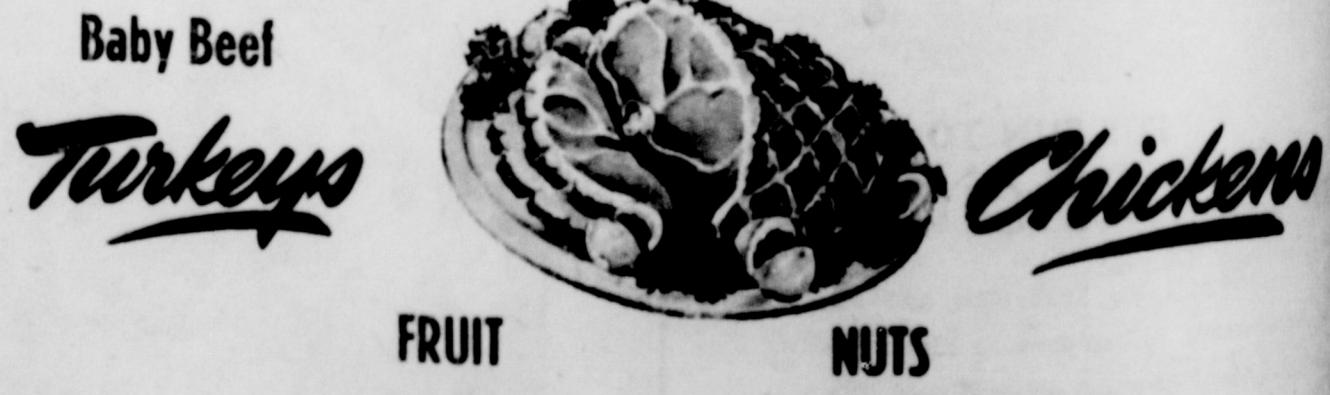
