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Editorial Comment:

"Well Done"

Sheriff Charles Lovelace, his assistants and other law enforcement officials of the area are due a resounding 'Well Done.'

They have again proved that 'Crime Does Not Pay.' The recent apprehension of the persons charged with breaking into over 51 businesses and schools in the panhandle and New Mexico can only be considered as admirable. The burglaries which they have apparently solved date back as far as 1959.

The modern criminal makes only one mistake when he commits a crime -- he violates the law. And the law in this part of the country has, through its recent efficiency, again pointed out the seriousness of that mistake.

The criminal may be of the bravest type of person but he is forever plagued with the fear of being discovered. And so long as law officers continue with their diligent attention to details and bring culprits to justice, regardless of the time elapsed between the commission of the crime and the arrest of the guilty party, criminals will live in fear of the law -- or at least, they will remain uneasy of mind.

If a man thinks he is fast and can cover ground in a hurry, he should try to keep up with a law officer in Parmer County when he is hot on the trail of a criminal. He would be surprised to discover how slow he really is.

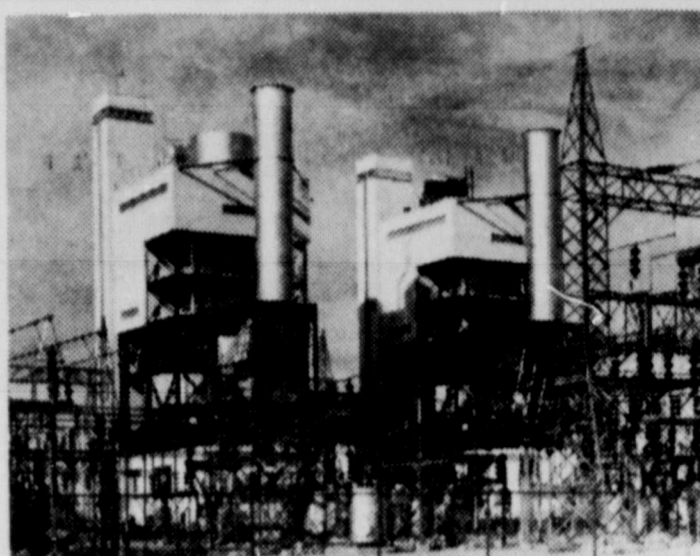

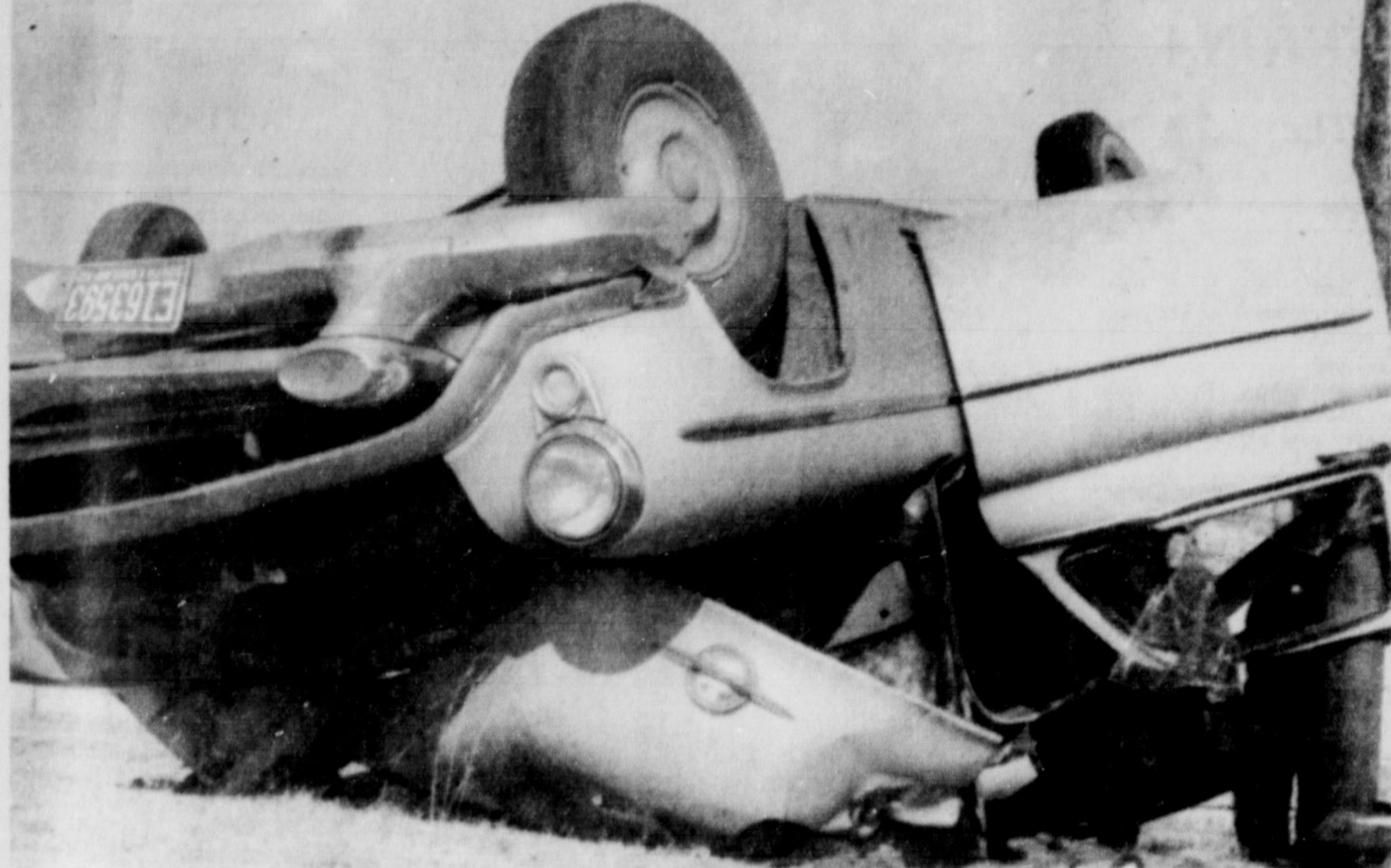

leaped a three foot ditch, slammed into the far side of the ditch, made a complete turn in the air over the top of

a fence post and landed on the wheels in the pasture.

According to reports, neither Greeson or Salgado were thrown clear of the vehicle. Greeson was knocked unconscious but came to and went for help. The car was considered a total loss.

Mrs. Warren was driving a 1958 Oldsmobile east on Farm Road 214 Friday morning about 9:30 when she apparently lost control of her car when it struck the shoulder of the road.

The car left tire marks where it veered back onto the pavement and again plowed into the shoulder with the front tires turned at an angle. The right front tire dug into the soft dirt of the ditch and car began an end over end flight which ended with the car on its top against a utility pole and on top of a barb wire fence.

Mrs. Warren was reported to have been partially thrown from the car and to have crawled back to turn off the still running engine. She was still conscious when the ambulance arrived.

The two tires on the right side were partially rolled from the rims and all four doors were thrown open and smashed back on their hinges. Gasoline and oil were still pouring from the fuel tank and engine when officers arrived a few minutes after the accident. The car turned over one and one-half times and is considered a total loss.

In the Saturday wreck, Mrs. Kutuman and Mayfield were riding in a 1962 Ford driven by a friend, Teofilo Estrado of Garita, New Mexico. They were going south on highway 214.

Justo G. Sanchez, Amarillo, was driving a 1961 Buick and towing another as he approached the draw from the south. Sanchez stated that the towed car began to weave around and caused him to lose control of his vehicle. From all indications and statements at the scene of the accident, Estrado tried to pull off the highway far enough to let Sanchez pass but failed and just north of the

bridge and at the bottom of the draw, crashed almost head on with the Sanchez car. The towed car broke loose and crashed into a fence about one-quarter mile up the road.

Neither Estrado nor Sanchez were injured.

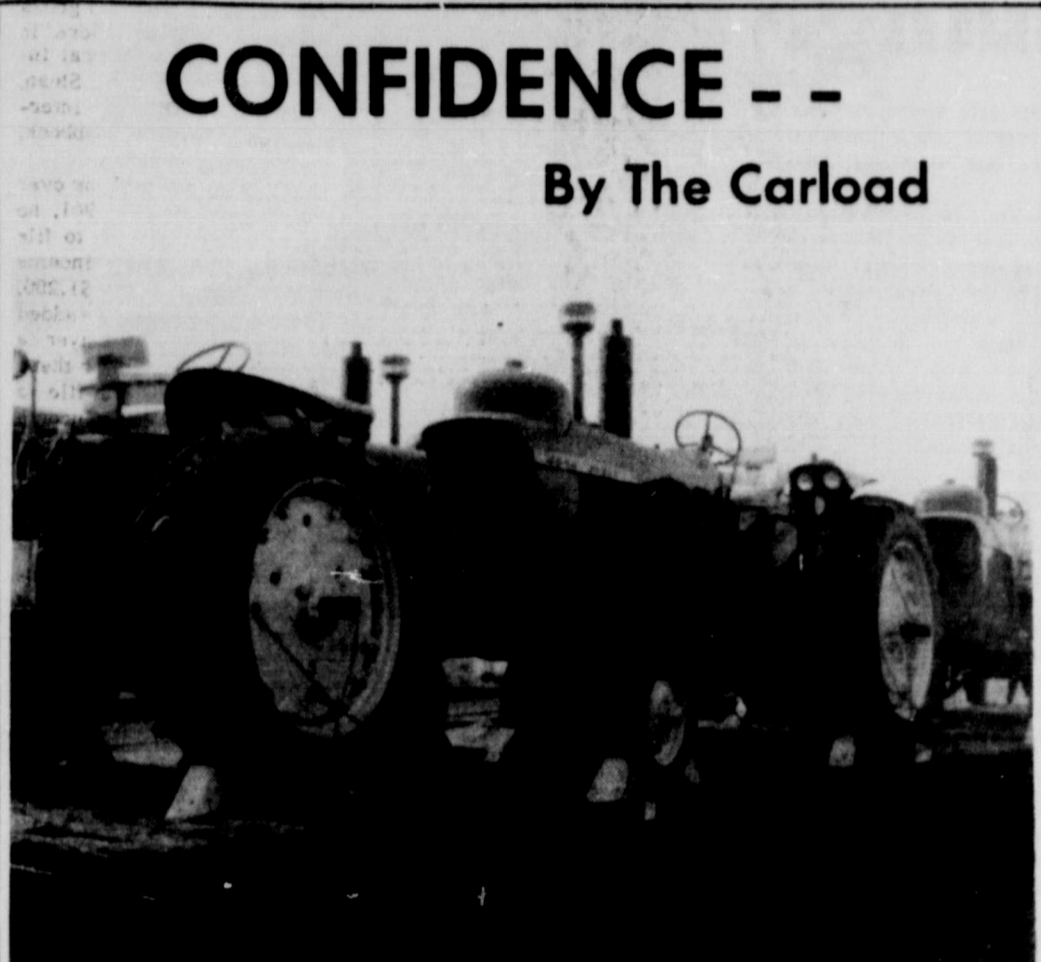

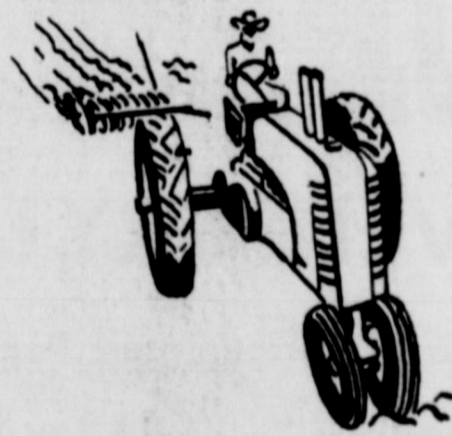

Special Session Aimed At Escheat Law Change

AUSTIN, Tex. -- "Escheat" is a word you'll hear often during the next 30 days.

With the fourth session of the 57th Legislature under way the most important item on the agenda is "escheat." Governor Price Daniel called this third special session because he believes the more than 1,500 banks and savings and loan associations should be subject to escheat.

But just what is "escheat?" It's a process as ancient as Roman history; written in Old England's feudal law; described by Webster as, "Reversion of land to the crown, or to the state in the United States, by failure of persons legally entitled to hold the same."

Escheat provisions were incorporated in the constitution of the Republic of Texas, and enacted as a state statute in 1885.

Texas law always has stated that when anybody dies without heirs, or disappears and can't be found, his property shall be turned over to the state, after seven years. But the law has lacked a provision by which persons or institutions holding property of missing persons were required to report it.

Governor Daniel started pushing for a provision three years ago, and last summer the Legislature finally passed a reporting provision. But the bankers have fought it long and successfully. They are still exempt from the reporting law, although all

other businesses and public agencies must comply.

During the interim between legislative sessions, a special house committee has been investigating enforcement of escheat laws applicable to banking institutions. Committee discovered that much of the \$4,000,000 escheatable accounts lying dormant in Texas banks is being dissipated through service charges and recommended that:

1. The Legislature add banking institutions to the escheat enforcement law without delay, and require banks to advertise for lost owners after seven years.

2. That this matter receive prompt attention in the January session, because the committee estimates a year's delay would mean the loss of \$1,000,000 through the procedure of service charges on accounts that don't require service.

3. That the committee keep on working to see if there are any other considerations which should be brought to the attention of the 58th Legislature.

LOAN SHARK LEGISLATION-- Although the Governor hasn't said he'll introduce loan legislation at the special session, it's considered a safe bet that the uproar over "loan shark" practices of sky-high interest rates will prompt him to place this issue on the January agenda.

The Legislative Council had a heated debate, and voted 9-2 to commend a loan bill backed by Representative Criss Cole of Houston.

Cole's bill sets a 10 per cent ceiling on interest to be charged on loans.

A lender would be able to charge more than 10 per cent on loans under \$1,500 only if he got a state license, paying \$200 for investigation and \$200 a year license fee. To get the license, he'd have to hold \$15,000 in liquid assets for each loan office,

and post a \$20,000 surety bond, plus \$5,000 for each branch, plus the \$200 annual fee for each office.

Cole's bill calls for creation of a Consumer Finance Commission which would examine each lender's books annually, at the expense of the lender.

Interest charges would be limited to: 10 per cent per annum on the amount of cash advance; plus a "service and availability charge" of 3/4th of one per cent per month for each \$1 of the first \$400 of the loan on loans over \$100.

On loans under \$100, the charge would be \$1 for each \$5 borrowed, with at least 15 days to be allowed to repay each \$5 of the loan.

If excessive charges are made, the lender would have no right to collect principal or charges, and would be fined from \$100 to \$1,000, and confined to the county jail as long as six months.

The dissenting votes in the Legislative Council were from Senator Charles Herring of Austin, who calculates the minimum rate on loans of \$1,500 to be 45 per cent, and Rep. Don Kennard of Fort Worth, who figures a \$5 loan for 15 days would cost the borrower 464.4% interest under the Cole bill.

TOURIST BOOSTERS REACH 1,000--The 600 who decided to organize a Texas Tourist Council at the November "Texans for Tourists" conference here, have swollen to an estimated 1,000. They will gather in Austin on January 10 for the first Council meeting.

After the group approves a constitution and elects officers for the "nonpartisan, nonprofit" tourist promotion organization, it will host a "dutch lunch" for all representatives and senators.

Luncheon will feature a presentation urging that money be made available from the General Fund to the Texas Highway Department for tourist advertising purposes.

W. Price Jr., chairman of the Tourist Council's executive committee, writes, "We have every reason to believe that the Governor will submit

in his call appropriations for the tourist attraction program before our meeting on January 10."

Earlier, the committee estimated that \$3,000,000 would be needed from General Revenue to get the advertising program underway. The Council hopes to augment this amount with \$2,000,000 in private subscriptions.

PRESIDENTIAL TASK FORCE--National interest in Texas' program of work with the mentally retarded resulted in the appointment of Charles S. Eskridge, director of the Division of Special Education of the Texas Education Agency, to the President's Task Force Committee on Education and Rehabilitation.

Eskridge will serve with physicians, scientists, educators and rehabilitation specialists selected from other sections of the country.

Approximately 5,000,000 Americans are mentally retarded, of whom four per cent reside in institutions at an annual cost of almost \$300,000,000.

The Texas Education Agency has been notably successful in a cooperative school-work program of local school education of mentally retarded children between the ages of six and 17.

HOUSING FOR THE AGED--In an effort to stimulate housing for those men and women among Texas' 745,000 old folks who need neither specially-built small homes, apartments priced within their limited incomes or institutions that offer nursing care, the Governor's Committee on Aged has prepared a guide to federal building programs.

Guidebook outline procedures and requirements for obtaining building loans from seven federal agencies, some of which are virtually unknown to the average citizen or organization.

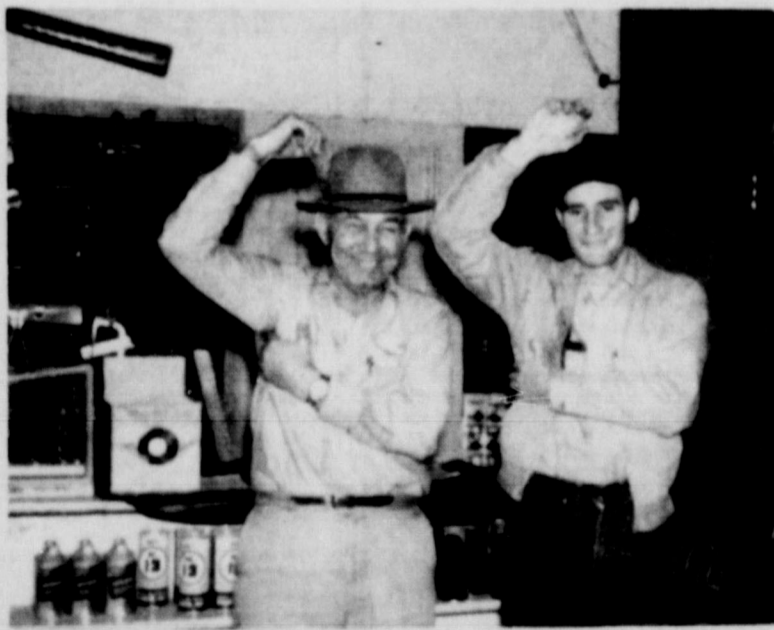

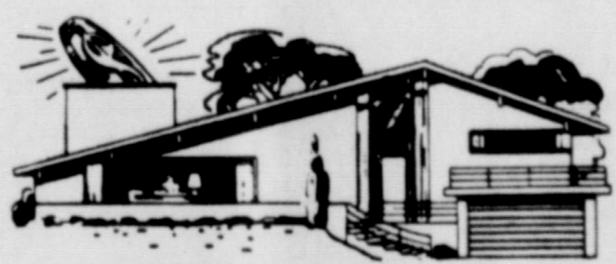

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FHA Loans Available For Water Development And Soil Conservation

Loan funds are available to eligible Parmer county farmers who wish to develop water supply systems for irrigation, household use and livestock; to drain farm land; and to carry out soil conservation measures; reports M. T. Glasscock, chairman of the local Farmers Home Administration county committee.

Mr. Glasscock points out that these funds can be extremely useful in developing the water and land resources of the community and otherwise supporting rural area development. Each dollar used wisely in developing and conserving water and land resources, helps prevent crop failures, boosts farm income and increases the value of local property.

Funds used in developing water and land resources stimulate local business activity. Parmer county farmers may obtain water development and soil conservation loans to drill wells and otherwise improve water supply systems for irrigation, home use and livestock; purchase pumps, sprinkler systems and other irrigation equip-

ment. Loans may also be obtained to clear and level land and carry out basic land treatment practices.

Farmers pay 5 percent interest on water development and soil conservation loans, according to Mr. Glasscock. And he said that loans to individual farmers in Parmer County are usually scheduled for repayment over a period of 10 to 20 years but that loans may be made payable over periods up to 40 years if necessary.

To be eligible for a water development and soil conservation loan, a farmer must be unable to obtain the necessary credit on reasonable terms from private and cooperative lenders.

Further details about water development and soil conservation loans may be obtained from the Farmers Home Administration office located at Farwell, Texas.

Mr. Glasscock said that the Farmers Home Administration also makes loans to purchase and develop farms, buy livestock and equipment and pay farm and home operating expenses, build and improve rural homes and essential farm service buildings, build housing for farm laborers, develop watersheds, and to meet emergency credit needs of farmers suffering from a natural disaster such as hail, flood, or drought.

Capital losses can be used to offset capital gains. Look closely at your records. You may decide to sell depressed stocks or bonds, and take losses now to cancel earlier gains that otherwise would be taxed. Or you may decide to take some gains by selling assets that are up in price, if you have earlier 1961 losses to cancel out the gain.

Make tax - free gifts. The law allows you to make limited gifts each year without paying gift tax. Gifts made now, before the year's end, might reduce estate taxes later.

Under the law, you can give \$3,000 a year to each of your children or to other people, as many persons as you wish, all free of gift tax. These yearly gifts can be \$6,000 each if your spouse agrees. You may give your children income producing securities or other property, thus shifting some of the family income to others in lower tax brackets.

Deep Plowing Aids Root Rot Control

Over 5,000 Texas cotton farmers are reducing cotton root rot by deep plowing. They deep plowed more than a quarter million acres during 1961 according to year-end reports by county agricultural agents.

Farmers in many counties have carried out result demonstrations which showed positively that deep plowing does reduce root rot, said Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist.

Best results were obtained, he explained, when deep plowed soil was allowed to dry for ten days to two weeks during sum-

mer or early fall when soil moisture was below normal. Shorter drying periods have given a degree of control but are somewhat unreliable, Smith said.

Affected areas should be plowed and large amounts of organic matter turned under during the hot, dry season. Plow depths of from 6 to 18 inches are recommended, depending upon the soil type and equipment available. Mold-board or disc breaking plows are satisfactory for doing the job, the specialist said. Drying the soil for a reasonable period kills

the root rot fungus by drying and killing cotton roots and those of susceptible weeds, Smith explained.

The reports from the counties showed that losses ranging up to 75 per cent had been reduced to less than 5 percent by deep plowing. Eradication is not usually complete because the fungus may penetrate the soil to a depth of 8 feet, Smith added.

Local county agents can supply additional information on root rot control practices, and Smith suggests a visit.

Fertilizer Carry-Over Tests Made

Tests to determine the carry-over of fertilizer from year to year are being conducted at the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway. Delbert Langford, Associate Agronomist is in charge of the tests directed by Dr. Thomas C. Loagrecker, Director of the Foundation.

In 1961 nitrogen was applied at the rate of 0, 50, 100, 150 pounds per acre on cotton land and 0, 50, 100, 150, 200 pounds per acre on grain sorghum land with half of the plots having 100 pounds of phosphate applied. These two crops will be grown on the same plots continuously until the original fertilizer application ceases to increase the yield.

The tests are being conducted to give answers to questions frequently raised by farmers and fertilizer dealers in planning their fertilizer programs to secure maximum results from fertilizer usage.

Water As Tax Deduction Case Goes Before Court

The question of whether or not ground water cost can be deducted returns as the water is depleted on federal income tax will go before the courts in Lubbock Jan. 2.

Remember grandma's pantry, its shelves loaded with food, ready for any emergency? The food was ready whether it was for unexpected company or roads blocked for days by a winter's storm.

Today, when we are vulnerable as always to the ravages of nature as well as the possibility of nuclear attack, every wise and thinking family will likewise prepare for emergencies with the modern equivalent of grandma's pantry.

rupted. If this should happen, a family probably would have to depend wholly upon its own food and resources for survival.

To save water, moist towels may be purchased from department store, drugs, or ordered. These towels are folded in small 2 inch by 3

inch packages. Civil defense recommends that a larger quantity of water be stored if you have space.

Glass jugs with tight-fitting covers or stoppers make good storage containers for liquids. Fruit jars, quart bottles, picnic vacuum jugs, and other types of containers are good.

It isn't necessary to boil drinking water before sealing. Fresh water from the tap in clean, sealed containers is safe. Water for emergency use should be changed every six weeks.

materials between jars and pack them just as you would do if packing to move. Then store your reserve in the coolest spot in your shelter.

Select foods that store easily, keep for months without refrigeration, are easily prepared, and require little or no cooking. Canned foods in metal and glass containers will stay in good condition for six or more months if kept in a dry, cool place, preferably not above 70 degrees and not below freezing.

To keep foods which come in paper boxes for as long as 6 months, place in tightly covered metal cans or cabinets in clean, dry, cool place. Store them in their original containers or packages.

If your family includes infants, toddlers, older persons, invalids or others on a special diet, think through their food needs and make the best possible 2-week provision.

Avoid cooking and heating foods unless absolutely necessary. No open flame will be safe when gas, fuel oil or explosives are nearby.

Keeping accurate and complete records of all income and expenses is just good business all the time, but it is particularly important when it is time to file income tax returns.

According to the "Food for Fitness Daily Food Guide" planned by USDA Nutritional

Council, each family member needs to eat the following daily, 2 to 4 cups of milk products, 2 or more servings of meat, fish, eggs, or beans, 4 or more servings of citrus fruit, dark-green deep-yellow vegetable and potatoes, and 4 or more servings of whole grain or enriched bread or cereal.

With all of this food, especially canned food, don't forget a can opener or two. You will also need a few cooking utensils, paper plates and cups, knives, forks, and spoons.

Don't forget a clock or some type of time piece to help you know the passing of time. Make sure you have a first aid kit including bandages, antiseptic, gauze, tincture of iodine, eye drops with dropper, and any special medicines.

For body waste disposal two large water-proof garbage cans or plastic containers with tight fitting lids serve for this purpose. Have on hand a ball of string or twine. Deposit body waste first in paper bag, then in plastic bag. Tie securely and deposit in the proper garbage can.

Of course, provide a transistor or battery radio that will provide reception in the shelter. This is most important to listen to instructions on CONELRAD.

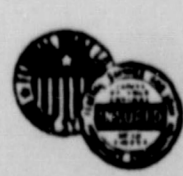

Two new developments in insect control show promise. USDA scientists have found a chemical that sterilizes several species of insects.

A second chemical showing promise is a chemical which causes the insect to starve to death. The chemical apparently interferes with the insects metabolism causing it to starve to death believing it's stomach is full.

Rat killing season is here again. During the summer months the rat population is not too noticeable because they stay in the fields, close to their food supplies.

This concentration presents quite a problem to the farmer, and also cost him money by what the rats eat, waste or destroy.

The first necessity in an effective rat control program is sanitation. All debris, loose grain and any other sources of shelter or food should be removed from the premises.

Once the rodent population is under control, continued sanitation and the placing of a few poison baits will prevent reinfestation.
