For a season which is supposed to be one of joy, relaxation and enjoyment, the past week has sure been plagued with a rash of accidents and lawlessness -- at least from my standpoint.

It began Wednesday with a wreck north of Friona where a car leaped a ditch, flipped up and over a fence without breaking the fence post and landed on its wheels. And the two people in it were not thrown from the car.

The second accident Friday morning was less than five miles from the first. In this one, the car turned end over end one and one-half times.

Meanwhile, burglars had hit Grady Dodd's Texaco warehouse for the second time during the year. Two trucks were stolen the same night and are believed to have been used in the burglary. Dodd reports that 67 tires were taken.

Friday night, a second burglary was committed at the Phillips 66 warehouse in south Friona and accounted for the loss of 10 truck tires and about 20 cases of antifreeze.

Saturday afternoon, three cars were involved in a near head-on crash in the draw south of Hub. Two persons were taken to the hospital as a result.

It is a wonder to me how any of the passengers escaped serious injury of death. I reached the scene of the accidents shortly after their occurrence and could hardly believe everyone in the vehicles was not killed. Editorial Comment:

"Well Done"

Sheriff Charles Lovelace, his assistants and other law enforcement officials of the area are due a resounding 'Well

They have again proved that 'Crime Does Not Pay.' The recent apprehension of the persons charged with breaking into over 51 businesses and schools in the panhandle and New Mexico can only be considered as admirable. The burglaries which they have apparently solved date back as far as 1959.

The modern criminal makes only one mistake when he commits a crime -- he violates the law. And the law in this part of the country has, through its recent efficiency. again pointed out the seriousness of that mistake.

The criminal may be of the bravest type of person but he is forever plagued with the fear of being discovered. And so long as law officers continue with their diligent attention to details and bring culprits to justice, regardless of the time elapsed between the commission of the crime and the arrest of the guilty party, criminals will live in fear of the law -- or at least, they will remain uneasy of mind.

If a man thinks he is fast and can cover ground in a hurry, he should try to keep up with a law officer in Parmer County when he is hot on the trail of a criminal. He would be surprised to discover how slow he really is.

We tried it last week, and we discovered that we are very slow, compared with Sheriff Lovelace.





Tax Filing **Time Nears**

All citizens or residents of the United States, including minor children, who had gross incomes of \$600 or more in 1961, must file a federal income tax return, John J. Sloan, Administrative Officer, Internal Revenue Service, Lubbock, Texas, announced today,

If the taxpayer is 65 or over as of December 31, 1961, he or she is not required to file unless his or her gross income for 1961 was at least \$1,200.

The IRS representative added that even though a taxpayer is not required to file under these rules, he or she must file to obtain a refund, if any income tax was withheld from his or her

He said there is one exception to the general rule, Selfemployed persons such as sole proprietors, partners, and independent contractors, must file an income tax return and pay a self-employment tax, if net earnings from self-employment were \$400 or more.

Many questions about federal income tax returns can be answered by telephoning the IRS

The filing deadline this year is Monday, April 16!



Special Session Aimed At Escheat Law Change

Texas Press Association AUSTIN, Tex. -- "Escheat" is a word you'll hear often during

the next 30 days. With the fourth session of the 57th Legislature under way the most important item on the agenda is "escheat." Governor Price Daniel called this third special session because he believes the more than 1,500 banks and savings and loan associations should be subject to escheat.

But just what is "escheat?" It's a process as ancient as Roman history; written in Old England's feudal law; described by Webster as, "Reversion of land to the crown, or to the state in the United States, by failure of persons entitled to hold the legally same."

Escheat provisions were of the Republic of Texas, and enacted as a state statute in

Texas law always has stated that when anybody dies without heirs, or disappears and can't be found, his property shall be turned over to the state, after seven years, But the law has lacked a provision by which persons or institutions holding property of missing persons were required to report it.

Governor Daniel started pushing for a provision three years ago, and last summer the Legislature finally passed reporting provision. But the bankers have fought it long and successfully. They are still exempt from the reporting law, although all

and rich salad dressing. Avoid sweets such as cakes, cookies, rich puddings, candies, fountain drinks and sundaes, carbonated drinks, and alcoholic beverages. Starch foods such as macaroni, dry peas, and beans are also on the caution list for weight watchers.

Here are some suggestions for planning and preparing foods to cut calories. Use non - fat, dry milk solids for cooking. Reconstituted dry milk solids heated and combined with vegetable liquids are good in soups.

Keep desserts simple. Serve fresh fruits or canned and frozen fruits packed in water or juice instead of syrup.

Start your home food storage and family shelter programs today. We cannot expect to wait around thinking that it will never happen. Then when it does happen, become panicky and beg our neighbors to take us in for protection. If each family had made plans for their own family food supply, we would then be cutting their food needs in half for every family begging to stay.

More important even than food is a safe, adequate supply of water. It is a must for survival. For each member of the family, store at least seven gallons of water or other fluids, such as fruit drinks and bottled beverages. This allows one-half gallon of luquid per person per day for drinking and cleansing purposes.

To save water, moist towelettes may be purchased from department store, drugs, or ordered. These towelettes are folded in small 2 inch by 3

> Glass jugs with tight-fitting covers or stoppers make good storage containers for liquids. Fruit jars, quart bottles, picnic vacuum jugs, and other types of containers are good. Metal containers are safe to use, if they can be tightly sealed, but some may give the water an unpleasant taste.

> It isn't necessary to boil drinking water before sealing. Fresh water from the tap in clean, sealed containers is safe. Water for emergency use should be changed every six weeks. Otherwise, it may develop undesirable tastes and odors during storage. Its flavor can be improved merely by pouring it from one container to another three or four times. It is wise to pack your containers against damage from blast or shock. especially if using glass.

Tax Filing Time Nears

Farm self-employed tax returns are due by February 15th for those farmers whose tax year starts on January 1st. However, farm operators who file an estimate of their tax and pay that amount by January 15th have until April 15th to file their returns and pay any balance due.

Keeping accurate and complete records of all income and expenses is just good business all the time, but it is particularly important when it is time to file income tax returns. Geldon said. Maintaining good records and filing tax returns on time means quicker processing of your claim when you became eligible for disability or retirement benefits or, in the event of your death, when your survivors apply for benefits. The amount of your benefit depends on the earnings you report. The tax on 1961 earnings is 4 1/2% of your net earnings up to \$4800.


